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

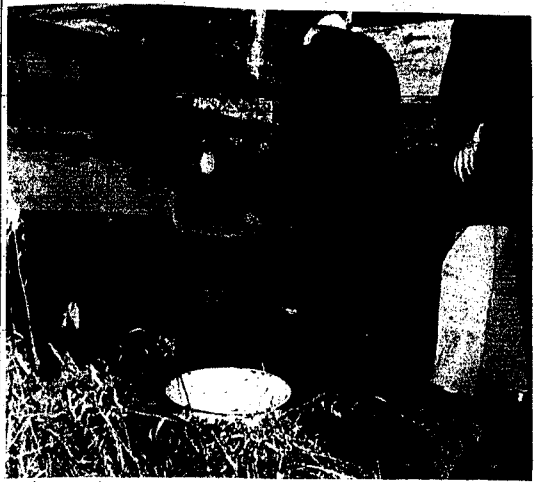

TUCKER'S NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG

WASHINGTON—The Truman and Roosevelt factions of the Democratic party clamored their numberless supporters to support a resolution of censure ratification of the constitutional amendment barring a President from holding down the White House for more than two years.

With the Rooseveltians, it was a battle for historical prestige on behalf of their Irish hero, but with the hard-billed, political lead from the Truman camp, it was a battle of political life and death, or at least bread and butter.

It is doubtful if the Roosevelt group, which is spearheaded largely by the Americans for Democratic Action, ever gave a more emotional and affront to the man in the White House.



The story would be almost ludicrous if it were not for its evidence of deep-seated enmity and disagreements between the two wings. In many key electoral states, their feud may mean the difference between defeat or triumph in next year's national election.

SHIFT—When the amendment was submitted to states by "do-nothing Old Republican congress," as President Truman charged it, Democrats generally opposed it. The majority of the legislature to ratify were controlled by GOPers. Oddly, the Truman politicians fought the prohibition because, even though it does not affect the incumbent, it would give the popular national warning against his re-nomination next year. The Roosevelt admirers regarded it as a retrospective re-echo on FDR and on the "disgraceful party" that helped him to win a third and a fourth term.

After ratification by 18 states, the movement came to almost a death halt. It might have remained motionless, save for the Korean "police action," which was a tactical shift of the Roosevelt worshippers.

UNIQUE—Early this year, reportedly at a conference in New York City, the Rooseveltians decided to throw their influence behind the amendment, regardless of a Truman opposition, so that no other administration could repeat the success of the Rooseveltians.

Unless the amendment is repealed, no man may lead the nation for more than two terms, with the lone exception of Harry S. Truman. FDR will still be remembered for his administration.

Seven of the last states to embed the amendment in the constitution are Democratic strongholds, and the Rooseveltians are determined to see that they and their allies had to do to insure ratification was to withdraw their earlier opposition. It was as simple as sending a telegram.

Those states were North Carolina, Texas, Tennessee, Georgia, Arkansas, New Mexico and Nevada. The combination of cooperation with Truman and hero-worship of Roosevelt did the trick.

It may also be significant that three states where the majority of the official Truman family have considerable power never did ratify. They are Kentucky (vice President Barkley), Rhode Island (Attorney General Murphy) and Massachusetts (Attorney Secretary Tobin).

TART-HARTLEY—Labor lawyers are not publicizing the unpleasant fact, but they recently cited the fact-Hartley act, which they said denounces as a "false and untrue statement" the Supreme Court's decision to protect them against far-reaching anti-labor laws enacted by several states.

In pulling against a Wisconsin law prohibiting public utility strikes and requiring compulsory arbitration of those cases, the Supreme Court held that without prohibition violated national labor policy, as expressed in many laws on the subject.

The principle was cited by labor counsel, and mentioned in the Supreme Court decision, is the Tart-Hartley act. It does not prohibit strikes or require compulsory arbitration, even though vital industries are involved in a time of emergency.

DEAD—The vote was 8-3, and the author of the decision was Chief Justice Fred Vinson, who has been mentioned as a possible Democratic presidential nominee if Mr. Truman does not run in 1936. Labor spokesmen and liberal unionists have complained against his judicial citation of the "Tart-Hartley" act, which they feel tends to rely on it as partial defense.

Incidentally, the Tart-Hartley act never has been enforced before the Supreme Court. It is so much in its constitutionality. But the highest judicial body has frequently cited its provisions as the latest authority on congressional intent with respect to labor problems.

Therefore, it appears that, desirable as it may seem to President Truman, who has repeatedly urged its repeal, it ranks well with the judicial branch of the government, even though all its members were appointed by FDR and his successors.

Thus, although politics is too unpredictable for prediction it seems that the Tart-Hartley act may now be classed as a dead political issue.

VIEWPOINTS OF OTHERS

PRICE (HA, HA) CONTROL

We always did like a jolly man, and a man who can laugh before his days has been numbered. All the same, the jolliness of Michael V. DISALE, the price controller, is disappearing. He laughs at the odds he finds. When asked whether the market-making method of price control for clothing and furniture retailers would increase or decrease more prices, he burst into a hearty guffaw and said: "We have a pool on the lot in the office."

Without being in on the pool, most consumers will have as sharp an interest as anybody in how it comes out. And they will not double over in merriment if it turns out after all that margin control is just another way of raising prices.

OPB officials assert that margin control, which was approved by the OPA during the war, has had a stabilizing effect. It is lighter and more enforceable than the dollar-and-cent ceiling. The consumer will have far less doubt about that. He can see the margin and the retailer's margin and therefore cannot know whether the retailer is observing his ceiling price; thus enforcement must depend entirely upon spot checks and crackdowns by OPB officials.

It is that kind of enforcement likely to be successful? How can OPB keep an eye on every margin seller in the country? And is it fair to freeze margins at the high levels that have prevailed since Korea? These doubts are bound to assail the public and consumers will regard them as a joke.—St. Louis Post-Dispatch.

BIG HERE—AND HERE

A number of persons doing business with the veterans' administration have about concluded that it would be simpler if they had never learned to write their names but could merely set down an "X" for a signature.

Dr. Alvin C. Zurich, president of the University of the State of New York, relates that contracts for six of his institutions with the VA required signatures or initials in a total of more than 2,200 places.

This has been cited as one example of need for a reorganization of the VA to eliminate the expense of such reorganization as the Hoover commission recommended more than two years ago. To be sure, satisfactory design and printing of government forms from exploitation by fraudulent schools. But this sort of complexity often is vicious if not self-defeating.

Of course, red tape could be dispensed with if everybody became honest. And governments eventually could cease losing after veterans' benefits were more war. It is rare to find an instance where strategic incompetence so openly admitted."

Clark agreed with this estimate from a military standpoint.

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IT'S TIME TO KILL RFC

It seemed fair to hold off conclusive judgment about the RFC until the senate's inquiry was well advanced. That stage has now been reached. And the time has come when the sensible course is the abolition of the RFC.

As everyone knows, Herbert Hoover created the RFC as a depression emergency device to help keep tottering big business going in the dark days. It was never contemplated that the agency should go permanently into the banking business in competition with our private banking system.

But that is in fact exactly what happened. More than that, the RFC became a sort of cover for the kind of business that has appealed after all regular banks had turned deaf ear. Many such concerns were granted loans, in defiance of what private bankers considered sound lending practice.

No doubt this greater liberality often had beneficial results, but the time has come to obscure the essential fact that the RFC was serving as a vast commercial bank. On several occasions, indeed, the RFC's well-known liberality enabled private banks to prosper. These banks were turning into the banks rated as poor risks.

The private banking system is perfectly qualified, except perhaps in extreme emergencies, to meet all the credit needs of the expanding U. S. economy. There is no point in having the government competing in this field.

But as it has developed in the capital, the issue goes well beyond the economic justifications for keeping or abolishing the RFC. Essentially the problem has become a moral one.

What the investigation of Senator Fulbright's subcommittee has disclosed is a supreme example of the folly of government by proxy. "Congress" is a name we have.

Too often President Truman has placed in key government offices not the most fit men, nor even well-qualified men, but simply men he knew and liked. He frequently complains that he cannot attract competent men to many important posts but the record indicates he at numerous times went out of his way to assure such jobs to his friends.

It is the thoughtless and several reasoned Washington observers that Mr. Truman has thereby permitted a host of federal commissions and bureaus to deteriorate dangerously. The civil aeronautics board, the Federal Trade Commission and the Federal Power Commission, these are among them.

Worse than this, the President has maintained an almost fanatical loyalty to his cronies holding these jobs. Loyalty is a noble trait, and it is laudable in the American people admire in Mr. Truman. But loyalty to incompetent men—friends or not—is misplaced. The President would do much better to be loyal to high standards of performance. Moreover, this attitude has been aggravated by his insistence upon regarding every attack upon a subordinate as fundamentally an assault upon his as President. Thus he has tended to discourage the criticisms as always political, never sincere.

Senator Fulbright may not be without political motive, but the facts unearthed by his committee cannot be brushed off as campaign innuendo. The expensive milk contract given to a White House secretary, the free vacations for White House functionaries and senators, too, for that matter at the expense of a Florida hotel manager who won an RFC loan, the immense benefits through awards of high-salaried business jobs to former RFC men, these compound into a sordid, immoral story.

Apparently only the strongest men, administrators like Jesse Jones and Eugene Meyer, can keep a government lending agency from sinking into the morass of loans-by-political favor. Establish an institution dealing in billions—passed out on fairly easy credit to you and your friends—subjected to political machinations. Files always collected around the honey pot.

The result is not only a weakening of the RFC itself, but a general lowering of moral behavior in many branches of the administration, in congress, and elsewhere.

Mr. Hoover, Jesse Jones and others have called for RFC's demise. To abolish the agency would be to set an example, to start government back up the road to sound moral performance.

USAF Unveils Use of Guided Missile Bombs

TOKYO, March 13 (AP)—The air force disclosed today it has achieved excellent results with six-ton guided missiles launched from B-29s in Korea.

The 27-foot "Tarzon" bomb, controlled by a radio transmitter in the launching aircraft, has been effective especially in the destruction of big bridges, far east air force officials said.

They said 12,000-pound "Tarzon" bombs destroyed four major bridges in Korea.

Bombardiers reported the bomb's response to directions during its descent was "excellent."

Officials said the "Tarzon" bomb has been used in limited numbers in Korea since last August.

Several have been used against bridges and vital North Korean targets, most of which have been bridges of massive type construction.

"Principles used in control of the bomb are a radio transmitter in the launching aircraft, a receiver on the missile which enables control, a flare for tracking the bomb on its course and a bombight for use of the bombardier in directing the descent."

United Press Aviation Writer Charles Cordery reported from Washington Saturday that 120 types of radio-controlled bombs now are in use in Korea, the Tarzon and the 1,000-pound Tarzon.

DENVER, March 13 (AP)—A suit of \$30,000 damages was filed in the Denver district court today as a result of a plane crash at Pocatello, Ida. in which three Heber, Utah, men were killed.

The widow and children of Wayne R. and Lawrence B. Larsen and Orville Barry filed suit against the widow of the pilot, Homer G. Smith, Pocatello.

The suit, naming Mrs. Evelyn B. Smith as a defendant, alleged that the three dead men had gone to Pocatello to purchase building materials from Smith and he had volunteered to fly them to a baseball game at Twin Falls, Ida. The plane crashed at Pocatello while attempting a landing on the return trip.

4 Boys Killed - MEDFORD, Mass., March 13 (AP)—Four boys were carried to their deaths yesterday on a flimsy, makeshift raft. A fifth boy was saved.

They drowned in an isolated bog opposite Oak Grove cemetery as one by one they fell off the raft into the water.

Carey Chamber of Commerce Discusses Fires and Floods

CAREY, March 13—More than 100 residents of Carey valley met at the LDS church Thursday evening for a Chamber of Commerce session. Flood control in the valley and sentiment threatening the recently organized fire prevention district were the main subjects of discussion.

D. E. Adamson, president, commented the flood control district. He pointed out that of the \$200 allotted for the work, \$434 already has been used.

The organization went on record as being in favor of seeking the Carey airport's 1951 state levy of \$2,500. Last year Carey's portion of the tax money went to Halley to improve the Halley air strip.

Halley and Carey previously had agreed that Carey should receive \$3,500 this year and it is from this sum that the Carey chamber wishes to draw to replace a portion of the money spent from flood control funds. It also was pointed out that the taxpayers and county commissioners should be given a fair hearing in the distribution of the flood control sum.

Adamson said the six-man flood control board plans a long-range

program to extend beyond the immediate planning of flood control funds. Regarding the Carey address, J. J. McFadden, Halley, said that no buildings are located in the area.

It also was pointed out that acreages belonging to some ranchers included in the boundaries of the newly formed district are anxious to withdraw because of long distances.

Several voters mentioned in the district are anxious to have their names included in the boundaries but that no buildings are located in the area.

Trustable property in the district is subject to an eight-mill levy to pay for the first bond issue.

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5 Prisoners Put In Cells for Plot

ANGLO, Ia., March 13 (AP)—Five prisoners are in solitary confinement at Louisiana state penitentiary here today as a result of what authorities said was a plot to kill several prisoners and a guard.

The plot, was revealed yesterday by Gov. Earl K. Long. He said he had received reports of "some threats of killings" at the sprawling isolated prison farm.

A citizens committee is investigating the penitentiary. It was appointed by Long after 37 prisoners slashed their hair tendons with razors recently in a protest against "brutality."

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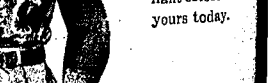

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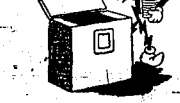
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
