Man Survived 'Deep Freeze'

WOONSOCKET, R. I., March 12 (AP)—The story of a man who survived after being frozen to a body temperature of degrees—four degrees below zero—has been repeated by Woonsocket hospital.

A spokesman said that on Dec. 10, 1942, 63-year-old Arthur Roy was admitted with a body temperature of 50 degrees, and was discharged 28 days later without any limbs having been amputated.

There is no case in medical records of anyone surviving such a low body temperature. Normal body heat is 98.6 degrees.

Mrs. Dorothy Mae Stevens, 33, Chicago's "deep freeze" woman, was frozen for legs in an alley last Feb. 4. Two days ago surgeons amputated her legs nine inches below the knees so that she might live.

Woonsocket hospital authorities said Roy, now a patient at a state (federal) hospital, also was frozen stiff when he was brought into the hospital. They said he apparently had been drunk when he fell on a driveway at a shop where he was

Provisions of Bill for UMT Are Clarified

WASHINGTON, March 12 (AP)—Here are the major provisions of the universal military training and service bill passed by the senate and sent to the house.

Draft—Local boards could draft 18-year-olds after exhausting pool of eligibles in the 19 through 24 age group. Those closest to their 18th birthday would be taken first.

Length of service—Would be increased from 21 to 24 months.

Deferrals—Statutory authority to defer non-veteran married men without other dependents would be revoked. Otherwise, the present deferment procedures would not be changed.

Students—Up to 75,000 college students would be deferred annually for the first three years of the program. However, they would be required to take four months of basic training before entering college and serve the other 20 months after graduation.

UMT Plan Explained—Universal military training—a UMT program applicable only to 18-year-olds would be established wherever congress or the President decided that international tensions have eased. It would require four to six months of training in a national security corps.

Reserves—All draftees would be required to enter the reserves for six years after completion of active service. UMT trainees would be required to serve in the reserves for seven and one-half years.

Manpower ceiling—A ceiling of 4,000,000 men would be placed on the armed forces. The present ceiling is about 2,000,000, but it has been suspended until 1934.
