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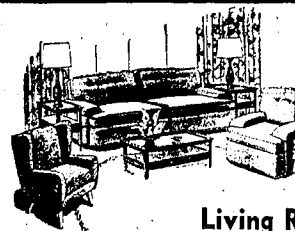

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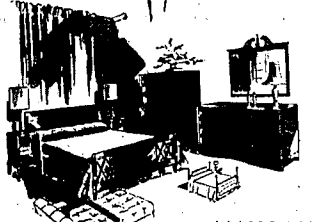

She is the wife of Herbert Biberman, recently released after serving a six month sentence for refusing to tell the committee whether he had ever been a communist. He is one of the so-called "Hollywood 10."

Also subpoenaed for the Washington hearing is Walter Salt, writer and chairman of the "Committee to Free the Hollywood 10."

### Packers Hurt By Spokane's Beef Boycott

SPokane, March 1 (AP)—More than 200 packing-house workers have been discharged in recent days because of a housewives' boycott on beef at present high prices. Spokane packers reported.

Demand Slow

Housewives have shifted their purchases from beef to pork and poultry, butchers reported, with a resulting increase in chicken prices.

Order Slow Sales

Russell Chisler, manager of the Old Union stockyards, said the demand for beef products began slowing down when the government announced its price stabilization order.

Also, packers say cattlemen have shown little inclination to sell their livestock since prices were frozen at the packinghouse level. They are keeping their beef "on the hoof" rather than sending it to packing.

VANCOUVER, B. C., March 1 (AP)—The mystery shrouded legendary "Lost Creek mine" may have claimed its 21st victim.

A young Canadian mountie and guide have started out to hunt for Alfred Caspard, 60-year-old prospector—who disappeared seven months ago in his search for the fabulous gold mine in the rugged upper reaches of the Pitt river, 45 miles north of here.

20 Failed to Return

The story goes that 20 other men have hunted the mine's treasure during the last half century. None returned.

Caspard was flown to the Pitt lake headquarters last July. Two weeks later a second plane dropped him about 400 pounds of food—enough to last a bush-wise prospector about one month.

Caspard's friends said he long had been fascinated by tales of the lost mine, which was reportedly discovered by an Indian in 1860.

Fortune Brought Out

The Indian, Blumach, brought out a fortune in gold from several trips to the mine. On each trip he took an Indian woman with him, but none of them came out.

He died on the gallows in 1892 at New Westminster, B. C., after confessing the murders of eight women. The secret of the mine died with him.

**Bidault Asked To Head New Ruling Group**

PARIS, March 1 (AP)—President Vincent Auriol called on former Premier Bidault today to try to form a new French governing council.

Auriol tapped the suave, experienced politician for the job after René Fλεoren, who quit with his coalition cabinet yesterday in a dispute over a new election law, had stepped down on offer to try again.

Bidault was France's first post-war foreign minister and was premier twice for five months in 1948, and again from October, 1949, to June, 1950. He said he would confer with leaders of other parties to see if he stood any chance of forming a new cabinet. He is a leader of the Catholic popular republican movement, (CNRP).

Union Cabinet  
Earlier reports said Auriol had in mind the possible formation of an all-party national union cabinet to pave the way for elections next June.

The elections are scheduled now for next autumn, but Auriol was said to be planning to ask parliament to move up the date.

Dominic Guillaud, minister of the small peasant party said after conferring with Auriol, "We believe a government of national coalition (including in all parties) would permit rapid electoral reform and a return to the voters in June. The president seemed pretty much in agreement with that."

Backs Amendment  
A bloc headed by Vincent De Moro-Clairfont backed a constitutional amendment in parliament to let the voters decide for themselves on the country's electoral system.

The new proposal would let the voters decide whether their next parliament would be chosen on a personal candidacy basis or by proportional representation and whether the election would be only a single ballot or would include a runoff.

**Japs Cheered By U. S. Help In Isle Claim**

TOKYO, March 1 (AP)—The Japanese were cheered up today by news that the United States would support their claims to a tiny group of islands off the northeast coast of Japan.

The islands—the Bonabon group—have been controlled by Russia since the end of World War II.

Special Ambassador John Foster Dulles told a Washington news conference yesterday the Russian seizure of the isles was improper.

At the same time Dulles said the U. S. might refuse to recognize Russian control of the Kurile Islands and the southern half of Sakhalin Islands, both formerly part of Japan's empire.

First Indication  
The Dulles announcement was the first indication that the Japanese might get powerful support in their claims to regain the territory lost at the end of the war. It was not clear, however, that the U. S. would go beyond withholding formal recognition of the already accomplished Russian control over the Kuriles and Sakhalin.

The Soviet union hardly would be expected to relinquish its control under U. S. pressure short, actual or threatened conflict.

Accords Recalled  
The big three—U. S., Britain and Russia—agreed at Yalta early in 1945 that the Kuriles and southern Sakhalin should be handed over to Russia. Later, at Potsdam, the U. S., China and Britain agreed to limit Japanese sovereignty to the four main islands and such minor islands as we determine.

The Bonabon Islands apparently will be considered under this latter provision.

### King Right Guy, Real Likeable Chap, Rover Boy Hank Avows

ROME—I met my first king last night.  
No congressman on election eve was more democratic or friendly. He shook my hand, embraced me, served me his food, asked for my autograph and, in a most friendly, did a solo performance in his honor.  
This Jiggling Monarch of 70 years of age was Alfredo, the first king of the new year, who, in Italian "il vero re delle Fiebres."  
His "palace" is a sparkling new restaurant on the Plaza Augusto Imperatore, and his history as a king, particularly during the last year, is filled with enough intrigue to have delighted the heart of a Boris.  
Briefly, this is King Alfredo's story.  
In 1925 Alfredo, an unknown chef then, opened a small restaurant on the Alla Scrofa, and in a few years it was world famous, due to Alfredo's genius at preparing fettucine, which is noodles with a cheese and butter sauce. The walls were lined with autographs of the world's mighty who had sought out the tiny restaurant on the mean little street.  
Fettucine is as old as the Tiber, but Alfredo's mixing of the dish transformed the flour, egg and water into something fit for the gods. In 1927 George Reitor, in an article in the Saturday Evening Post, hailed Alfredo as a master worthy to stand alongside the geniuses of art, literature and music.  
Douglas Fairbanks and Mary Pickford presented him with a golden fork and spoon with which to mix and serve his noodles. Inscribed on the handles is a tribute to "Alfredo, king of the noodles."  
The money rolled in through the years and Alfredo's restaurant grew in proportion. By 1943 he had all the lire he could ever spend and a set of monochicles that required more and more care.  
When war raged in Rome it was impossible for him to get the flour, eggs and butter he needed to make his famous dish, he sold his stock and barrel to two of his faithful old waiters, and retired. He gave them his papers, his guest books, his recipe, his belongings—everything except the golden fork and spoon.  
A year ago Alfredo, outraged by hearing that the men who had bought him out were styling themselves as "king of the noodles," for-

got all about his abdication vows and went back into business.  
Then the intrigue started.  
King Alfredo claims the man who bought him out pay cab drivers 100 lire for each tourist brought to their place. The waiters claim Alfredo's price for the same service is 150 lire.  
Visitors to the original restaurant Alla Scrofa who ask for Alfredo are sometimes told that he is dead, sometimes that he is ill, but always that the present owners are his sons, who learned his secret at his knees.  
King Alfredo (all this was concocted to me while we dined last night) claims that the "rascals," as he calls them, even have bought a golden spoon and fork and pawn them off as the precious Fairbanks cutlery.  
He also exhibits a callous in the palm of one hand and a callosus on the finger of the other as proof that he has been mixing fettucine for upwards of half a century. "These rascals who bought me out, and who claim the title of king, have no calluses. Proof positive they haven't been mixing fettucine long enough to know anything."  
To make the whole thing all the more confusing there are three more restaurants in Rome working under the name of Alfredo. They too claim to be the only master noodle fixers in the world.  
I, for one, am convinced that Alfredo of the 70 years and the mighty monochicles is the true king. He is superb when, with a flourish of the Fairbanks outfit, he mixes the noodles at your table. He is dazzling when, with the lights out,

### Organized Gambling Is Nation's No. 1 Business, Figures of Probers Indicate

WASHINGTON, March 16—If organized gambling is taking in \$20,000,000 a year in this country, the American people are putting more into bets than they are into clothing and shoes.  
Furthermore, gambling outlays of that size are considerably larger than total retail expenditures for food and drink.  
The senate crime committee reported the whopping gambling figure in a report issued yesterday, but it didn't itemize or make clear just how it arrived at its estimate of what it was counting in the total.  
"In all," the report said, "conservatively, that \$20,000,000 changes hands every year in the United States as a result of organized, illegal gambling."  
Committee staff sources expressed doubt that the report was "double counting"—that is, counting money once when taken in on bets and counting it again when paid out to winners and taking care of operating expenses.  
One staff member suggested that it was comparable to a merchant's sales or turnover—which would mean gross intake from the standpoint of a slot machine operator or horse race bookmaker, or total bet from the public's standpoint.  
Staff members acknowledged the estimate necessarily had to be a "best guess," dealing as it did with cash transactions of a nature more to be concealed than revealed by precise record keeping.  
In anybody's language, \$20,000,000 a year is big money. Here's how it stacks up with commerce department figures on other consumer outlays, which means total amounts spent on retail purchases:  
Overall consumer spending—\$41.2 billion a year, a record \$185,800,000,000 a year.  
Outlays on autos and parts—\$12,800,000,000 a year; on gas and oil, \$5,300,000,000.  
Furniture and other household effects—\$1,100,000,000.  
Clothing and shoes—\$19,400,000,000.  
Tobacco—\$4,500,000,000.  
Food and drink, including liquor, beer, wine, etc.—\$21,100,000,000.  
A \$20,000,000-a-year "gambling bill" would dwarf the aggregate prices of all horses bought in a year, which latest federal reserve board data place at \$11,200,000,000 in 1942.  
"Nevertheless, it's big money," 1000 President Truman figures to get out of individual income taxes at present levels, \$21,200,000,000 for next fiscal year, \$20,025,000,000 for next.

WASHINGTON, March 1 (AP)—  
A newly discovered "baby planet" is  
racing through space in an erratic  
flight that may bring it as close as  
the moon to the earth, its discov-  
erers report.  
Dr. William Markowitz, 44-year-  
old naval observatory astronomer,  
said, however, the chance of its  
actually colliding with the moon  
is "unfathomable."

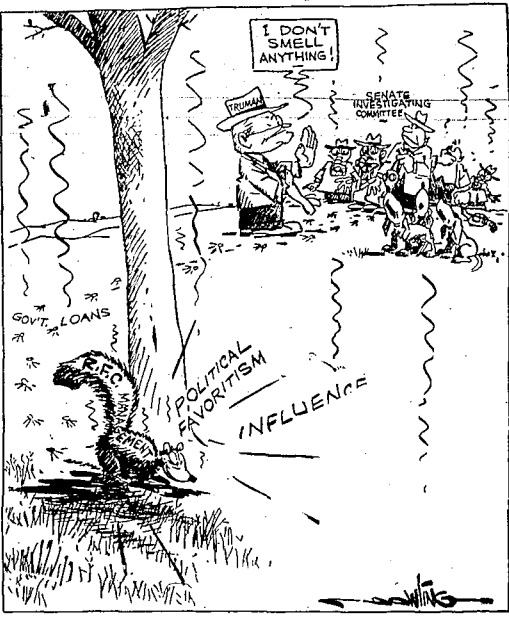

The noted educator said his proposals were designed in the belief that "the American republic will endure as long as the ideas of the men who founded it continue dominant."

Here are the 10:  
"1. You shall address to the republican form of government."  
"2. You shall keep the system of checks and balances in government inviolable, allowing no one branch to encroach upon another."  
"3. Remember always that a republic is a government by law and not by men."  
"4. You shall delegate to innocuous desuetude (Gazette editions) any politician who seeks to ride into office on waves of hate and suspicion for the casual and unwise that constitutes us one people is the palladium of our liberty, happiness, safety and prosperity."  
"5. You shall not permit any organized faction or minority group to put its will in place of the will of the nation."  
"6. You shall keep the spirit and practice of discussion alive."  
"7. You shall preserve a sound economic structure."  
"8. You shall cultivate cooperative peace and harmony with all nations."  
"9. You shall promote education."  
"10. You shall maintain the spiritual foundations of the republic."

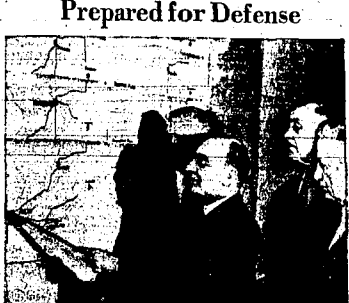

**Small Towns Have Big Job in Atomic Age Defense Planning**

CHICAGO (NEA)—For the first time in home front defense, the atomic age has given the small town a role of major importance.

That is the conclusion of Maj. Lenox Lohr, a bush-horned, balding man who was general manager of Chicago's World's Fair and is now director of Illinois civil defense.

Illinois also has an elaborate civil defense set-up, with headquarters in the state capital, Springfield, and a museum of science and industry in Urbana. More than a dozen highly trained people are on full-time call, including a retired four-star admiral, two engineers, a communications expert, an expert on the telephone company, and a doctor who is an expert on the state's radio.

The program is called civil defense, rather than civilian defense as it was called in 1941. It was planned, because the aim is to keep the city production going after an atomic attack. He outlines the civil defense role for people in smaller cities (50,000 to 100,000).

1. They must keep the highways open so that rescue teams can get to the big cities and the injured can come out.
2. Non-rural cities must be prepared to participate in mutual aid and mobile support, which means training, organized, highly mobile rescue and relief teams must be ready to speed to disaster areas at the first call of state disaster.
3. Small towns must be prepared to help big cities and the injured can come out.

**Mass Production of New Missiles To Start at Once**

SAN DIEGO, Calif., March 1 (AP)—First American mass production of one of war's newest weapons—radio-guided flying missiles that travel faster than sound—will get underway immediately.

This was disclosed here today by Consolidated Vultee Aircraft Corporation, which announced it was opening a production plant tomorrow.

The first production, Consolidated Vultee said, will be a special anti-aircraft missile for the navy.

Exact location of the plant was an official secret but many officers in Washington said workers were being recruited there and it was presumably in this area.

About 1,500 workers will be employed at the plant, which will occupy 200,000 square feet of space.

Consolidated Vultee announced that it was setting up a separate manufacturing division for missile production.

**Ceilings Placed On Coal Exports**

WASHINGTON, March 1 (AP)—The office of price stabilization has put ceilings on coal exports overseas.

These ceilings, effective today, limit the exporter's "margin" between what the coal costs him, delivered to the ship, and what he sells it for. The ceilings are 40 cents a ton, if the exporter is also the producer of the coal, or his sales agent; 60 cents a ton, if the exporter buys and resells the coal for his own account.

**Experts Say Truman Can Run For Senate While in Office**

WASHINGTON, March 1 (AP)—Congressional experts gave an optimistic opinion yesterday that President Truman has a legal point to run for his old senate seat in 1952 if he withers—even though he still is President then.

They dug into the question after rumors cropped out that Mr. Truman would like to return to the senate at the end of his present term in the White House.

So far as they can find, the President would be shattering precedent—but he would be acting within his legal rights to run for the senate before giving up the presidency.

These experts—who work with members of congress—said their names not be used. But they noted that Warren G. Harding ran for the presidency while still a member of the senate. Harding won the election in 1920 and resigned from the senate to enter the White House.

Why, the experts ask, couldn't this situation be reversed?

Two presidents have left the chief executive's office and later returned to congress. But neither of them ran for office while still President.

John Quincy Adams was elected President by a vote of the house in 1827. He failed to win reelection in 1829—but he came back to congress in 1831 and served eight terms.

Then Andrew Johnson went into the White House after the assassination of President Lincoln. He was beaten for the nomination at the next GOP convention but he was elected to the senate in 1875.

What would happen if Mr. Truman ran for the senate and was elected?

One expert noted that a senator's term expires Jan. 3 while the president does not leave office until Jan. 20.

"He could serve out his term as President," this source said, "and then take the oath of office in the senate. Or he could resign as President and give Vice President Barkley the honor of serving as chief executive during the period from Jan. 3 to Jan. 20."

"What does Mr. Truman say about it?" he hasn't said.

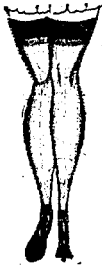

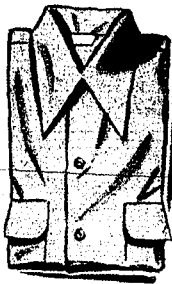
