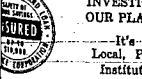

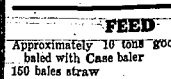

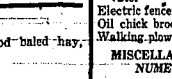

### Russ to Seize Reich, Japan; Dewey Thinks

NEW YORK, Feb. 2 (AP)—Gov. Thomas E. Dewey believes Russia "is getting set" to seize all of Germany and Japan as a prelude to attempted world conquest.

By grabbing all the industrial power of those nations, the New York governor said in an article in *Collier's* magazine, Stalin "would no longer fear American industrial might and, with his vast manpower, he would be in a position to take the final step of conquering the world."

He said "there is good reason to believe" that either an internal group or armed conquest of Yugoslavia by the Soviet Union is planned before an attack on Germany.

Heur Late

"I do not know how late the hour is," Dewey wrote. "Sources of information which have been excellent in the past say that following the attack on Yugoslavia the Soviet Union will launch the grand assault on Germany. This assault is hard in the fall and the governments have been gathered.

"Until recently all our government planning has been based on Soviet attack in 1944. I believe that there has been finally abandoned and there is now a general belief that the attack may come in 1951 or at least in 1952."

"National Suicide"

Dewey said it would be "national suicide" to abandon our efforts to contain the Russians and to retreat to our own frontiers.

"The United States must, he said, immediately convert to large-scale war production and speedily carrying out overwhelming military force.

However, Dewey cautioned, American resources and power should not be rushed to Europe or Asia "without proof that they will develop the strength to defend themselves."

Defend Asia

In Asia, Dewey said, "we must stop waddling and vacillating and announce as a nation, for good, that we will defend Formosa, Japan and the Philippines, and provide arms to the British and French in Southeast Asia."

"If we do, a thrill of hope will be spread throughout the world and resistance will be stiffened everywhere."
