

Legislature Keys Basin Pact Negotiation Unit

APPROVAL of a compact commission to study with other states for development of the Columbia River basin was approved by the Idaho legislature today as it prepared some of its major bills.

A near party-line vote, completed legislative action to establish the commission to negotiate agreements with Oregon, Montana, Wyoming, Utah and Washington, to study the basin.

The compact commission will be headed by Gov. Cecil D. Andrus and will include representatives from each of the states.

After John E. Bowen, president of the New Jersey public utility commission, and a committee of engineers, had investigated the crash, Bowen said he believed the lack of yellow caution lights was the cause of the crash.

Wilda Reems Given Life Term for Killing

SUNBE, Feb. 10—Wilda Reems, 15, and Myrtle C. W. Reems, 16, were given life terms in the Idaho state penitentiary for the slaying of her brother, Leroy M. Reems, 19, on Oct. 19. She was sentenced by District Judge D. C. Gooding, in a hearing in district court here yesterday. The hearing had been scheduled for next Wednesday.

Reems was arrested on a complaint by appointed attorney, Everett B. Taylor, Haysley, asked for the earlier hearing.

Taylor entered a plea of guilty to the slaying. Judge Gooding ordered the girl, Judge Sulpher ordered the degree of guilt.

Hoover Warns Nation on Land War With Soviets

NEW YORK, Feb. 10 (AP)—Herbert Hoover, declaring that air and sea might are America's best weapons against aggression, said last night that land war against Russia would risk "the loss of all civilization."

He urged a period of watchful waiting for evidence of Europe's unity and military strength before sending more ground troops there.

The former Republican president said that instead of committing land armies abroad, the U. S. should build "overwhelming air and naval power" for use against Russia if she attacks Europe. "A land offensive against the communists," he said, "could bring no military victory, no political conclusion." It could bring catastrophe to America, he added, "with no salvation to Europe."

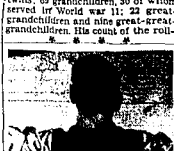

Wiry Little Man Claims Age of 95 and Title of World's Oldest Roller Skater

If you see a wiry, little old man with a white beard skating down the road one of these mornings, you needn't make a quick trip to a psychiatrist.



It is Pop (Pop) Carter, 95, the oldest skater in the world, out taking his daily three-hour exercise. The old man, in years only, is in Twin Falls and will be the star performer at a "polo party" sponsored at the Rydman roller rink by the Rydman Roller Club members beginning at 9 p. m. Monday.



At 85, "Pop" can put a lot of youngsters to shame. Particularly by balancing on the rear wheels of his skates while picking up a dime from the floor. (Try it without skates then imagine adding wheels.)

The old man tells an incredible story. He was born Jan. 5, 1856, in San Antonio, Tex.—naturally, including "Pop" says the event took place at a skating rink. His parents were vaudeville troupers and taught him to skate when he was 4 years old.

Like an hop out of a child's story book, Pop "Pop" Carter, 95, demonstrates how to balance on the rear wheels of roller skates. He isn't touching the wall. Idaho Power Seeks OK for Dam Project

BOISE, Feb. 10 (AP)—Permit to construct a \$12,000,000 dam and power plant on Snake river 30 miles north of Weiler has been filed with the federal and state commissions by Idaho Power company.

The proposed dam would be located at the Oxbow site, where the company now has a minor power installation. It is located four miles south of Hazzard, Ore.

One of Series "The Oxbow dam is one of a series of five low-head dams planned in that area by the company. All five sites would be flooded if the government builds its contemplated Hells canyon dam."

T. E. Roach, Idaho Power president, said the Oxbow dam could be operated within approximately 18 to 24 months after work was started.

The power plant would have a capacity of 140,000 kilowatts in four units of equal size.

Project Detailed "The project would be a rock-fill dam and a concrete spillway. It would have a reservoir 13 miles long, a canal 1,000 feet long, intake works, four steel penstocks about 275 feet long, a power house on the Oregon bank of the river about three miles downstream and three 135-kilowatt transmission lines."

Roach said a preliminary permit had been filed with the FPC in June, 1947. The Oxbow site is about 23 miles upstream from the proposed Hells canyon dam.

Film on Delinquent Youngsters Set on Tuesday as Third Session for Series

A motion picture, "The Quiet Ones," will be featured at a public meeting sponsored by the Lincoln school PTA parent education committee at 8 p. m. Tuesday at Lincoln school. The meeting is the third in a series on mental and emotional health of children.

"The Quiet Ones" was selected as the best motion picture of the year by the New York Newspaper Guild and was chosen one of the 10 best films of the year by Time magazine, the New York Times and the National Board of Review. It was nominated for an academy award and won the critics award and first international award at the Grand International Film festival in Venice, Italy.

The picture was filmed in authentic surroundings in Harlem and at the Wilkes school, Soopus, N. Y. The Wilkes school was founded by the Protestant Episcopal church and is dedicated to the rehabilitation of wayward and emotionally disturbed boys.

Methods of rehabilitation of the Negro boy in the motion picture are the authentic methods used by the school. The cast of the picture largely is made up of actual residents of the Harlem district and the students of Lincoln school.

Mrs. Henderson urged all interested persons to attend the showing of the motion picture at Lincoln school to help them in understanding the mental and emotional problems of youngsters. She pointed out the artistic honors the picture has won and the acclaim it has received from professional people in the fields of emotional and social problems.

The picture was rented by the parent education committee with the assistance of other Twin Falls PTA groups and the county board of education.

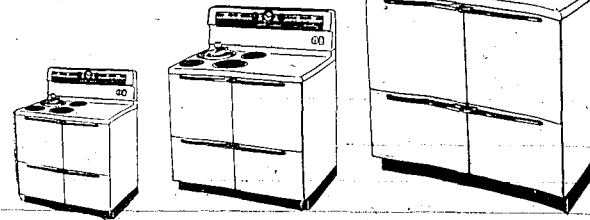

Retired Admiral Opines Atom-Powered Sub Can Clear Seas of Surface Ships

WASHINGTON, Feb. 10 (Special)—The revolutionary atomic motor...
The admiral asserted: "This submarine could drive every surface ship from the sea, chasing them down and destroying them one by one. During World War II fast luxury liners carried tens of thousands of troops through uninfested waters, protected only by high speed. Those days are gone forever."
He adds that the first atom sub will be completed in three years. If successful, the motor will be to replace oil engines in surface craft, permitting huge liners to cross oceans on a few pounds of fuel.
Lockwood foresees great weight savings when the 250 tons of diesel fuel and 350-ton storage battery are discarded, saying that "there will be more space for torpedo storage and for sonar, radar and radio equipment."
With a plant three or four times the horsepower of our present diesel, our engineers believe the atom boat will run continuously at 20 to 30 knots submerged.

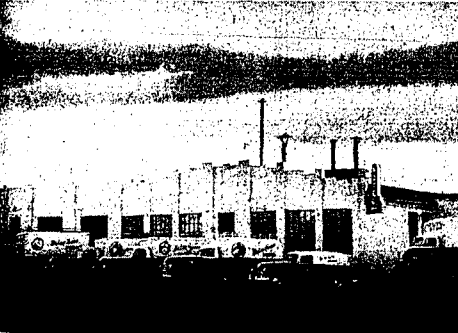
Jack has been interested in the baking business all his life. What he has learned at the school of experience he learned at the University of Utah, where he majored in home economics and in two cake decorating schools.

Operation of Local Hart Bakery Plant Emphasizes Cleanliness and Efficiency

A tour of the Hart Bakery Twin Falls shows the extreme cleanliness and efficiency of a modern bakery.

Cleanliness is noted immediately in the moment the doors are opened. The floors were washed and then washed for further cleanliness. The same cleanliness and sanitation is evident throughout the whole plant.

Off-floor storage of flour and refrigerated storage of yeast take up most of the basement. Every care is taken to see that all ingredients are kept in the best of condition.

Some variety flours are stored on the second floor—the start of the process from flour to bread. Dumps into a scoured bin, the flour is served in transfer to a steel and steel bin. After being weighed the flour goes to a first-floor mixer for addition of water, yeast and other ingredients.

Bakers call this mixture a sponge. Proportions are closely controlled to assure the uniform fine flavor of every loaf and cake and every bread. Even the water is weighed and the temperature 60 degrees and humidity are closely regulated for uniformity.

The sponge is put into huge troughs—blenders. Bakers pronounce troughs to rhyme with hoes. The troughs are cleaned and washed regularly. In them the sponge rises four hours before sending and addition of other ingredients for specialty breads.

In dividers the sponge is weighed in uniform pieces. The weight is double-checked to protect the consumer. Next stop for the mixture is in rounders which shape the dough into spheres which go into an overhead proofer for eight minutes over heat of rising.

After, extremely modern cross-grain moulder shapes the dough into loaves which are placed in pans to set in a proof box about one hour. Humidity is controlled closely and the temperature is kept at 96 degrees.

After all this time and attention the bread is placed in an electric oven and baked about 35 minutes. Out of the oven it is placed on racks and taken upstairs to a cooling room, air conditioned and refrigerated.

Cooling lasts about one and one-half hours and in one of the most important processes. It improves the bread's keeping quality and prevents mold. Cooling is especially important in summer as bread can't be wrapped while hot.

The final production process is wrapping to retain freshness, softness and flavor. The bakers look for a thin golden brown crust for aroma and flavor and test the bread's texture, bloom softness, keeping quality and appearance.

Several special machines are used in the local Hart Bakery. There is an automatic bin machine which weighs out different sizes for tea rolls, buns and biscuits. A cake machine also has been added.

The oven in the Twin Falls plant bakes 60 one-pound loaves or 212 one and one-half pound loaves at one time with a baking going through the oven every 40 minutes. Through the expansion and combination of the Twin Falls and Idaho Falls plants, total production is 14,000 pounds per hour.

Cleanliness is a watchword in the Hart Bakery. Equipment is kept spotless, employees wear white clothing and hats, their hands touch the bread only in taking it in or out of pans or placing it on the wrapping machine.

The plants are subject not only to state health inspection but also federal inspections as well because the firm is engaged in interstate commerce.

That's the story of a small phase of the production of bread, six to eight hours from flour to store display rack. Probably one of the best foods taken for granted every day, bread requires a longer production time from farm and factory than any other food consumed in great amount.

It wasn't long ago that Magic Valley housewives set aside one day every week to bake their bread. Today a team of farmers, scientists, businessmen and workers enables the average housewife to go to super-marketed or neighborhood bakeries and get a better loaf of bread at a lower cost of time and money.—Adv.

Fast Delivery Is Keynote of Hart Program

Baking better products is only half the story in the Hart program for Magic Valley housewives. The other half is delivering the bread to the door of its destination every city and hamlet in its territory.

6,000 Loaves at Once

Here is the capacity of one huge Hart Bakery transport: 1,000 packages of six-ounce rolls each, 210 boxes or 6,040 loaves of bread. By adding a trailer 6,000 loaves of bread can be hauled at one time.

Hart Bakery trucks roll 1700 miles a day to bring you fresh, flavoured bread. Routes from the Twin Falls plant go to Rogerson, Blaine, Buhl, Castford, Gooding, Jerome, Wendell, Kimberly, Hansen, Murphree, Heaton, Eden, Piler, Hagerman and Shoshone, and distribution arrangements recently have been completed for the Wood River valley, (8un Valley, Kelchum, Halley, Redwood).

Three States Served

In all the Hart Bakery serves portions of three states, southern and eastern Idaho, southern Montana and western Wyoming. Buhl, Buhl and air express also play their part in the Hart distribution system.

Decorated cakes from Jack and Joan's Idaho Falls plant have been air expressed to Hawaii, Alaska and England. During the bad winter a few years ago, bread was air dropped to weatherbound Briggs. More recently the Twin Falls plant air expressed a package to a soldier in Germany.—Adv.

VALUE OF TRANSPORT

Expert Baker Recalls Gains In Technique

"I can remember when we used to mix bread dough by hand, and believe me, that's just as hard work as making concrete by hand," says Frank A. Swanson, superintendent of Hart Bakery plants at Idaho Falls and Twin Falls.

In his 35 years of experience Swanson has seen much progress and many advancements. Principal among them are fermentation controls, automatic high speed machinery and improvement in storage of ingredients, all aiding in attaining uniformity.

Scientific Controls

Years ago, says Swanson, little was known about such yeast foods as sugar and malt syrup. Today, a modern bakery is as much of a big laboratory as the kitchen. Large bakeries, like flour mills and sugar factories, employ scientists to analyze and control the composition of the product.

Four mills in particular closely control the blend of various wheats to produce flour made to measure for the requirements of bakeries operating under different conditions. Swanson estimates 80 per cent of all flour goes to bakeries and experimental bakers' grades to test bakers' requirements.

Detailed Duties

Swanson's job as superintendent is to maintain uniformity, check and make daily corrections as to fermentation temperature—the controlling factor of the whole process—and as to humidity, which controls water absorption of the dough. He also tests doughs for new products.

Fermentation, simply explained, is the process in which the action of yeast causes the dough to rise. As any housewife knows, temperature is all important at this stage.

Swanson recalls dough mixers were just coming into use when he began his career in the baking industry. It was the only bakery machine at the time and he says he was lucky enough to get his training on one of the earliest.

Brewery Cleanliness

Successful operation of a bakery depends upon proper storage and ventilation of ingredients, says Swanson. "But to me the most important thing is cleanliness in the shop." He insists on good lighting.

The superintendent of the two plants at Idaho Falls and Twin Falls has been working in large wholesale bakeries since 1922, turning down offers in Hawaii and Portland to join the Hart organization last July.

But, yeast foods and vitamins are bought in proportionate amounts. Used with every 100 pounds of flour is a water containing 150 milligrams of vitamin B-1, Chiamine hydrochloride, riboflavin of the vitamin B-2 family, nicotin of the vitamin B group and 900 milligrams of iron.

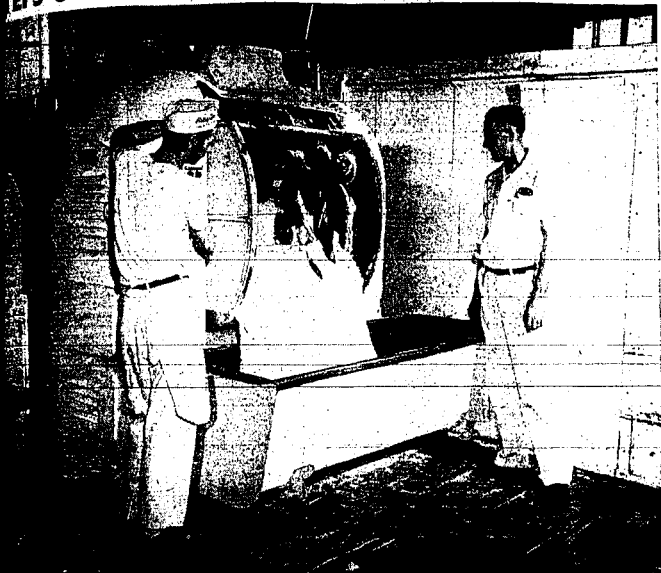

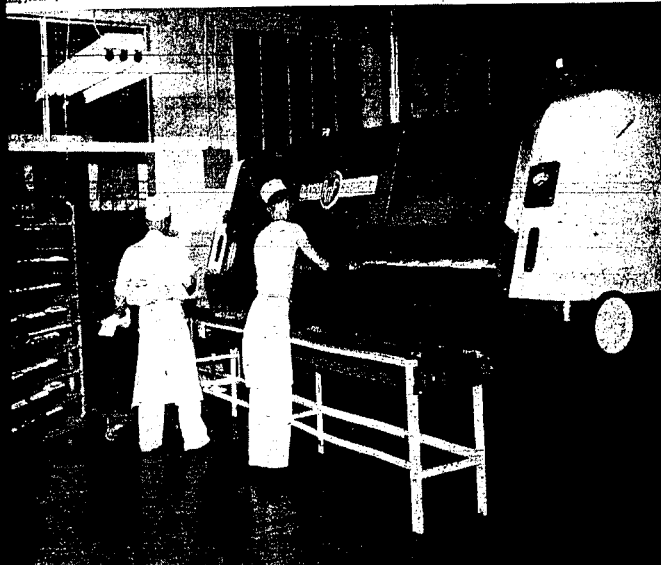
STEPS OF PRODUCTION SHOWN IN HART BAKERY'S MAGNIFICENT MODERN PLANT



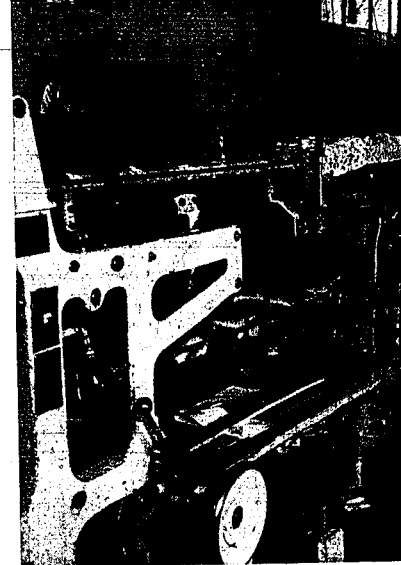

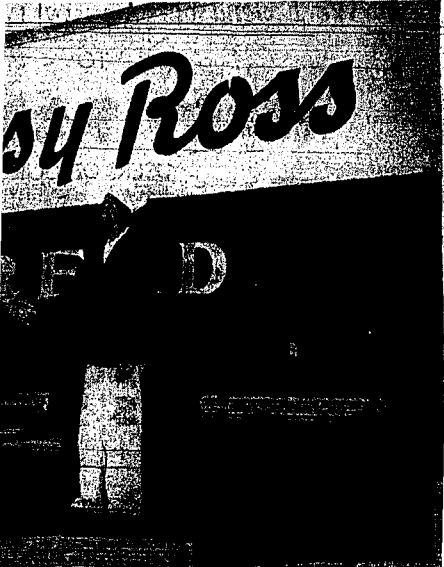

Federal Aid Grants Near \$12,500,000 For Idaho in 1950, Dworshak Reports

WASHINGTON, Feb. 10 (AP)—Idaho received nearly \$12,500,000 in grants-in-aid from the federal government last year for 37 state federal programs, Senator Dworshak said today.

He commented that available records of the treasury department show Idaho taxpayers paid about \$72,000,000 to the federal government during that same period.

Dworshak told a reporter the figures on federal payments were gathered by the staff of the senate committee on expenditures in the executive departments.

The committee figures show the largest allotment last year (the fiscal year which ended June 30) was \$3,675,212 for old-age assistance. The smallest was \$411 to the American Printing House for the Blind.

The allocation for highway construction will be highest for the current fiscal year—\$4,238,898 compared with \$3,330,413 for that purpose last year with the old-age allotment will be \$3,788,900.

Allotments reported to the committee for the current fiscal year total \$12,753,782, compared to \$12,457,885 last year and \$13,731,769 in the fiscal year ended June 30, 1949.

Federal payments to the state for the 1950 year with the allotments for 1951 follow:

\$75,381 (1951 not available); maternal and child health service, \$72,722 and \$70,247; office of vocational rehabilitation, \$28,848 and \$31,712.

Aid to the blind, \$71,401 and \$84,000; services for crippled children, \$51,590 and \$76,262; venereal disease control, \$40,232 and \$21,207; child welfare services, \$33,553 and \$32,205; homes for veterans, \$31,187 (1951 not available).

Tuberculosis control, \$22,094 and \$19,200; cancer control, \$19,310 and \$13,000; heart disease control, \$18,993 and \$14,000; administration of veterans readjustment allowance, \$13,825 (1951 not available); public works advance planning, \$11,757 (1951 not available).

Water pollution control, \$6,989 and \$6,000; mental health activities, \$6,000 and \$7,000; public housing administration, \$7,895 (1951 not available); hospital survey and planning, \$2,758 (1951 not available); cooperative projects in marketing, \$2,000 (1951 not available).

Submarginal land program, \$1,695 (1951 not available); American Printing House for the Blind, \$413 and \$204; aid to permanently and totally disabled (new program)
