### N. J. Hospital Guides Way in Plans for "Death-By-Volume"

PERTH AMBOY, N. J.—(NEA)—The Perth Amboy general hospital, says Director Anthony W. Eckert, has learned to expect "death-by-volume." And it hasn't been disappointed. Disasters seem to have a way of happening nearby.

So the hospital's blueprint for disaster—a master plan for handling the killing of patients—is a necessary part of its operation. It is longer than the list of medical patients treated in a year. Its "blueprint" could also be a model for disaster—or even war—plans for other cities.

The wreck of the Pennsylvania Railroad commuter train at neighboring Woodbridge, which killed 87, was just another brush with calamity. The hospital's well-oiled disaster management team will minimize after the train plunged off the embankment.

"Twenty minutes after the crash, the hospital already was putting victims in bed—diagnosed and receiving at least emergency treatment."

"We were ready," says Eckert, "because we did not feel inefficient."

The hospital has built its disaster plan on experience. Since the 1920s, the Perth Amboy has been home to plants making nitrate, explosives and other products. Bombs were common. Last May 19, four munitions barges hit the river, and in July 30, the hospital took one in its stride.

"Key to the plan is the institution's ability to mobilize quickly."

### Ex-GE Research Worker Charged on Red Ledgers

NEWARK, Del., Feb. 22 (UP)—A former General Electric research chemist faced arrest today following his indictment by a federal grand jury for failing to tell the atomic energy commission he once was a Communist party member.

The U. S. marshal's office arrested Dr. Richard Newton Lewis, 36, now assistant chemistry professor at University of Delaware.

A spokesman said he then would be arraigned before U. S. Commissioner Albert F. Park at Wilmington on charges of fraud.

Lewis was indicted yesterday in Albany, N. Y., for failing to state in an AEO security questionnaire in 1948 that he "held membership in the Communist party, U. S. during and between the years 1934 and 1948."

Informed of the indictment, the California-born and educated scientist said, "All my actions have been defensible. I am sure that I will be vindicated."

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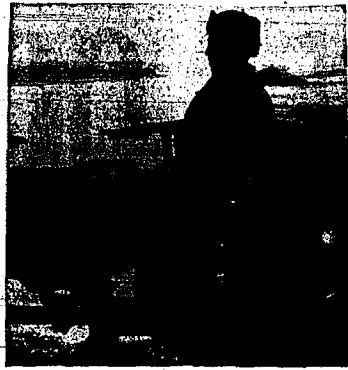

## '50 Crop of Minidoka Project, Upper Snake Valley Valued at \$63,900,173

BOISE, Feb. 22 (Special)—Farmers on the 12-acre Minidoka project and upper Snake river valley area in southern Idaho produced crops valued at \$63,900,173 during 1950, the regional office of the bureau of reclamation announced today upon completing the annual crop report.

Compared with previous years, the 1950 crop value was slightly less than the 1949 total, which was \$67,118,041, but considerably below the 1948 figure of \$83,312,863 and the 1947 gross return of \$93,252,877, which was highest on record.

The report revealed that Snake river farmers realized an average gross per-acre return of \$64.75, as compared with \$67.93 in 1949, \$56.02

in 1948, and \$65.84 in 1947. The latter figure is the all-time high.

In the development covered by the crop census are lands receiving a full or supplemental water supply from irrigation works constructed by the bureau of reclamation.

Wheat brought the highest gross return of all crops grown on the project—\$15,174,311. The per-acre average was \$55.13. Alfalfa has been second with \$12,289,617—a per-acre average of \$44.97. The third highest gross return was brought by potatoes at \$11,545,369. The per-acre average for this crop was \$79.54.

The report revealed that Snake river crops in per-acre returns with a high of \$105.41.

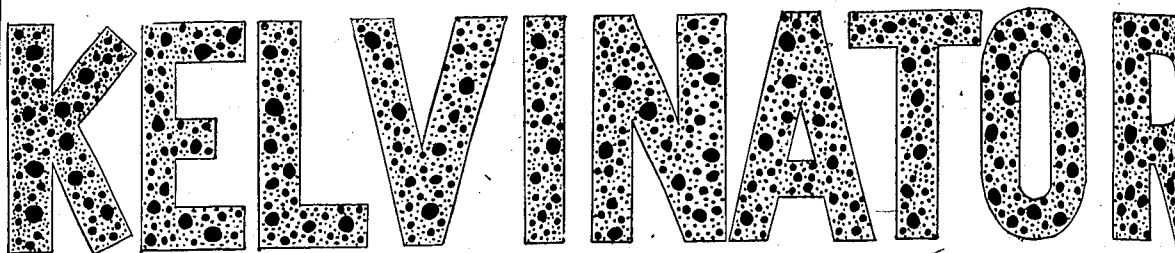

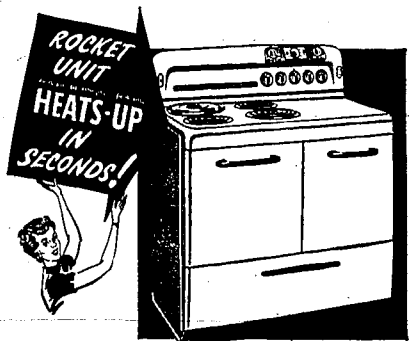

PHILADELPHIA, Feb. 21 (AP)—A 33-year-old woman died Wednesday despite a daring lifesaving attempt by Frankford hospital doctors who pumped her blood in and out of a dead man's kidney.  
 The doctors didn't give up on their technique, though. They continued the experiment was not successful in saving the woman's life because there was too great a lapse of time between the death of the man and the time his kidney was put to work to purify her blood.

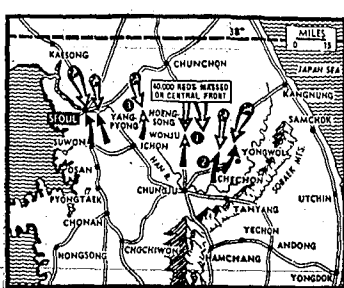

### Prospects on Big 4 Confab Appear Good

By HARRY FERGUSON  
UP Forest News Editor

The prospects seemed fairly good today that sometime soon the United States, Britain, France and Russia would all sit down at the same table and talk about the cold war.

It may be a long time before the big place in Paris on March 5, but that does not mean that bright and early on a Tuesday morning the cold war will begin to waver.

On the contrary, things may get worse before they get better as a result of the conference. That has happened before when Russia and the western powers have held conferences.

For three months the rival sides have been exchanging notes on the possibility of having a meeting of the foreign ministers of the four nations. Things have shaken down now to the point where the western powers have proposed that subsequent to the officials meet in Paris on March 5 to decide what the foreign ministers will talk about and when they get together, Russia seems likely to accept that proposal.

Subsequent to that, once all the hurdles of diplomatic procedure have been cleared and the four foreign ministers are seated at the same table, the conversation is likely to take this turn:

1. Russia will discuss the western powers of trying to start World War II by raising an army to defend western Europe.

2. The western powers will accuse Russia of creating a warlike atmosphere by maintaining a huge army of her own and increasing the armed forces of her European satellites.

Deadlock forecast. If experience is any teacher, the Russians will be up and Russia will give an inch. Nor will the representatives of the United States, Britain and France be in a sitting mood because they have learned that Moscow is too high a price to pay on any concessions she agrees to make.

Neither side wants to be placed in a position of returning to discuss peace for achieving peace. In London, London and Paris decided long ago that little is to be gained by talking with the Russian state department says what it wants peace for achieving peace.

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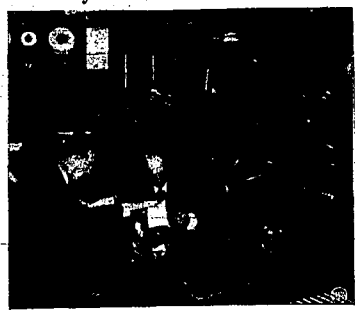

### Expert Advice: To Make Auto Last, Get Check Twice Yearly

By RICHARD KLEINER  
NEW YORK — If Otto Presbrey has his way, auto mechanics will soon be telling you "fill your gas tank twice a week and see your auto doctor twice a year."

Presbrey is the leading disciple of preventive maintenance in caring for autos, buses and trucks. He feels you take your body to a doctor for a check-up, and you won't get sick, and you should do the same for your car.

With the probable slowdown of vehicle production in the emergency, it's more important than ever to keep vehicles in top running condition.

An eager man with a quick wit, Presbrey has done everything in the automotive business from driving racing cars to writing copy for auto ads. He became convinced that too many inexperienced, calling themselves mechanics, were interfering with the nation's vehicles.

So he invented a big gadget made up of a lot of little instruments. It diagnoses a car's ills scientifically. It uses such things as "mag-

netic particle inspection"—which can see the slightest break in material and thus multiplies the rate of change of speed measured in feet per second—which is Presbrey's way of figuring the exact pick-up of a car.

The army is using Presbrey's invention to test some of its equipment. He's been hired by owners of fast fleets and utilities trucks, to keep their vehicles running in top condition. He estimates that proper preventative maintenance can save any vehicle owner 12 1/2 per cent in tire wear, battery and loss of use of the car.

"Waiting until something goes wrong is the expensive way to run a car," says Presbrey. "There you get some mechanic who uses the 'you-may-and-by-golly' method of diagnosis and you may get it fixed and maybe you won't."

If you want to make your car last longer—and he thinks all cars, if preventive maintenance is used, can double the normal trouble-free 35,000 miles—do these:

1. Check the tire pressure at the exact figure—no more, no less.
2. Criss-cross tires every so often, using the spacers.
3. Make sure your wheels are aligned properly.
4. Fill your gas tank often—in the tank mixes with the gas, and air contains moisture which is harmful to the motor.
5. Make sure all battery connections are tight and corrosion-free.
6. Check brakes every 10,000 miles.
7. Have a complete change of grease in the rear and transmission twice a year.
8. Have a chassis lubrication every 5,000 miles.
9. And have a complete check-up twice a year.

BOISE, Feb. 22 (AP)—Sen. Herman Welker, R. Ida., on his first visit home as a U. S. senator, has warned Alaskans against weakening Alaskan defenses through European commitments.

Welker, who had just returned after speaking in Anchorage, Alaska, said in an interview that housing for officers and men in some parts of Alaska is a matter of operations "is pitiful."

He said the No. 1 requirement in the Alaskan theater is "immediate housing and barracks for both single and married personnel."

"I was surprised and amazed of some of the housing for troops in the Alaskan theater, especially many anti-aircraft buildings which are built on a hillside, quarters, kitchen and other buildings from junk lumber, discarded boxes and scraps."

"Buildings were heated with a single stove and there was no radiation," Senator Welker added.

"At Anchorage, he said, some families 'actually pay \$100 a month for houses we wouldn't use here for chicken coops.'"

The Idaho senator, however, had praise for the theater command. He commended the men for the credit for the good morale of the troops there.

Welker said it was imperative that the Alaskan defenses not be weakened "by diverting attention to a land army in Europe. Excluding other Republican leaders, he remarked, 'I want to see the United States cooperate with our allies in Europe before we send our troops overseas.'"

"I can't forget how General Eisenhower was met by tens of thousands of communists who jeered him."

He continued "if we commit land forces to Europe what will happen to our land forces in Korea and to the land forces in Alaska which are mainly in our first line of defense?"

Commenting that the European problem was "not an easy decision," Welker added that during his brief visit to Idaho he wanted to get "the thinking of my people here."

### Yost Says Order Will Help Block Meat Diversion

BOISE, Feb. 22 (AP)—Harry L. Yost, Idaho district director of the office of price stabilization, said yesterday the recent OPI livestock and meat distribution order will help prevent diversion of the normal meat distribution channels.

He said that during World War II there was considerable production and distribution of meat to the regular meat-packing and meat distributing industry, which caused shortages in some areas of an abundance in others.

The new order restricts slaughtering of those engaged in the business from Jan. 1, 1950, to Feb. 9, 1951. The regulation does not apply to farmers or livestock raisers slaughtering less than 6,000 pounds per year, Yost said.

He said authority is expected soon for appointment of a meat price specialist on the Boise district OPI staff.

### Idaho Road Aid Funds Allocated

WASHINGTON, Feb. 22 (AP)—The public road bureau has told Senator Dworshak \$100,000 has been allocated for improvement of the road to the Blackbird mill near Challis, Ida.

The bureau also said \$10,000 has been allocated to help the state in keeping the road to the Bradley millinery mine at 65 miles free of snow.

Dworshak told a reporter both projects are intended to encourage production of minerals critically needed in the defense effort. The Blackbird mine, operated by the Calera Mining company, produces cobalt.

The Blackbird road will extend 46 miles from eight miles north of Challis on U. S. Highway 43 to the mill. Plans are to widen and surface existing county and forest roads rather than build a new road.

## Washington No Plaster Saint, Nor Did He Really Cut Tree—He Was All Man

WASHINGTON, Feb. 22 (AP)—He was a big, reddish haired man with a flaming temper that he made himself control.

He didn't laugh much. In his later years, especially, he wore a stern stiffness as a kind of protective shell. Sometimes the shell cracked, and a blending of kindness and wry humor shone through.

This man liked his clothes. He was something of a dandy. He drank what he felt like drinking, cut a fancy figure on a dance floor, liked to have pretty women around him. He was a shrewd card player. He sat down frequently to friendly little games and he usually won.

He had his weaknesses—a touch of vanity, a short supply of patience, a winning sensitivity to criticism.

But Lord, the strength he had! He led and guided and sometimes seemed to haul a half-asleep, tape-muffit army to victory in a war he often despised or winning.

Then, more than any other man, he welded 13 jealous and squabbling colonies into a nation... guided and bewildered people out of an economic wilderness... laid the foundation of what a later President has called "the greatest republic the sun ever shone on."

He was a great man, George Washington. But first of all, he was a man. We sometimes forget that as we hang out the flag on his birthday.

We've been schooled—and "schooled" is exactly what I mean here—to think of Washington as some sort of marble statue, of placid, dignified, too perfect to be human, too lifeless to have lived.

That's the impression I got in my school days, anyhow. And the result was just the opposite of what my teachers must have intended. I didn't like Washington. I thought he was a stuffed shirt. And I think it was that confounded cherry tree story that did it.

Maybe you mumbled over that story, here when you were in—oh, about in the fourth grade. Here was the family cherry tree, chopped down. Here was young Washington's father, looking at the

tree, madder than blazes. And here came little George out of the bushes, chirruping.

"Father, I cannot tell a lie. I did it with my little hatchet."

Now of course I knew that was what people of George. I knew that was what any right minded little boy should do. But I had my own opinion of little George for doing it.

I knew darned well I couldn't have done it and none of the kids in our class could have done it. We'd have been scared to death. We'd have stayed in the bushes, trembling, and when we finally had to come out, we'd have sworn uphill and down that we saw Woodpeckers gnawing into that cherry tree.

By now, I suppose, everybody knows the cherry tree story is nothing but a yarn made up by an old faker called Parson Weems to help sell a book he wrote. I hope they don't teach it in the schools any more. It can't really be good for kids to grow up with the idea

### Extinct Bird Said Located Alive on Isle

NEW YORK, Feb. 23.—An oceanic bird believed to have been extinct for more than 300 years, has been found alive and in considerable numbers on one of the Bermuda islands.

The discovery was announced by Dr. Robert Cushman Murphy, chairman of the department of birds at the American museum of natural history.

Murphy said the bird is known as the Bermudian cshaw, which is about the size of a pigeon, but possesses longer wings and is iridescent brown on top and has a white underbelly. The bird also has a curved black beak and its eyes are ringed by black feathers.

According to Murphy, scientists had believed this cshaw became extinct in 1625 because of a famine among a group of settlers on Cooper's Island, one of the Bermudas. In that year, the settlers caught the cshaw and ate them. They also looted the birds' nests and ate the eggs.

The search for the "extinct" cshaw was made by Murphy, Louis F. Howarth, curator of the Bermuda aquarium, David H. Wisnagel, and Mrs. Murphy. The group captured five live cshaws and counted at least 17 burrows in rocky crevices where this cshaw nests.

The museum scientists did not bring the birds back. They were photographed and their presence after being banded with U. S. fish and wildlife service rings.

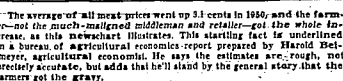
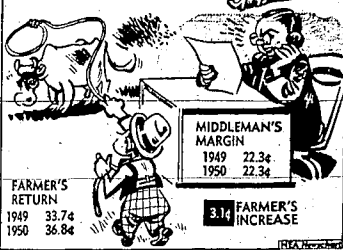
Murphy said one of the most distinctive traits known about the cshaw is its honing distinct. The birds, he said, can find their way back to their nests on land after flying hundreds of miles or more out to sea in search of food.

London papers for sale here tell of the minute meat ration—and how—almost—everyone with a shovelful of rice is taking up poaching to bag a rabbit for the family table.

The Munich restaurateurs have menus which would make the mouth of Englishmen-water-for-an-hour. Such soups as Leberknedelstuppe, Schinkenodstuppe, and Speckknodstuppe—clear and filled with dumplings of liver, finely chopped ham or bacon.

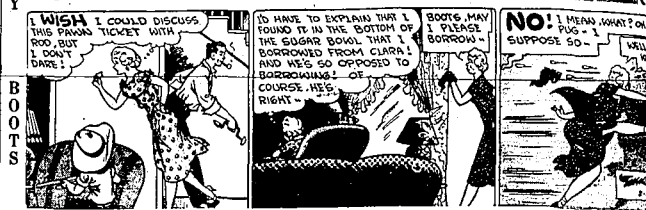
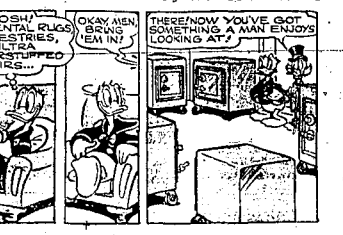

By HAL BOYLE NEW YORK—Coming back from Korea today is a disturbing adventure. It is a voyage from an uneasy war to a uneasy peace. The soldier there in less than a year in the civilian life here.



That is a startling first impression to one returning to the United States after more than half a year in the far east war theater. When you are in a battle area, home becomes a shining goal. 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### Polio Getting More Rare, Doctor Says

**By HOWARD W. BLANKLEE**  
 AP Wire Service  
 CHAPEL HILL, N. C., Feb. 22.—Polio is becoming more rare and that may be why epidemics are larger, why more adults get it, why there is more paralysis of victims and why more of them die.

This paradoxical possibility was explained by Dr. Edward C. McCavaran, dean of the school of public health, University of North Carolina. It is based on the probability that formerly almost everyone at some time had a mild polio attack, and that a larger and larger number of us escape the mild form today.

Name is Hiss.

So many escape that polio really may be rare by comparison. This theory, infantile paralysis, Dr. McCavaran said, comes from the fact that originally this disease attacked infants. It was then so common that it was almost a part of life.

Polio, he said, has gone the same way as many other infant and child diseases, and no longer is so common.

The mild cases apparently conferred lifelong immunity, and nearly everyone was immunized in early life.

Not immune.

Now, not so many of us are immune. And if that is true, Dr. McCavaran says, it explains the increase among adults. More children also are getting polio for the same reason.

Why there should be more paralysis and more deaths, Dr. McCavaran is not certain, but he may be explained readily if polio is like most other diseases. Each disease is likely to do more harm to some special group than to other ages.

Dr. McCavaran says it may be that paralysis is worse when polio hits older ages and polio may be more often fatal in older persons than it is in infants.

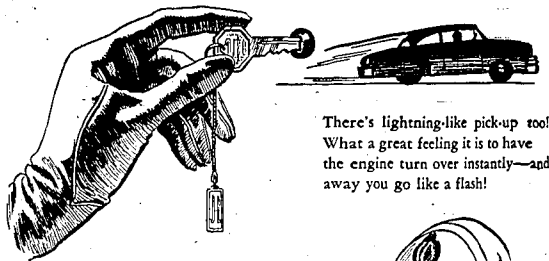

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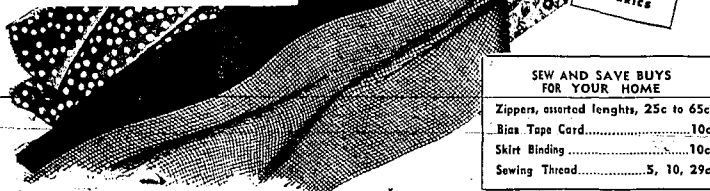
