Texas Valley Freeze Isn't Great Worry

MCCALLEN, Tex., Feb. 12.—The farmers of the rich Texas Grande Valley section of Texas are not how to bounce back after a brief but cold frost which may damage their winter crops.

They merely wait until the thawing begins within a few days—and put in a new crop.

Last week's frost was heavy among some of the valley farmers, but they saw icicles hanging from their grapefruit and orange trees. It meant the loss of many tens of thousands of dollars. Young tomato plants also were turned black and withered. However, the wheat, a loss of more than 100,000 bushels.

No panic. The farmers down here showed no panic; no hysteria. They held meetings and calmly discussed the situation.

William Finner, associate county agent for Hidalgo, Cameron and Willacy counties, said the wheat situation was not so serious as it appeared.

The valley is one of America's richest and most productive—had freeze before. The valley still will produce 100,000 to 250,000 bushels of wheat.

Friend said many valley farmers that will turn to other crops, such as cotton, which still can be planted in time for a bumper crop. And cotton usually will bring the farmer 20 times more than the fruit crop.

The valley farmers' crop was wiped out by the freeze, but there is time to put in a new crop—in 15 to 20 days. Two crops—wheat and cotton—can be raised in 100 days.

No Restrictions
The valley farmers grew about 400,000 acres of cotton last year, and because of the frost freeze the acreage this year may be up to 1,000,000 acres, particularly so as government restrictions on growing cotton have been removed.

Friend said one of the worst freezes in the valley came in 1917. He said that in that year the wheat crop had not been developed. The best wheat was in 1918 and 1919 and 1920 also were bad years. The best freeze before the 1931 "killer" came in 1924.

Dispute Over Secret Leaks Given to FBI

WASHINGTON, Feb. 12.—The army declares it has dumped the secret-McCarthy case out of the hands of the justice department.

Communist Drew Pearson and his newspaper columnists have accused each other of violating military security by making public information from secret defense department dispatches.

Probe Strained
The army indicated it got nowhere trying to get out of the hands of the justice department.

Writing McCarthy, who had tried at face of questions about the Pearson column, the army secretary added that the case had been handed to the justice department "for further investigation."

Figures Cited
The Pearson column had purporting to show that communists in Korea prior to the big red of offensive and allied retreat was Pearson's lead that General MacArthur had reported publicly.

McCarthy said no security was involved. He was disclosing "military errors" which the public was entitled to know about.

Referred to FBI
To Pearson, who had demanded to know whether any action would be taken by the defense department against the column, the army secretary also wrote that "the entire matter is being referred to the department of justice."

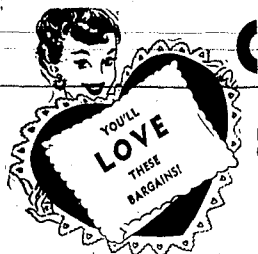

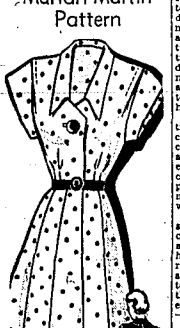

Military Woos More Women; Wants No Draft and No Limit

WASHINGTON, (NEA)—Pentagon experts have reached the same conclusion that practically every adult male arrives at some time in his life: the only basic advantage the average male has over the average female is more muscle.
This theory is behind the new military policy which calls for a lot more women in uniform, and lets the girls do almost everything except heavy lifting and actual combat.
Mrs. Anna M. Rosenberg, assistant secretary of defense for manpower, is asking congress to remove the ceiling on the number of women in uniform. The limit is now two per cent of all servicemen. The girls who women have proved their value to the service.
In the air force women can enter 33 out of the 44 career fields now open to the men. In the army the two major limitations involve strength and psychological factors, which would keep women from heavy work and combat. That leaves

Switchmen's Group Seeks Army Rights

BATTLE CREEK, Mich., Feb. 12 (UP)—Switchmen here have asked the army to give them the same privileges as "other civilian army employees" including the right to buy food and clothing in military exchanges.
Roy C. Davis of Grand Trunk western lodge 745 of the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen here made the request to Assistant Army Secretary Earl H. Bendetson. The request was in a resolution adopted by majority vote of the lodge.
Davis said "we feel we are entitled to those privileges" as a result of Bendetson's back-to-work order directed at the switchmen Thursday.
President Truman, faced with a strike by 500,000 trainmen and conductors ordered the department of defense to take over the operations of the nation's railroads last Aug. 27. Davis said his group also asked "full medical care and treatment by the army, and other army civilian employee privileges."
There was no direct comment from Bendetson in Washington but an army spokesman said "Railroad workers are not in the army, they are not in uniform and they are not entitled to privileges of the army personnel."
Davis said he would continue to press his case.

Leader of AMA Claims Credit for Congress Makeup

FLORENCE, S. C., Feb. 12 (UP)—Florence of the American Medical Association said today that she believed the 8th congress to a great extent, the president-elect of AMA said Saturday.
Dr. John W. Cline, San Francisco, emphasized that his organization normally is "not remotely interested in politics."
But when doctors see a grave threat to their profession, such as specialized medicine, they become aggressive, he declared in an interview. The AMA has conducted an informal campaign against socialism since 1948.
The AMA's policy in the 1950 congressional election was to support or oppose candidates solely on their stands concerning specialized medicine, rather than get involved in other issues.
Dr. Cline cited as a "few of many candidates" who were defeated largely through efforts of the medical profession, "Ex-Senators Popper of Florida, Graham of North Carolina, Taylor of Idaho and Thomas of Utah."

Taxes and Snow Are Among Factors Which Determine Location of Factory

NEW YORK (NEA)—All too often, says Leonard Vaseen, the location of a golf course determines the location of American industry. He says a 1950 study by the National Industrial Conference Board looking for a spot for a new plant, picked a place just because it is convenient for them to seek out for a quick nine holes.
"They don't realize," says Vaseen, "since business it is to find new locations for factories which are to be moved, that plant location has a great deal to do with the success or failure of a business. That new golf course may be in a high tax zone, or too far from good shopping facilities, or in a city where power is expensive and where there isn't an adequate supply of labor."
Moving a factory is a complicated and scientific thing, says Vaseen. It approaches what does nothing but help businesses find new locations. It studies the company that wants to move. Why is it dissatisfied with its present factory location? What does it make and how? What are its raw material needs? What is its size and how many workers? From this data, Fantus first narrows the field into a few suitable states. Then it analyzes the problem, to pick just one state. Within that state, it first picks several communities, then goes through the narrowing process again, until it settles on the one best.
That sounds simple, but it isn't. In figuring out where a company should move to, Fantus' field representatives may visit 40 cities. They may spend anywhere from two months to two years (that's an exceptional case) in making the survey. They compile figures on everything from the number of strikes since 1917 to the average annual rainfall in inches, on each of the states and cities being considered.
In building files in New York and Chicago are crammed with information on everything conceivable that might affect an industrial plant. They can look up any town or city with a population over 10,000 and find a record of its labor troubles for 23 years. They have the information on tax fluctuations of every city for the past 23 years. They have the data on which cities are doing best and which are doing worst.
Each survey is, of course, tailor-made for the individual company that wants to move. Some concerns have particular needs that must be studied. One firm, for example, needed ground water of a certain temperature in its fabricating process. Fantus found a city in Kansas with the right water temperature.
When it finishes the survey, the manufacturer has a two-volume report. Everything is there in black and white, easy to classified set.

Cominform Paper Hits Releases of Ex-Nazi Leaders

PRAGUE, Czechoslovakia, Feb. 12 (UP)—The cominform's weekly journal accuses the United States of releasing German war criminals so that they could build an "arsenal of death" and join a western European army.
The journal, published in Bucharest, Romania, and distributed here, also said the U. S. has planned to release German war criminals for Germany, John J. McCloy, and Atlantic pact commander in chief, Dwight D. Eisenhower planned to make former German Gen. Hans Speidel supreme commander of the German formations in the Atlantic army.
Commenting bitterly on the recent release by the U. S. of former top Nazis including Hitler's former communications maker Alfred Krippl, the journal declared:
"The people fought in the war against fascism but for the sake of seeing the Hitler criminals wearing the uniform of American generals only 200,000 Hitler. The people will never tolerate the regeneration of German militarism."
The journal said the U. S. is not efficient and too open to any possible aerial attack. The new plant will be built in an unexcited area of New England.
The trend among industries, says Vaseen, is to move out of the big cities. But he doesn't attribute the trend to any widespread fear of atom bombing.
He says plants are being moved from smaller cities gradually for years. Smaller cities are booming industry.
One, Port Arthur, Tex., has had a 1,600 per cent increase in the number of payers and production workers in the last eight years.

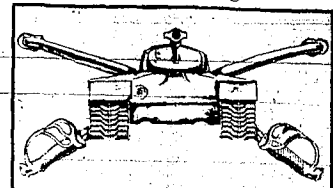

Yugoslavia Seen as Peril Point This Spring in Possible Outbreak of War

WASHINGTON, Feb. 12 (AP)—A survey of top-level estimates on the danger of a new outbreak of war this spring discloses the following highly authoritative conclusions: 1. Yugoslavia is the peril point. 2. A Soviet-Communist attack there would set off spreading hostilities that would almost certainly engulf other nations in World War III. 3. The U. S. should do what it possibly can to strengthen Yugoslavia and discourage an attack either this spring or later. The problem is what to do now, unless pressing consideration here and in consultation with Britain, France and Marshall Tito's government at Belgrade. One good bet is that Tito eventually will get military supplies from the western powers. 4. The chances are that despite the dangers in the Yugoslav situation general war will not break out this spring because Russia is not ready. 5. Some high officials here believe Russia will not take a serious risk of war this spring because of maintaining the present half-peace, there is still a danger of war-by-incident. The Soviet bloc countries have been sleeping up their preparations for war. Nevertheless, a new period of nerve war is opening. Tensions and tempers grow and these, with the coming of spring, create an explosive situation. 6. On the peace side of the ledger are two developments. One is the prospect for a big four foreign ministers' meeting this spring, indicating the great powers will fight on the diplomatic rather than military front. The other is growing hope of settlement in Korea, now that the Chinese communists have found out they probably can't win. 7. These questions of war or peace always get a cautiously modified answer from Washington officials in this vein: "I don't think the Russians will try anything very big but you never can tell." Nevertheless, at the highest levels of the government there appears to be strong confidence that the U. S. and its allies will get the time they need to rearm. 8. Marshal Tito's Yugoslavia is an important factor in the strategy of the west as well as an extremely dangerous one in Moscow's most-objectionable side. It is in the Kremlin's interest to eliminate Tito's regime, which broke with Moscow more than two years ago. Similarly it is regarded here as being in the deepest interest of the free world to bolster Tito and strengthen his already considerable might. Politically, Tito has proved the possibility of national independence in eastern Europe and has had a marked effect among western European communists. Recent purges in Yugoslavia and other defections of some communist leaders in Italy are regarded as evidence of Titoism on both sides of the iron curtain. Militarily, Tito represents with his 25 divisions the most powerful anti-Soviet force in the European area today. Though he has never asked military aid from this country, he has now made it clear that he would like the west to help build up his strength and to come quickly to his assistance should he be attacked. Truman, Stalin Send Wedding Gifts to Iranian Shah, Bride

WASHINGTON, Feb. 12 (AP)—President Truman has sent the Shah of Iran and his bride-to-be a very early American glass vase as a wedding gift. Although it would be regarded as a precious item by American collectors, it is not as spectacular as the wedding gifts sent by Premier Stalin. Tehran dispatches said the Soviet premier had sent the bride-to-be the daughter of a powerful Iranian tribal leader—a \$150,000 mink coat and the bridegroom a desk set studded with black diamonds. White House officials said Mr. Truman's gift is a crystal Steuben vase 10 inches high. It is decorated with panels showing scenes from American legends including the story of the Pilgrim fathers. The vase was taken to Iran by Ambassador Henry Grady on Dec. 20. Some quarters here questioned the accuracy of one point in the dispatch of Stalin's gifts. They said that mink is a North American animal and suggested that if Stalin did send the coat it probably was sable. A Steuben vase also was Mr. Truman's wedding present to Princess Elizabeth of England and Prince Philip when they were married in 1947. Stalin ignored that wedding.

Party Reads Out Five Washington State Democrats

OLYMPIA, Feb. 12 (AP)—The executive board of the Democratic state central committee has told the Republican ticket next time. The five who were told to run on the GOP ticket were among the eight Democratic senators who joined with 21 Republicans to organize the state senate and name the chairman of the important senate committee. A prepared statement issued by Harry Henson, state chairman of the Democratic party, said the executive board recommended as follows: That Sen. David C. Gowen, Spokane, and Edward P. Riley, Seattle, who would be holdovers at the next election, do the honorable thing and resign immediately preceding the next primary election and commit themselves to the people or the Republican ticket. That Sen. Hoderick, Linday, Spokane, Jack Rogers, Brierley, and Ted Schroeder, Pullman, if they desire to run next time, quit making up a Democratic end-state Republican.
