## Wool Output For Idaho at All-Time Low

BOISE, March 5 (AP)—Idaho's 1950 wool production is the smallest on record going back to 1909, the U. S. Department of Agriculture has reported.

The 1950 clip was 840,000 pounds, compared with 8,600,000 pounds in 1949.

The department said the fleece weights averaged 19 pounds, tied with the 1949 record high. There were 940,000 sheep shorn in 1950 compared with 1,000,000 in 1949.

Wool prices averaged 82 cents a pound, the second highest on record. The price was exceeded only on the 58 cents per pound in 1918.

Idaho wool production has declined nearly every year since 1928 when 18,850,000 pounds of wool were shorn to the state.

The department said the industry's cash income during 1950 totaled \$4,850,000 compared with \$4,410,000 in 1949 when the clip was sold at an average of 46 cents a pound.

## 9 Little Indians Have Bad Time, 7 Return Home

SALT LAKE CITY, March 5 (AP)—Nine not-so-little Indians from Utah's San Juan county came to Salt Lake City to enlist in the army. But when the sometimes confused situation that resulted was finally cleared up there were only two.

Capt. Simpson I. Billington, chief induction officer at the army and air force recruiting station at Ft. Douglas, gave the details.

Only two of the nine Indians could speak English. One of the army men—Washoe—couldn't understand the native language of the other eight. They were Navaho.

Finally, Ralph Evans of the city purchasing department, with his force recruiting station at Ft. Douglas, gave the details.

Two Indians flunked out by the physical examination; five flunked out by the English mental examination; two enrolled in Uncle Sam's military service.

The civil aeronautics board has scheduled a hearing June 13 at Washington, D. C., on renewal of the certificate. Also to be considered there is Empire's request to extend service to Seattle and Portland and intermediate points in Washington and Oregon.

Atty.-Gen. Robert E. Smyle petitioned the CAB to permit the state to intervene. He said "Empire is furnishing a service which the state cannot now afford to lose."

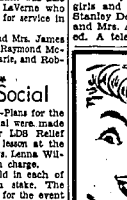

That long-awaited bill to increase the cost of hunting and fishing licenses in Idaho finally was introduced in the house of representatives Saturday after sitting around in committee for two months. The bill stands now, a hike of 50 cents is asked on individual licenses and \$1 for the combination license. The combined hunting and fishing license would cost \$4 and individual hunting and fishing licenses would sell for \$2.50 each. The non-resident fishing license has been hiked \$3 to \$5.

There's little doubt the bill will pass in the present session. Politically, legislators are attempting to please everyone, at the same time trying to meet revenue to offset our ever-growing wildlife programs.

Along the same line, a bill calling for the reinstatement of special big game hunts has passed the house of the legislature and awaits the signature of the governor.

The bill provides that the game would call for hunting and fishing licenses to expire on Dec. 31 of every third year in the state of Idaho.

With their double loss of last week-end, the Farmers from Utah will be looking for a double-double as the Colorado A and B teams.

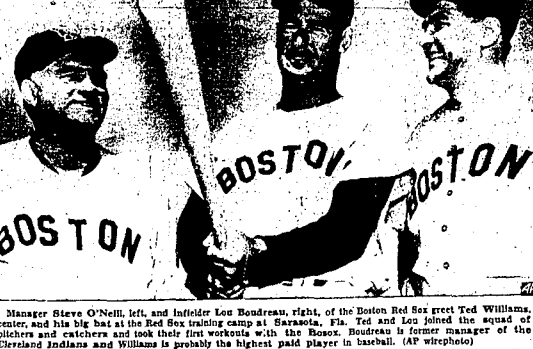
**Sun Valley Aces Sweep Titles in National Events**

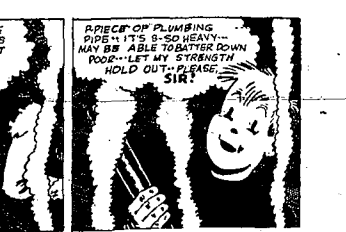

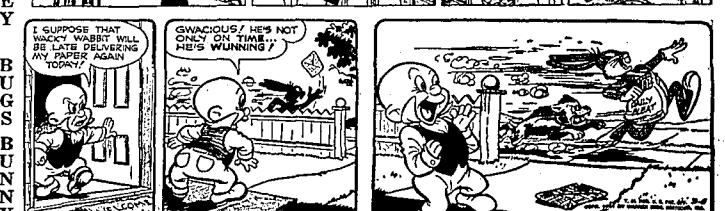
