

Hour Gunbattle in Wallace, Kills Pair; 2 Wounded

WALLACE, Feb. 14 (AP)—A man broke into a downtown store early today, shot and killed a passerby, and two others and finally was captured after a four-hour fight with police.

The man, who carried papers identifying him as John Stodolka, 44, died an hour later without giving any motive for the shooting.

Police, stationed in windows across the street, saw machine gun fire and tear gas bombs into the store. The gunman stopped shooting back, they crept inside, and the gunman on the floor.

Mc Coy, chief of police, said the man was not wounded when he made a sudden dash for the officers shot.

Mc Coy said the shooting started about 8 a. m. when a man named John Stodolka, 44, shot and killed a woman named Mary Hinton, waitress, and two other men.

Stodolka, who was shot in the chest, was taken to the hospital and died there.

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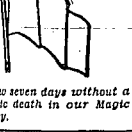

Bitter Medicine for U. S. Agriculture Looming in Wage-Price Stability Aims

WASHINGTON, Feb. 14—The government is to attempt to stabilize farm prices by forcing the production of some bitter medicine for agriculture.

The view appears to be growing in official and unofficial quarters that the sparring of wages and food prices.

Much of the difficulty in bringing the price level and wage scales under control is attributed to farm and food prices. Under the law, relatively few farm products can be frozen yet. They have not risen to the level of price protection granted by law.

Organized labor rebels against having its pay frozen as long as there is room for the cost of living and particularly food—to go high.

Just such a situation developed early in World War II. The battle raged between the government and farmers something its leaders bitterly resented.

Again agriculture may be asked to choose between subsidies and possible removal of its present price ceiling protection.

Under present law, ceilings may be placed on farm products at less than the higher of (1) parity or (2) peak prices prevailing

between May 21 and June 24. For the most products, the parity price is the minimum level ceiling. The parity price is a standard for measuring farm prices. It is declared by law to be equally fair to farmers and those who buy their products.

First put into law back in 1933, the parity idea has become a dear to organized agriculture as the right to strike is to organized labor.

But the legal bar against ceilings below parity has run into a lot of criticism. Critics contend this bar stands in the way of price and wage control.

Suggestions have been made to change the law and allow ceilings at below-parity levels. There have been hints that top administration officials have been giving this serious consideration.

An alternative to the below-parity ceilings would be subsidies. By using them, it would be possible to improve lower farm price ceilings and bring rising food costs to a halt. The government would give farmers subsidy payments large enough to give them a total return of parity—that is, the below-parity market price plus subsidies.

Through use of subsidies it would be possible to roll back prices of those foods which have risen the most, such as meat.

The bulk of the major farm organizations are against subsidies,

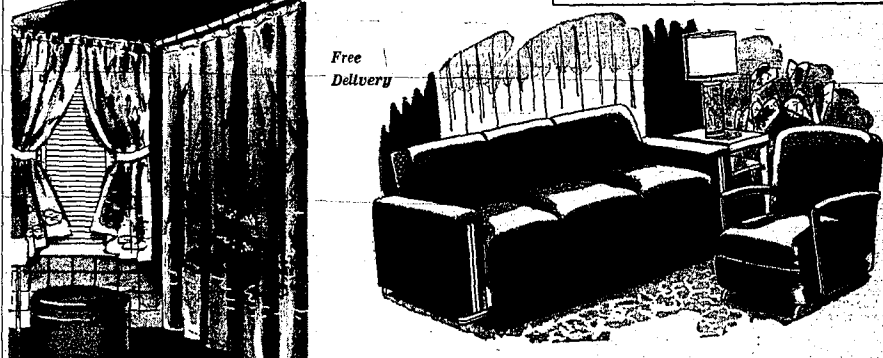

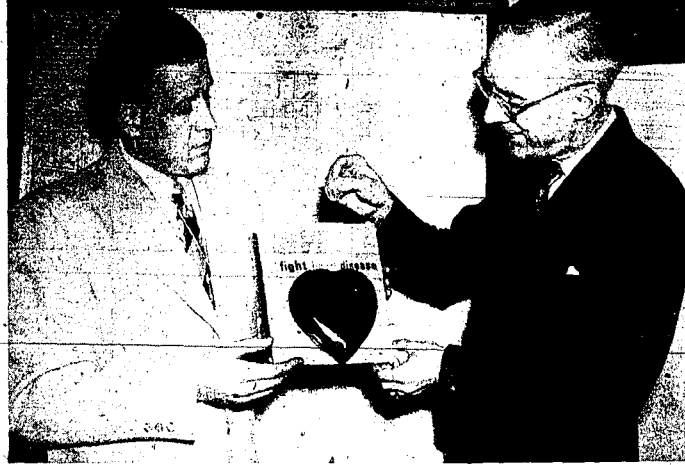

General Says Red Air Arm Can Hit U.S.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 14 (AP)—Gen. Hoy S. Vandenberg, chief of the air force, believes Russia could push its fleet to one of 100 bombers through to United States targets in a determined attack.

Vandenberg said in a signed article in the current issue of Saturday Evening Post magazine that Russia "has been working intensively on a heavy bomber to match the B-29" and "has unquestionably built it."

Analysing the Soviet striking power and America's air defense, Vandenberg said Russia "now has at least 60 planes that can strike our land targets from bases in the USSR... It is a matter of time before the B-29s...

"I should say come," Vandenberg said, "we can be expected to destroy no more than 20 percent of the bombers making an attack in the United States before bombing missions are completed and our preparations today are not expected to achieve even that figure."

He expressed his belief that no conceivable attack on such a propulsive device as a five-mile high steel tube around the country backing up an unbroken radar screen, a perfect warning system and an umbrella of fighter planes could stop a determined bombing attack.
