Idaho Begins Merger of 2 Job Agencies

BOISE, March 10.—(Special) The merger of the Idaho state employment service and employment security agency is under way. F. J. Carroll, director of the newly combined agency, reported.

He said the fiscal and statistical departments of the former state employment service already have been merged to the space in the ESA office and that plans are underway to merge the personnel and training departments of two agencies.

Hays, director of the employment service before the legislature passed the bill consolidating the two agencies, has accepted a position with the regional office of the department in Seattle and is expected to leave about April 1, Carroll said.

Hays has "not formally resigned" yet, Carroll said. He said duties will be turned over to Hays by "someone from within the organization."

Carroll said the consolidation will save hundreds of dollars a state funds, but added it "will take a little time" to get all the office space problems.

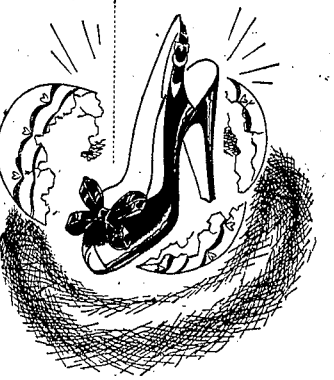

This can't be done if the high bid is over the ceiling price.

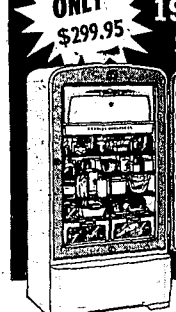

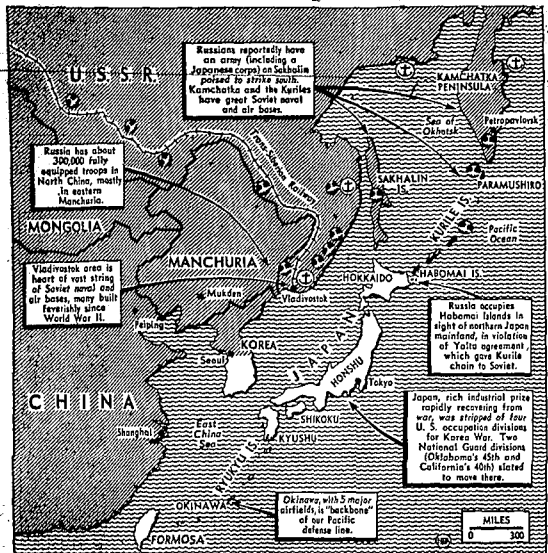

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Red Threat to Japan Grows

Russia has about 200,000 fully equipped troops in North China, mostly in eastern Manchuria.

1951 Session Hewed Fund By 4 Million

BOISE, March 14—The 1951 Idaho legislature appropriated \$4,221,388 for the general fund, more than \$4,000,000 less than appropriations for the current biennium figure compiled by the Idaho State Chamber of Commerce show.

Of this appropriation, \$2,000,000 was transferred to the permanent building fund and \$1,000,000 to a civilian defense catastrophe fund.

The chamber figures showed that much of the total difference can be attributed to the difference in appropriations to the building fund. During the 1949-1951 biennium, \$7,000,000 was appropriated to the building fund, \$5,606,000 more than by the legislative session just ended.

Total appropriations for the 1949-1951 biennium amounted to \$46,209,023, the chamber reported. Appropriations for education during the 1949-1951 session were \$19,329,532 compared to \$18,352,023 appropriated by the 1949 and 1950 legislative sessions.

Retirement Fund Cut
The public school equalization fund received \$2,500,000 compared with \$7,150,000 during the 1949-1951 biennium, but the teacher retirement appropriation of \$500,000 compared with \$1,500,000 voted by the 1949 and 1950 sessions.

A slight increase in appropriations for public assistance was made this year—\$10,550,445 compared with \$10,282,471 for the 1949-1951 biennium.

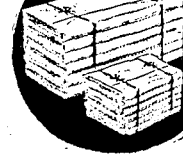
