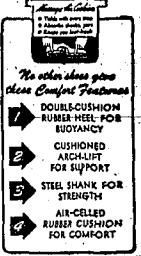

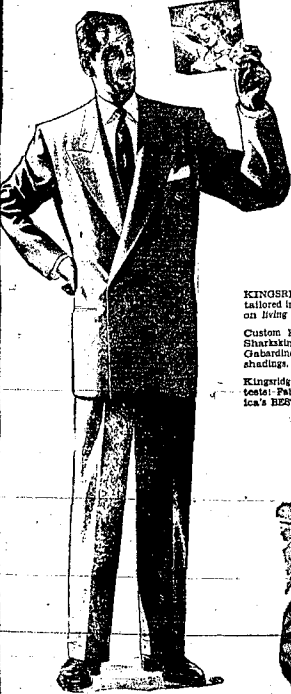

Shortages of Metals Curb Project Jobs

PORTLAND, Feb. 21 (AP)—The shortage of critical materials has curbed many projects under the North Pacific division of the Corps of Engineers. This was the report of Brig. Gen. C. Walsh, division engineer, at a meeting of the Columbia basin interagency committee here.

Walsh said the shortage of steel, aluminum, copper and copper-base alloy in particular has affected projects awarded contracts for the use of such metals.

An effort is being made to complete projects which have deferred aspects at the earliest possible date, he added.

Power Linkup Due
A report from Interior Secretary Chapman indicated that a link of Pacific northwest and California power distributing systems will be completed by Nov. 1, 1952.

Bonneville Administrator Paul J. Sawyer read a copy of a telegram from Chapman to Washington State Rep. Edward E. Henry, asserting objections of the Washington legislators to the link.

This interconnection is to be made by the bureau of reclamation by construction of a 200-kilovolt transmission line from Shasta dam north to Klamath Falls, Ore. where it will be connected with the facilities of the Bonneville power administration being constructed to serve the southern Oregon area, Chapman said.

Needed for Defense
The interconnection was authorized by the defense power administrator "as required in the interests of national defense and to furnish the benefits to both the Pacific northwest and to California areas," he said.

Chapman declared the average annual saving would equal the amount of \$20,000 barrels of oil vital to defense. "The intertie, he added, will firm up 100 alternative sources of power for northwest aluminum plants served on an interruptible basis."

During high-water off-peak secondary hydro energy unusable in the northwest could be sent to California and yield a saving of substantial quantities of oil, Chapman said.

Idaho Teachers Consider Walkout if Economy Drive Hits Funds for Schools

PILER, Feb. 21—Delighted to the Idaho Education association meeting in Caldwell last week decided not to call a strike of teachers in the state in protest over Gov. Len Jordan's economy program, P. L. Williamson, principal of the Piler high school, announced today.

The Piler educator said the proposal was offered on the floor of the meeting but was voted down. The delegates decided that it was up to individual teachers to determine if they wish to renew their contracts for next year if the governor's proposals are approved by the legislature.

The Piler educator said the delegates were astounded by the possibilities resulting from the proposed action. He added that the motion to refuse contracts was supported strongly by delegates from the southeastern part of the state.

The Piler delegates proposed that the legislature pass a sales tax to pay for education in the state. The proposal was not acted upon although some delegates said negotiating states pay for education by direct tax upon all sales.

Delegates to the IEA meeting also passed a resolution to seek a blanket \$500 salary raise for teachers throughout the state in spite of the governor's drive for economy. The

governor's drive for economy. The delegates said the raise is necessary to offset increased living costs.

Upon his return to Piler, Williamson compiled a report on how proposed economy measures would affect Piler schools. He said he was in danger because a minority group is attempting to decrease state and increase local taxes and destroy the retirement program.

Williamson's report said that if state aid to Piler schools is reduced the money will have to be made up through local taxes or salaries and other expenditures reduced. In other words, he said, the state will simply have to pay more for that which they already are receiving.

In his opinion Idaho will lose teachers if the economy drive forces a reduction in salaries and a curtailment of the teacher retirement plan.

In the name of questionable economy, he said, the Republican party in Idaho is being endangered by a minority group.

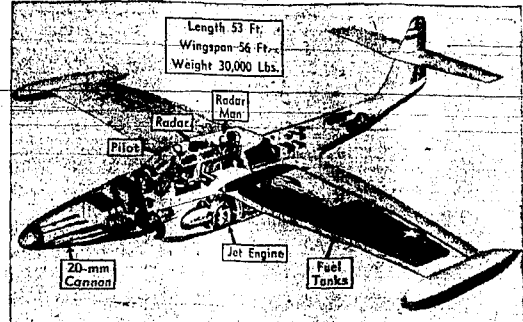

Writer Claims Army Rookies Get Raw Deal

WASHINGTON, Feb. 21 (AP)—What the men and boys should know about the army is that their life goes into the army as getting a raw deal. This is not the army's fault, blame lies with the selfish policies of the navy and air force in grabbing far more than their share of more intelligent young men eligible for military service. The army gets a raw deal because the colored personnel of the army as a whole is inferior stuff. Not all foot soldiers are inferior, but by a long shot. The army is being compelled to accept more of its share of less intelligent men and far more than its share of the more intelligent.

Arrives to Low That means the average of intelligence among the army's enlisted men is too low for the army's safety. Many sergeants and platoon leaders in the army are smart as paint. Yet the army must desert its most commissioned officers from what is available.

After the more able men have been given stripes the army must promote men less able. These men are the leaders of the small units really run the battle over the choosing better. They can save lives or waste lives.

The more and more should know that their side can't have a chance to live under leadership of an inferior sergeant as they would have if the sergeant were smart and on his toes.

Right Word And neither do an army have as good a chance to win battles and wars with inferior men. Inferior is the right word, look. There is nothing called the army general classification list. Top score is around 105. A grade of 70 is so low that congress said none making it should be drafted.

Neither the air force nor navy takes men who score below 80. Thirty per cent of army draftees and 54 per cent of army volunteers score below 80. By a series of skirmishes and dodges the air force and navy are drafting of more than their share of good men, including the college trained.

Fall to Act Defense Secretary George C. Marshall and his manager deputy, Anna M. Rosenberg, kept stop it but so far have failed to do so.
