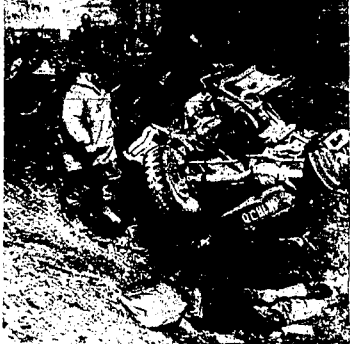

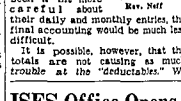
Senators Plan Campaign on Deadly Weed

Three projects account for the most of the large increase—a commercial building valued at \$240,000 and two housing projects estimated to cost \$185,000. They will provide 14 one-family dwellings.

During the month a total of 20 permits was approved for new homes valued at \$191,000 while 11 permits for residential alterations estimated to cost \$220 were passed by the commission. Permits for garages added \$100 to the total.

Three permits were filed for new commercial buildings for a total of \$248,000. Five permits for commercial repairs amounted to \$2,000.

During the past week permits were filed for construction estimated to cost \$141,000.

March's first permit was filed by Nelson Anderson, 1377 Sherman, who plans to build a one-family, 28- by 32-foot frame dwelling at 233 Hubbard avenue west. Cost of the house is estimated at \$7,000.

E. W. Christopherson, 1216 Fourth avenue east, applied for a permit to remodel a kitchen and bathroom at his home at a cost of \$300.

A \$5,000 building permit application for repairs to a business building at 118 Main avenue north was filed Saturday by the Singer Sewing Machine company. The company plans to erect a new front on the building and remodel the interior. Brennan and Cannon Construction company has the contract for the work.

emergency the nursing situation can be met with a minimum of confusion, she points out.

In event of an emergency, nursing service would have to be provided for five or six of the civil defense medical department sections. Nurses would be placed where their particular skills are necessary for prompt, efficient service.

According to Mrs. Wirsching there are about 100 registered and graduate nurses in Twin Falls. Bohi, Piller, Kimberley and Jerome. Of that number 84 are on active or partially active basis as general duty, private duty, office and public health nurses plus those who recently began their Red Cross teaching.

This leaves 17 on an inactive basis. There are also about 30 licensed practical nurses in the area, most of them active. Mrs. Wirsching says a satisfactory count of Red Cross nurses since hasn't been made but the number is few and none is active as yet.

The U. S. department of labor has placed nursing on the list of critical occupations. Allocation of nursing service to provide for military and civil defense is of vital concern to national security, Mrs. Wirsching points out.

A joint committee, dealing with nursing in national security and composed of representatives of the six big nursing organizations, has outlined policies for distribution of essential nursing service, where it will do the most good.

Plans for coordination of the program are concerned with recruiting more nursing school students, training practical nurses, encouraging retired nurses to active duty and utilizing nursing skills to the fullest extent.

### Chamber Members Discuss Program and Contribution to Community's Welfare

Business of the Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce and how it contributes to the economic and social welfare of the whole community was the theme of the organization's first general membership meeting of the year, Friday noon at the American Legion hall.

Howard Moffat, secretary-manager, in his first report to the general membership, told 37 members the aims of the chamber must be geared to the social and economic condition of times. He said that if Twin Falls is to be the "Hub of Magic Valley" the Chamber of Commerce must make it such.

He said members should have full realization of the part the Twin Falls chamber has played in bringing about the new highway program in Idaho. Since it was first introduced 12 years ago "the whole thing has come about by the efforts of the chamber," he said.



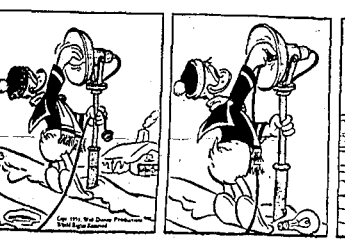

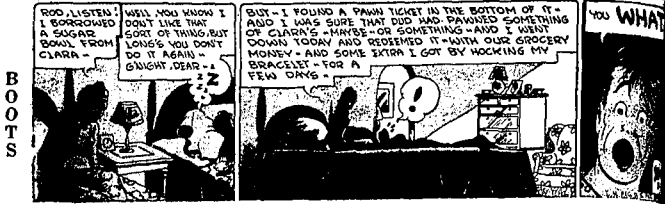
