### Atom Weapon Not Assuming Fantastic Hue

WASHINGTON, Feb. 15 (AP)—Don't look for any "fantastic" new weapons, the man said. Naturally, he added, "everyone knows" that some day there is going to be an atomic artillery shell.

But war research chief William Webster told newsmen, don't expect our endurance people to come up with anything really startling.

Webster's remarks, coming on top of utterances by such authorities as Gen. A. Lesson Collins, army chief of staff, may take the atomic artillery shell out of the realm of the fantastic and startling.

Not Out of News  
But they won't take it out of the news. All signs point to a campaign of sorts to get the public, the United Nations, and the world conditioned in advance to use of atomic weapons on the battlefield.

If this country ever has to go to war against the massed manpower of the communists, he would be far wiser to use atomic weapons against the enemy's armies than against his cities," an ordinance expert told the United Press.

Boots Tactical Use  
He did not rule out strategic use of A-bombs against enemy cities and marshalling areas. But he said "our best bet" would be to use the weapon tactically against the enemy in the field.

He said this country should make it clear that it will not permit the most powerful weapon to be "put under wraps, the way gas was, by so-called moral or political or diplomatic considerations."

"It is no more a horror weapon than TNT and certainly is not as terrible as napalm fire bombs," he said.

### Wherry Urges U. S. Buildup Of Air Power

LINCOLN, Neb., Feb. 15 (AP)—To engage Russia in a ground-war because of air-and-munitions plants, oil refineries and communication lines have been destroyed, would be "sheer madness," Sen. Kenneth S. Wherry, R., Neb., said last night.

Air power supported by an invincible navy "is the best insurance against war, and for victory if war comes," the Republican senate floor leader declared.

The speech, in which Wherry reiterated his stand against sending American troops to numbers to Europe, was delivered to a convention banquet of the Nebraska Reclamation association.

Wherry criticized those who say "that we should send a few divisions just to inspire western Europe to defend herself."

"Suppose that during this inspirational effort, Russia would attack. Would these divisions be expendable—just American boys used as cannon fodder?" he asked.

Wherry said a citizen's army of national guards and reservists of 200 divisions can be created and properly trained at a cost not to exceed \$2,500,000,000.

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### First Checks To Be Mailed Vets in April

First checks of a second special insurance dividend for World War I veterans will be ready in April, Arnold H. Helweg, Twin Falls veterans administration officer, reminded veterans Thursday.

Payments in the second dividend will total \$68,000,000 and will be distributed to approximately 8,000,000 veterans who hold national service life insurance policies, Helweg said.

Dividends will be calculated through the anniversary date of the policy in 1941 and payments will be made during the year.

According to Helweg, payments will be made for the three-year period from 1916 to 1923. Policies held in force for three months or more during this period will be eligible for dividends. This applies to both term and permanent policies, including those which have lapsed or were terminated by death, he stated.

As in the first special dividend, the amount of dividend earned by each policy will vary according to the months it was in force, plan of insurance, face value of the policy and age of the insured when the policy became effective, Helweg pointed out.

No application will be required, and veterans are requested not to write the VA regarding this dividend. The dividend cannot be left on deposit at interest.

### Reapportionment Measure Started

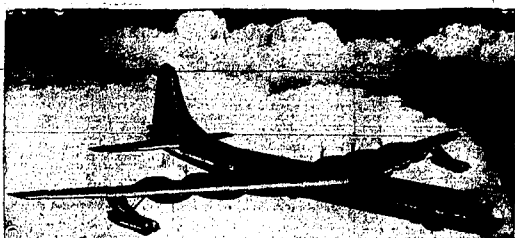
WASHINGTON, Feb. 18 (AP)—A reapportionment bill with teeth in it was introduced Wednesday to guarantee the "fairest practical" representation of all citizens in the houses of representatives.

Sponsored by the administration, the bill was introduced in the house by Representative Celler, D. N. Y. "If it becomes law, not only will the 435 house seats be reapportioned among the states every 10 years, but each state will be required to redistrict according to the population changes. Present laws do not make such redistribution mandatory."

"A large proportion of congressional districts do not presently provide just representation for their citizens," he stated. In six of our states today the variation in population between the largest and smallest districts exceeds 400,000."

Celler said existing legislation is not adequate to correct the situation.

### Vastly Improved B-36 Bomber Still Is Subject of Controversy

By DOUGLAS LARSEN  
WASHINGTON (NEA)—The giant B-36 bomber is the one major weapon which Uncle Sam has which the Russians do not possess.

Over 10 U. S. ground forces could suffer maximum disasters in Asia and Europe, with a contingent world divided into two hostile hemispheres. The B-36 would give the U. S. a striking force capable of hitting Russia to its knees with A-bombs.

The Russians are well aware of this and as a result the giant plane is considered to be a major deterrent to any Russian declaration of war.

Six of the \$47,000,000 bombers have just made the first B-36 mission to Europe, flying from Texas to England, where the air force called "routine landings."

Despite the tremendous advantage that this plane now appears to give to U. S. defense, it continues to be one of the most controversial airplanes ever built. When it was first put on the drawing board in 1941 by Consolidated Aircraft designers it even caused controversy in the army air force. The opposition held that a plane that big just wasn't practical.

In the summer of 1940 the B-36 was the main cause of the open and bitter feud between the air force and navy which inspired a full-dress congressional investigation.

Today, although its critics grudgingly admit that the plane has been improved tremendously in the last couple of years, they

favorably by any airplane the air force has developed.

After the congressional probe into the B-36, an independent weapon system evaluations group was set up to try to determine just whether or not the plane was a turkey. Results of this study are a secret but the air force is now buying an unveiled large number of the bomber, with delivery expected during the next couple of years.

According to air force spokesmen, the B-36 has proved itself so satisfactory in the past few months that it has been some revised thinking on just what big bomber will be developed as the successor to it. There is a program under way to build prototypes of a B-37 which would have the load-carrying ability and range of the B-36, but would have all jet engines and be in the 600-mile-per-hour class.

However, there is consideration being given to modifying the basic B-36 design by adding swept-back wings and using either jets or turbo-prop— a combination of jet and propeller power.

In explaining the amazing size of the monster B-36, the air force points out that a 600-room hotel could be heated by the plane's anti-icing equipment. The volume of the bomber is 18,000 cubic feet, equal to the volume of three average two-room houses. An automobile could go around the world 16 times and then visit every state in the union with the 21,116 gallons of gas which the wing tanks hold.

When the air force reaches its full strength, under present plans, it will have about eight groups of B-36s, with 30 planes to a group. READ TIMES-NEWS WANT ADS.

### Steel Industry in England Becomes Property of Attlee's Labor Regime

LONDON, Feb. 18 (AP)—The British steel industry became government property today. It was the last and most decisive step in a pattern of socialism for the nation's basic industries. A prompt boost in steel prices is in prospect.

The changeover came at a time when the nation is forging new arms for defense against communism. Steel is badly needed for armor, but the full impact of defense orders has not yet been felt in the plants.

The British steel industry, which turned out 12,292,000 tons last year, is the largest in the world outside the United States and Soviet Russia. The United States is producing more than 100,000,000 tons annually. Russia's output is less than half that.

Private ownership of the British plants ended at midnight.

It was a triumph for the Labor party under Prime Minister Attlee's labor government. With the acquisition of steel, the government owns all the nation's basic industrial production.

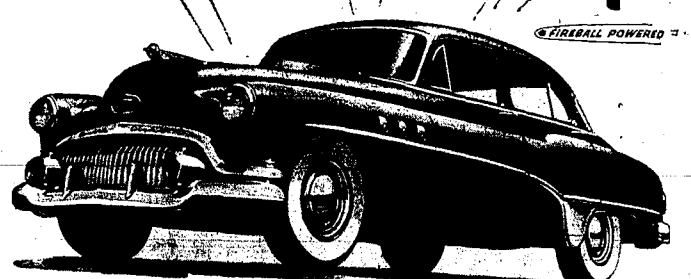

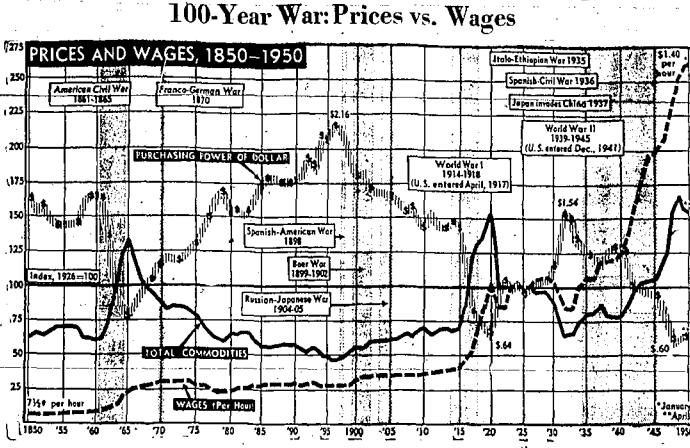

### Stark Drama at Korean First Aid Station Told by Reporter

By JIM MARTENHOFF

AN ADVANCE EVACUATION HASTE, KOREA—The wounded are alert and patient. They sit like statues on the edges of rough cots or slung shakily near the glowing stove. They do not say a word. Doctors and the single nurse move quickly and talk softly in the atmosphere of pain and stillness. Heavy boots walking through the straw on the ground make a swishing sound, over which the hum of warming-up aircraft engines is laid dimly, low, low background music.

A Negro with his arm in a sling searches for a single cigarette in a battered pack. He tries to light it with a safety match. An orderly lights it for him, and slides his own full pack into the Negro's pocket.

A doctor enters. Freshly shaved and clean, he is like a breath of spring in the stuffy tent. He looks at the waiting wounded, the dirty, torn clothes, the mud and the blood stained bandages.

"All right," he says softly. Let's go. He shrugs the plane engines are throttled up to roar. The wounded get up slowly, join others in a

shuffling line. Deft, soul-searing exhaustion weighs their feet.

There is a canteen here, his married arm in a sling. Two Turks scuff along on their feet with their hooded eyes. The Korean patient wears his coat slung over the shoulders of his torn and stained padded uniform.

There are Negroes with bandaged hands and heads. There are boys who are no longer boys except in name. Their wounds are many, and some are fatal. But in their eyes is the same lustreless, soul-chilling look. They are patients in pain.

In the bright, cold sunlight they stumble over the frozen rubble to the giant plane on its mistal runway. Negro, white, Chinese, they shamble along to the landing ramp. There they stop, perhaps through habit of awaiting orders, perhaps because the ramp looks steep and difficult.

The flight nurse comes down and pulls her hand under the arm of the leader. The line starts forward again. A knot of men stand stiffly, quiet, respectful of the wounded. Each perhaps is thinking, "This could happen to me."

The wounded men find seats in the plane. They pull up their blankets. There is a soft sort of music, explanation-of-what-is-to-happen. The plane will take them to comfort, rest, liberty from pain.

### Plan to Pool Army Force

PARIS, Feb. 10 (AP)—Representatives of five European governments including West Germany, are conferring here today on a French-sponsored plan for pooling men, arms, ships and planes in one big European army.

The plan, originated by French Premier Rene Plehien, won the endorsement of Italy yesterday following a three-day French-Italian conference as the latter favors resort of Santa Margherita Ligure.

The united European army would come under one defense minister with a single general staff of officers to command it. The idea is to pool European fighting resources in much the same manner as the Bohemian plan would pool coal and steel.

Available to "the" first assignment for such a force would be to make its armed strength available to Great Britain, D. Eisenhower's Atlantic alliance command. So far individual nations have played Eisenhower only about a dozen divisions.

The nations represented at the conference in addition to France and West Germany are Italy, Belgium and Luxembourg. Five others are invited to join in the plan—Britain, Norway, Denmark, the Netherlands and the United States.

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Germany will have soldiers in the proposed European army, but will not have its own separate military organization or defense ministry.

France brooked the idea of a common command to get the German back into uniform to help fight communist aggression without running the danger of creating a German military machine such as has twice in this century created control of continental Europe.

### Editor Avows Gunfire Gave Eerie Feeling

WALLACE, Ida., Feb. 13 (AP)—It's an eerie feeling, without a doubt, that grips the city streets between one desperate, trapped man and more than a dozen officers.

Particularly when you come up close, as I did, with no thought of such a tragedy in mind, and find the battle taking place next door.

That's what happened shortly before 7 a. m. yesterday. I started to drive up Center street to stop in front of the Press-Times, and found my way barred by a police car. It was the hearing of the pitched gun fight between police and a growler, who already had killed one man and wounded five others.

The police were in second story offices and in stores across the street from the Wallace Supply hardware store, where the man was trapped. They fired out of windows with rifles and machineguns later than you can see in the picture.

I hugged the side of the Press-Times building an entered it to sound out the first bulletin of the story on the Idaho-Utah Associated Press wire. Later I watched the proceedings for while from an office building across the street, from the sidewalk, hugging the wall that the hardware store.

No Escape Effort  
Every time in a while the man would fire out of the building across the street. He made no effort to escape. One time he stepped out of the street thought they saw him lying on the floor in a display window. That wasn't true.

I used a long mirror taken from the washroom in the Press-Times and by holding it out in front of the display window was able to see that what the officers saw was a roll of cloth, not a man.

The hardware store was filled with tear gas and it rolled out through shattered windows in the street. My eyes watered so badly, even standing on the street that I had to get back into the office every few minutes.

No Valentine  
It's seldom a newspaperman can watch a gunbattle out his office window—but the experience is not a valentine.

All that shooting tied up our normal routine. With the gun next door, we couldn't start working until about 10 a. m., 30 minutes late. But we worked hard and got out only 15 minutes late in getting the paper out.

### Committee Okays Project for Navy

WASHINGTON, Feb. 13 (AP)—The senate armed services committee today stamped approval on the navy's multi-billion dollar construction program and authorized it to proceed toward final passage.

Calling for a \$2,740,000,000 build-up in the navy's fleet, the bill provides for a large fleet of submarines and surface ships, including a new type of aircraft carrier big enough to handle atomic bombers.

Meanwhile the senate-house atomic committee met secretly to hold about the bill's progress toward an atomic powered submarine.

The committee's chairman, Senator McMahon, D. Conn., did not disclose details of the report, but he obviously was pleased with it. He told reporters the atomic submarine would be the main forerunner of peacetime uses of atomic energy.

### Senate Ballot Due On GI Insurance

WASHINGTON, Feb. 13 (AP)—The senate was expected to act today on legislation to provide \$10,000 of life insurance for the dependents of the armed services on active duty after June 30, 1950.

If any serious disputes develop, however, a vote will be delayed until next week.

The bill before the senate is an amended version of one already passed by the house. It would provide life insurance coverage for period servicemen and on active duty for 120 days after their discharge to give them time to get commercial insurance.

### Korea War Close to Deadlock As Both Sides Gain and Lose

UP Foreign News Editor  
The Korean war is as close to a deadlock today as it has ever been since the North Koreans warned southward last June.

Given enough time to mass men and tanks on either side can advance at any point, they choose along the battle line. But neither side is able at the moment to make a decisive breakthrough.

The United Nations has superior firepower. The communists have superior manpower.

The two factors are just about cancelling each other out in the day-to-day fighting. That is the reason Gen. Douglas MacArthur said it was "academic" now to decide whether his army was going north of the 38th parallel. Everything is on a day-to-day basis and nobody is quite sure what tomorrow will bring.

A week ago the allies won a battle on the western end of the line. Three days ago the communists, after considerable preparation, threw a hard punch at the center of the U. N. forces.

Each side now has learned almost all the tricks of the other. American and allied troops don't suffer so much any more from communist infiltration tactics. They have learned to advance slower and keep a solid line. Communists have learned not to waste so many men or fall to frontal attacks against strong positions. They now strike less often but harder and pick spots with more care.

The best asset the U. N. army has is its mobility by land, sea and air. It can keep the enemy off balance by such tactics as the landing of the South Korean marines at Wonsan. The U. S. air force can close down the massing of great concentrations of enemy troops. U. N. tank columns can stab into the enemy lines by daylight and pull back at night.

But sooner or later the Chinese communists are able to put together a striking force and throw a punch. If the punch is backed up with enough men, there aren't sufficient U. N. troops in the line to contain it. What happens then is that our line begins to bend as it is doing now in the center.

Neither side can molest the other's vital supply base. Most of the United Nations supplies come in through the southern port of Pusan. The communists haven't enough

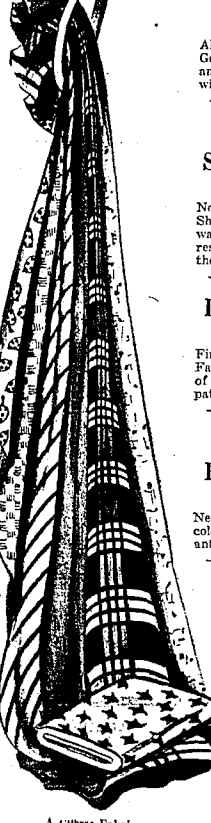

**Service Call Procedure Started Under City Manager Paying Off Now in Study**

The city's service call procedure started in 1958 by the sanitary inspector is being considered.

Smith said these major points are being considered for presentation to the board of city commissioners:

1. Complete revision of the city rubbish and garbage code. Codes from eight other cities have been studied so far and excerpts made of their best points. The new ordinance under consideration will have about twice as many points as the present one.
2. A new pick-up schedule and coverage pattern both for city crew and private collectors, possible removal of cans from streets and alleys except during pick-up hours.
3. Special equipment for pick-up, hauling and disposal. The city already has ordered two modern rubbish vans. Smith said officials feel these two trucks will cover the city much better than present equipment.
4. A heavy duty tractor dozer for the disposal area, to be used in trenching, compacting and covering garbage and rubbish.
5. Selection of one or more sites for sanitary fill areas with regard to location and size. Smith said about two acres per year are adequate for a city this size.
6. Preparation of pick-up regula-

tions and schedules for distribution to all new households.

Smith will spend next Tuesday and Wednesday in Provo and Ogden, Utah, studying the sanitary fill disposal practices in those cities. The method eliminates odors, health hazards and burning.

Heavy equipment is used to dig trenches about six feet deep and 15 to 20 feet wide into which garbage and rubbish trucks dump their loads. Immediately the equipment runs over the material and compacts it. Smith said a track type tractor with a shear blade has been found best for this phase.

Next the tractor dozes earth and covers the trenches to a depth of about two feet. Trenches are dug parallel to each other with dirt from new trenches covering the old ones. The two-foot earth cover lets the area of rats and other rodents.

Under the present system, everything except garbage is dumped on top of the ground and burned. The garbage is sold for hog food. Smith said the sanitary fill method would eliminate the necessity of separating garbage and rubbish at the city dump.

### Sports Model Designed for U.S. by Nash

Introduced as the first American sports car put on the market by an established automobile manufacturer since the mid-20's, the Nash today, a two-passenger, inline engine automobile will go on display at the Chicago automobile show Feb. 17, 18, 19, 20, 21, 22, 23, 24, 25, 26, 27, 28, 29, 30, 31, 1951.

Only 38 inches from the road to the hood top, the sports car has an estimated top speed of 120 miles per hour. The price, to be announced later, is stated to be "substantially higher" than other Nash models.

Engines and major mechanical parts are manufactured by Nash through its subsidiaries built in England by the Donald Healey company. An experimental version of the car was tested among drivers in the 1950 Le Mans, France, Grand Prix, a 24-hour, 2,100-mile racing classic, according to H. C. Dooker, vice-president in charge of sales.

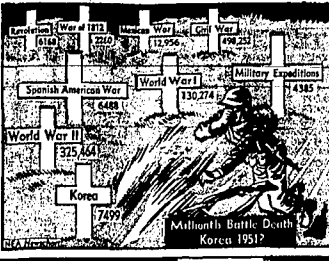
Official in charge of production and sales of the sports model will be limited in 1951 until the market among sports car enthusiasts has been explored.

The Nash Motor Used is powered by the new "dual jet" Ambassador 8-cylinder high compression engine which is rated by company officials at 125 horsepower at 4,000 revolutions per minute. Two thirteen-valve carburetors are used.

The front grill follows the design of the Nash sports car, built back in low level lines. The Healey trailing link, each wheel mounted on a coil spring, is one of the outstanding features of the car designed to provide better control.

Following the court of honor the group went to the high school gymnasium where handcrafts and merit badge work were on display. A basketball game was played between the Volunteers and the Rockets.

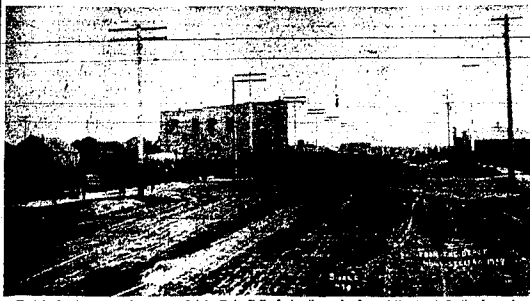

### No Troubles Seen for End Of Sugar Lid

By OVID A. MARTIN  
WASHINGTON, Feb. 15 (AP)—The office of price stabilization's removal of controls on sugar prices should not cause the budget-conscious housewife any worry.

Nothing in the sugar situation would justify a noticeable price advance. On this, both the sugar industry and agriculture department officials have agreed in interviews.

First and foremost, there is no shortage of sugar. In fact, there is so much of it in areas which normally supply the United States that the government must restrict imports lest they depress prices and ruin domestic producers.

Can Boost Imports  
If prices start going up too much, all the government has to do is to increase imports. Prices then turn downward again.

Sugar is one of a few food commodities which have gone up very little in price since start of the Korean war. Wholesale prices are only about a third of a cent a pound higher now than a year ago.

production costs have gone up much more than that since then.  
Less Than CPA Aid  
Sugar also is one of a few food items which still is selling for less than the CPA ceiling of the last year. The industry claims it is one of the cheapest foods available, on a basis of food value.

The agriculture department has been given strong powers by Congress to keep sugar prices from running away or from collapsing. This power was granted because of problems arising from the fact that the country depends upon imports for more than two-thirds of its needs.
