# About 500 Injured Listed In New Jersey Commuter Train Plunge Off Trestle

WOODRIDGE, N. J., Feb. 7 (AP)—A crowded commuter train plunged off a newly erected trestle last night, killing 82 persons and injuring about 500. It was the nation's worst train wreck in 32 years. Throughout the night and far into today, rescue workers hacked through the twisted mass of wreckage. They said other bodies still may be found in the crumpled cars and debris.

The 11-car Pennsylvania railroad train, "The Broker," swerved wildly and jumped the tracks as it sped onto the midtown overpass. The cars, track-knifing crazily, hurtled down a 20-foot embankment.

The new, temporary overpass had been put in service only a few hours before the crash.

In Newark, the FBI said it was investigating to determine "whether sabotage was involved." The railroad, conducting its own probe, said it could offer no immediate explanation for the cause of the wreck.

The dead include bankers, lawyers and businessmen, prominent in their localities and civic life, most of them home-bound from New York City offices.

In mid-morning, the list of known dead stood at 70, with three bodies still unidentified. The rush hour crush was the worst in the nation since 1918 when 100 were killed by a similar wreck and more disastrous than a 193 accident outside Philadelphia.

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## Woman Is Killed In Jerome Crash

JEROME, Feb. 7—Jerome county's and Magic Valley's fourth traffic fatality occurred at 9:30 a. m. Wednesday in a head-on collision between an automobile and a one and one-half-ton truck-three miles north of Jerome on highway 53.

Mrs. Grover C. Ross, Salton, Ore., was killed almost instantly, said Coroner J. R. Wiley who investigated. The coroner also announced that he plans to hold an inquest in the death.

TOKYO, Feb. 7 (AP)—Allied ground forces smashed forward today with three powerful tank columns to the east, pushing the battle to the American doughboys with heights at one point.

The Chinese and Korean roads were cleared in a new drive toward the ridge just south of Seoul. At their heels was the main drive still an ill-learned word of retreat for the red but now on the verge of thawing.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 7.—The U. S. Geological Survey has announced that a contract has been set for the Blackbird mine project.

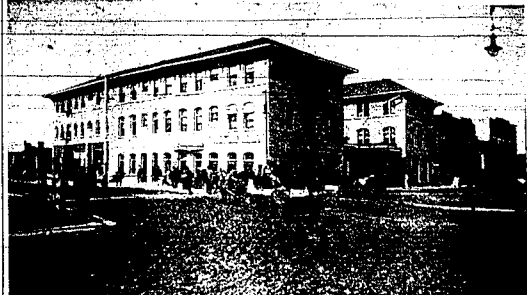
The contract, which covers the period between the date of its execution and the date of completion of the project, is for the purpose of conducting a geological survey of the mine.

**Double 1940 Salary Scale Needed Now**

NEW YORK, Feb. 7 (AP)—Unless there is more than double pay cuts in the last 10 years, you were better off financially with the salary you earned in 1940, the National Industrial conference board said today.

A man who earned \$5000 in 1940 would have to have a \$9350 a year income today to have equal purchasing power, the board reported.

### Railroad Traffic Blocked as Rock Lands on Track

OLENUS, Feb. 7.—Traffic on the Union Pacific railroad between Olenus, Idaho, and Kins Hill was held up for almost an hour Monday evening while workmen cleared a large boulder from the track.

## Five Ways Given To Keep Civilian Insurance Policy

Five ways for the man who enrolls in private life insurance in force were outlined Wednesday by a Twin Falls Insurance representative.

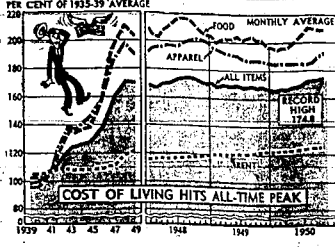

### Smallest Crop of Spuds in 16 Years Is Predicted for 1951

**PULLMAN, Wash., Feb. 7 (AP)**—Advance reports from growers indicate the 1951 potato crop may be the smallest in the United States since 1935, an agricultural economist said today.

Karl Hobson, Washington State college extension price specialist, said he based this forecast on a report of the planting intentions of potato growers released by the bureau of agricultural economics.

The indicated acreage cuts would mean a crop small enough to bring favorable prices to most growers, he said.

The report shows growers in the important potato producing areas of the country plan to reduce 1951 acreage 14 per cent below their 1950 acreage, he said. 71 yields should average the 210 bushels per acre they got in 1948 and 1949, the national crop would be about 30,000,000 bushels, the smallest since 1935, he said.

Hobson said Washington growers have indicated they plan to cut acreage 16 per cent below their 1950 plantings.

### 13 Bills Are Proposed on Worker Help

**BOISE, Feb. 7 (AP)**—A series of 13 bills were introduced in the Idaho senate yesterday to increase benefits and disability under the Idaho workmen's compensation law and made numerous technical and clarification changes to conform with the report of the interim committee on workmen's compensation.

The measures would provide death and disability increases in this manner:

Workmen without dependent wife—Increase maximum from \$10 to \$12 and minimum from \$10 to \$12.

Workmen with dependent child—Increase for one child from \$8 to \$8, two children from \$4 to \$5, three children from \$4 to \$5 and for four or more children from \$4 to \$5.

The specific indemnity for a permanent injury less than total would be increased from \$10 to \$15 for the minimum and from \$10 to \$12 for the maximum.

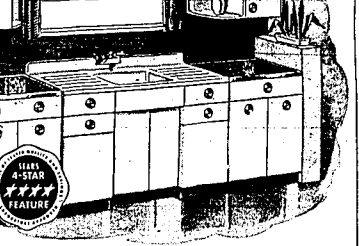

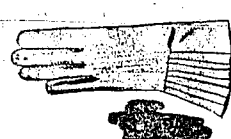

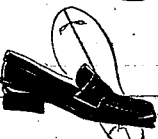
