Nothing unbecoming so far has cracked the Truman administration with the scandalous Harding regime. Yet in some ways the offenses against the public trust are more flagrant than those of the Harding administration.

Only one thing is still lacking. No one has yet put pending business in the White House, the capitol and assorted government halls to dispend favors easily, mechanically, and for a fixed price.

Plans Proceed On Execution Of 2 Boiseans

BOISE, March 15 (UP)—Plans are going ahead at Idaho state prison for the execution April 11 of execution of two Boise youths sentenced to die on the gallows for the murder of a Boise grocer.

Warden L. E. Ciapp said "some time after the first of the month" the portable gallows constructed last summer will be taken out of storage and assembled.

An out-of-state executioner has been obtained to supervise the hangings if the clergyman pleas of Ernie Weirath, 21, and Troy Powell, 21, are turned down by the state board of pardons.

Ciapp, who declined to disclose the scheduled executioner's name, said "he has plenty of experience." The warden said hearings for the two youths before the pardon board will take place at the quarters of their attorneys and the board. The pardon board will begin its quarterly session April 4. Ciapp said the hearing probably will be held early in the pardon board's session.

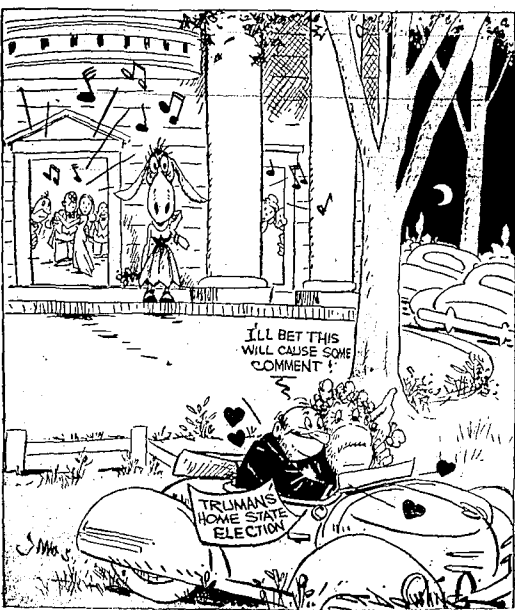
He said "probably three or four days" will be devoted to the hearing.

Weirath and Powell pleaded guilty to the fatal stabbing and beating of Newton Wilson, 57-year-old neighborhood roofer, in a robbery that netted them \$12.

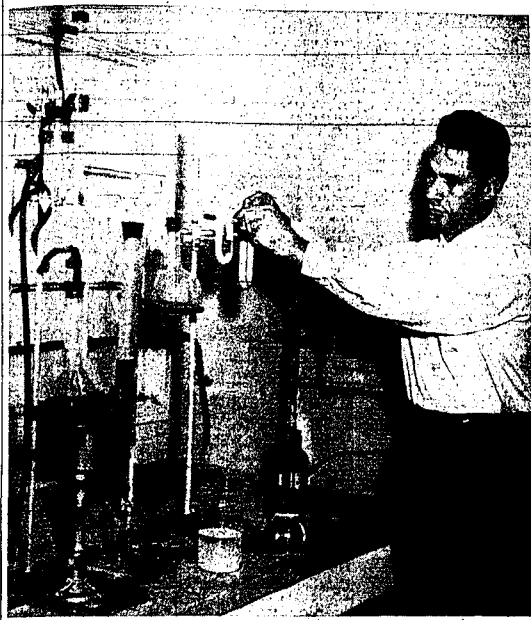

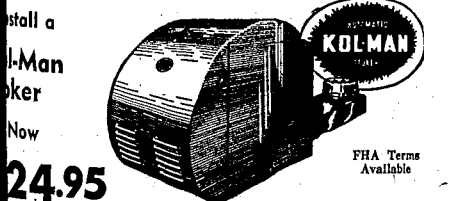

Building Ban Failed to Halt Gain in State

BOISE, March 15 (AP)—Building restrictions imposed after the outbreak of the Korean war failed to put much of a dent in Idaho home building during 1950.

Idaho's federal housing administration director, W. T. Lockwood, said his office handled \$24,000,000 worth of commitments on home building. This compared with \$10,000,000 in the previous year.

Lockwood said about 3,500 cases were approved by the FHA during 1950. By the year's end, the Boise office had okayed insurance for \$1,000,000 worth of mortgages. Average commitment or mortgage amount was around \$7,000 compared with \$5,250 in 1949.

Schools held during the first two months of this year, the FHA office took advantage of a seasonal slack in building to hold staff schools to acquaint workers with new regulations and office procedure.

Commitments issued by the FHA during February of this year totaled 194, compared with 53 in January. However, the number of insured accounts was lower, with 128 in February as compared with 72 in January.

Lockwood said many of the letters were carried over from 1950. About 25,000 people were killed in traffic accidents.

"The source must remain anonymous because reprisals might result. But he said he heard a group of Chinese soldiers talking outside his bedroom window in a west China city."

The soldiers, some 50 of them, had stopped to rest during a march on a chilly morning last month. The refugee said this is what he overheard: "We have chased the Americans back in Korea," said one. "I think we are better than the Americans," commented another, but I don't understand why we don't drive them out of Korea."

High Losses Cited
A third observed: "I think we've found out now that we don't have too much air power," said the first soldier. "We don't seem to have any. We always have to fight without air power."

"The Russians were supposed to give us planes but we don't have it," complained the second voice. "I don't understand that, I don't understand it at all. Russia has plenty of air power."

"Russia has more air power than America," agreed the first.
Air Power Needed
"Then why don't we get some?" the second soldier demanded. "We have too many men when we don't have air power."

"We can't drive the Americans out of Korea if we continue losing so many men," said the third man. "I don't want to die and bomb us and we can't do anything about it without air power," the second man rejoined. "I don't understand that. Russia has plenty of air power."

"The informant said this was the only instance of his overhearing disgruntled Chinese red troops. That he did not believe it meant any chances of desertions on a large scale."

He added that he had heard Chinese civilians also express anger over the failure of Russians to supply large numbers of planes in Korea.

Group in Oregon Backs Idaho Dam

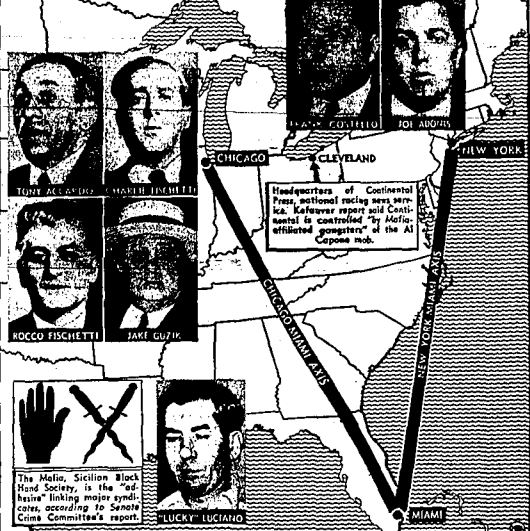
LA GRANDE, Ore., March 10 (UP)—The Northwest Oregon Development association has approved the proposed bureau of reclamation Hell's canyon dam project.

U. S. Defenses Are Reserved For Reserves
Capit. Leo T. Geerlings, sixth army officer, addressing 44 members of the Twin Falls organized reserve corps and national guard units Tuesday, pointed out the possible dangers of the United States should it be attacked.

He compared present theories of defense with those formerly thought to be adequate and impregnable. He explained the development of hemispheric defense with America's southern neighbors and the combined American-Canadian defense problems of the Arctic region.

He informed the group on latest developments in strategy, tactics, weapons and equipment. He contrasted the tremendous increase in population in northern Eurasia with population trends in the northern part of this continent at one of his discussions on geopolitics and political geography. The captain said, although defenses of the western hemisphere are not entirely adequate, the Canadian army is expanding and armists of Canada and the United States are standardizing their equipment.

Lewisston Legion Hits NICE Action
LEWISTON, March 10 (UP)—Veterans' education rights were tampered with when the Northern Idaho College of Education was killed by the state legislature, members of the American Legion post, executive committee asserted here last night.

Don Stewart, publicity chairman for Lewis-Clark post, said the group passed a resolution disapproving the action of the legislature in denying the school appropriation at the behest of Gov. Len B. Jordan.

The veterans education law says veterans must be enrolled in a school by July 25, 1951, if they are to receive any of the benefits. Executive committee members said NICE veterans would be unable to change schools in time to meet the deadline and that many will lose their rights.

Solon Asks U. S. Farm Labor Pay
WASHINGTON, March 10 (UP)—Senator Magnuson, D. Wash., urged yesterday that the government pay a major part of the cost of transporting foreign farm workers to labor short areas.

Farm labor shortages in the Pacific northwest are widespread, he said the senate agriculture committee in a prepared statement, are resulting from increased employment in defense industries.

Magnuson testified in support of a bill he introduced jointly with Senator Weller, R. Ica., Cain, R. Wash., and Murray, D. Mont. It provides for the recruitment of domestic and foreign farm labor as needed and providing their transportation.

Refugees Increase
PUSAN, Korea, March 10 (UP)—There are nearly 6,000,000 refugees in South Korea, or one-fourth of the republic's normal population. The latest figure—3,757,007—was reported by the ministry of social affairs. More than half of them are classified as in dire need.

Agency Drops Promotion of Maine's Spuds

NEW YORK, March 10 (UP)—A national advertising agency said today it will drop Maine potatoes as an unprofitable account.

Brooks, Smith, French and Dorland, Inc., said it will quit its promotion of Maine spuds June 1. It blamed the "disastrous effect" of government price support, and suggested Maine's potato industry promotion and research tax is insufficient.

Blurgas Dorrance, chairman of the advertising firm, wrote the Maine potato advisory committee: "With our Maine growers willing to dump potatoes at 10¢ government support price it has been difficult for our brokers and wholesalers to get supplies at prices near competitive prices."

"The ill will that has been generated in the trade is going to take time to overcome."

Price support for potatoes ends with the 1955 crop. Maine farmers except to dump about 19,000,000 bushels of the 1954 crop of 61,000 bushels. Dumping is the term used to describe the procedure whereby the government buys surplus spuds from the farmer at support prices of about \$1.08 per bushel and sells them at 50¢ per bushel for use either as fertilizer or for livestock.

Iran Puts Ban on Demonstrations
TEHRAN, Iran, March 10 (UP)—A reported protest by U. S. Ambassador Henry P. Grady was followed yesterday by police action banning future demonstrations and parades in Tehran and requiring permits for mass meetings.

The banning of demonstrations was the most forceful government action taken since the new premier, Hussein Ala, succeeded the assassinated Gen. Ali Ramrnan. The Shah signed a decree today formally naming Ala premier.

State Cosmetology Examinations Set
BOISE, March 10 (UP)—State cosmetology licensing examinations will be given at Boise, Lewiston and Pocatello starting next Monday, the state bureau of occupational licensure said yesterday.

shop, shortly after the books were delivered to me I was fired by B and G (T) always before the manager was jealous of my skill with peanut butter, jelly and egg salad and I disappeared into the mist which so often envelops youngsters starting for a foothold in New York. It was not until seven or eight years later, when I was a sports writer with the United Press, with a desk of my own, that the salesman caught up with me and demanded the rest of his dough. I still had to pay in installments, but this time he took no chances. I was with me so much that people took him for my keeper or my brother.

Before I leave on a trip like the one I am on now I always read the Encyclopedia all the way through,

and this practice always pays off. For example, when I passed by the hotel palace here and the strangely garbed sentries guarding it, I was able to correct Jean, who thought the Rudler's Walls ballet was giving an outdoor performance, and tell her that the soldiers were Evzones.

"Evzones," I said, quoting page 24 of volume 8, "are members of rifle units in the Greek army, recruited from mountainous districts, and wearing a picturesque dress with wide skirts and tufted shoes. Their organization corresponds to that of a line infantry regiment."

I could tell by the way she hugged my arm that she was proud of being married to a walking encyclopedia with receding hair.

But the Encyclopedia does not do justice to the uniform of the Evzones. It is without a doubt the tom-tom-toe costume any fighting man ever wore. The skirt is a dead ringer for a ballerina's, exposing

more leg and stocking than one sees watching a Partisan can-can. On their heads the Evzones wear a red stocking cap with a tassel of tremendous proportions, and on their feet they wear boudoir slippers with blunt red pom-poms. Having no pockets in their uniform, if you can call it that, they sport big red pocketbooks.

They look a bit like states, but the history of the Evzones proves that a man who'd call them slacks is just plain tired of living and seeking him with an aching wisdom tooth. And, despite their *Plavtra* appearance, would rather fight than eat.

They don't bother to change into long underwear when winter comes and, despite their *Evzones* and all, they were the fellows who spearheaded the fight against the Italians, and if the Germans hadn't taken a hand would have been eating spaghetti and

avignon chianti in Rome. All of them are hand-picked, all of them stand six feet or better, and their favorite weapon is the bayonet.

As an old infantryman, I am glad Uncle Sam does not dress its GIs in a uniform similar to that worn by the Evzones. Washing a pair of khaki pants or a green fatigue suit, or an item into the bid. And, I guess, wear a girdle. How do the Evzones keep their stockings up? In a uniform similar to that worn by the military, no fewer than 50 Greeks have told me that nothing could make their country happier than to have General Eisenhower pay a visit. They say it would lift the morale of the people more than any other single thing could.

Casting Equipment Is Term Giveaway on Home Term

BOSTON, March 15. (AP)—Oliver Graham Treadway one look at your bait-casting equipment and he can tell from which sector of the United States you hail.

Treadway, from Bristol, Conn., and president of a fishing equipment company, says "the fishermen in Dixie use shorter and lighter rods than those in the midwest, New England or the far west."

Treadway claims it is the generally accepted rule that the longer the fishing, the lighter and shorter the rod. This permits the angler the maximum of thrills from a minimum of successes.

Although the far western fishermen still buys a six-foot rod, the trend is toward shorter rods throughout the country. Especially in the case of fly rods, there was a time when 11-foot rods were popular. Just prior to World War II, the nine-footer was preferred. Now the favorite is eight feet.

The same holds true in bait-casting equipment. According to Treadway, if you live in the south you probably have a three-foot casting rod of steel. You may even have a two-footer but the chances are slight that you have a five-footer.

If you live in the midwest, you are most likely to have a four and a half foot pole. In New York or New Zealand your choice would be five or five and a half feet.

But if you do your casting in the Pacific northwest, you'll buy the longest and heaviest rod you can get—either five and a half or six feet.

Treadway claims this line of demarcation is so fine that a resident of Bangor, Me., fishing for salmon in the Penobscot river, will use lighter equipment than an angler 200 miles north while a Boston fisherman, 200 miles south of a lighted sea, will use heavier equipment.

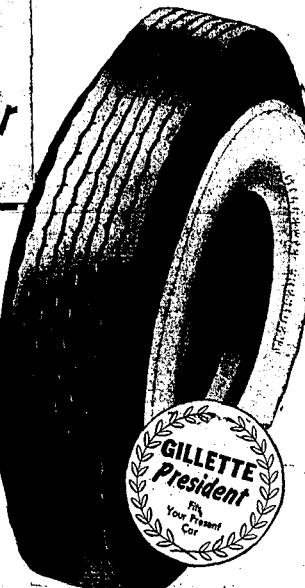

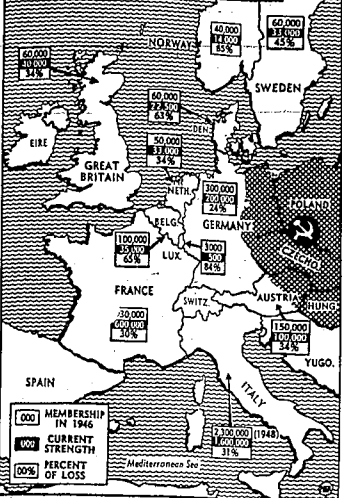

Federal Aide Suspected in Bid for Loan

WASHINGTON, March 15 (AP)—Senator Nixon, Republican, today a federal employee described as President Truman's very good friend, reportedly used his "White House entrée" to push a bid for a government loan.

Nixon said he will continue to insist that a senate committee investigating "influence peddling" get to the bottom of the matter. The government worker's boss promised to help.

The committee, meanwhile, took behind closed doors for a few days its inquiry into the activities of "five percenters" who trade on influence in the defense contract field. Senator Hoey, D. N. C., the chairman, said the committee needs time to study "several tips and leads" regarding such activities.

The five percenters have come to be applied to influence men who charge a fee, often five per cent, for aid in getting government contracts for others.

The federal employee to whom Nixon referred is Joseph Major, who works for the general services administration (GSA). This is one of the government's largest purchasing agencies.

Major's name first popped up two years ago during a similar investigation by the Hoey committee.

Earlier this month the name Joseph Major cropped up again during a senate banking subcommittee investigation of political influence in the reconstruction finance corporation (RFC).

Hammond said he also plans to sue three mortgagees who had scrapped the mortgage if for \$10,000 of the \$100,000 paid to Hammond for option on the 72 acres. It was to be paid over a 10-year period at the rate of \$1,000 a year.

MacArthur Says U. N. Must Continue War of Manoeuvres

BY HUGH BAILEY, President of United Press

NEW YORK, March 15 (AP)—Gen. Douglas MacArthur said today United Nations troops must continue their war of maneuver in Korea because there are no natural defenses near the 38th parallel to hold against the Chinese communists.

The number of U. N. troops needed to hold the 38th parallel would be sufficient to drive the Chinese communists back across the Yalu river boundary with Manchuria and to hold the line there.

The supreme commander told me this in response to a single question I asked him by cable: "How many troops would be required to hold the 38th parallel in violation?"

MacArthur replied: "As I have on several occasions pointed out, the conditions under which we are conducting military operations in Korea do not favor engaging in positional warfare on any line across the peninsula."

"Specifically with reference to the 38th parallel, there are no natural defense features anywhere near its immediate proximity."

"This terrain is such that to establish a conventional defense system in reasonable depth would require such a sizeable force that if we had it, and could logically maintain it, we would be able to drive the Chinese communists back across the Yalu, hold that river as our future main line of defense, and proceed to the accomplishment of our mission in the unification of Korea."

"Under the realities existing, however, we can and will, until the situation is radically altered, continue our campaign of maneuver as the best means to neutralize the military disadvantage under which we fight and keep the enemy engaged where it best serves our own military purposes."

"Such a point of engagement will of necessity be a fluctuating variable."

This Is Day Many Folks Say 'Never Again' on Late Report

WASHINGTON, March 15 (AP)—This is the day millions of Americans ever: "Never again."

Never again, they say, will they put off making out their income tax returns until the last minute. But they—or other put-off-ers—will. Every year the income tax people say, millions don't get the final check done until the last minute.

"I don't know why," said the income tax man, "but people who have money coming to them get their returns in early. Although the income tax has grown into the present size only fairly recently, its roots go far back."

In 1872, England had a tax on farm and income. But not until 1799 did William Pitt put Britain on an outright income tax.

When the proposal came up for a graduated income tax in England, such as we have here now, it met with considerable criticism. (Under a graduated tax, those with higher incomes not only pay more taxes, but they also pay at a higher rate.)

The U. S. had its first national income tax during the Civil War. Its biggest year was 1865 when 40,000 persons paid \$73,000,000.

Compare that with 1936 collections. Some \$2,000,000,000 were returned and paid \$17,287,000,000. Corporations chipped in only \$1,387,000,000. (We have advanced-receded (take your pick) a long way.)

Fast Pace of Life Costly to Girls' Beauty

NEW YORK, March 15 (UP)—Unless modern girls slow down their atomic pace, tomorrow's grandmothers will compare to the current glamorous girls as Marlene Dietrich and Mary Astor, warned Clara Reiner, film actress and Hollywood cosmetologist.

Mrs. Reiner, a slim blond who manages not to look the 40 years old she admits, said flatly, "The terrific tempo of the days is against feminine beauty."

She's been watching wrinkles develop on some of the country's best known glamour girls and movie stars, and frankly admits even a cosmetologist can't correct what women are doing to their faces by increased lung tension.

Flig to Be Hit

"The women of today are the first generation who know what fast tempo can do for them," she said. "There is no previous experience to show what continued fatigue and tension do to a woman's face."

"I see the signs every day. Young women come in with deep lines along their eyes, she traced lines from her nose to the corners of her mouth. They have dark circles under their eyes, and in some cases, where emotional tension is acute, they develop rashes and blisters."

"Today's high tension, the skin expert continued, also causes women to smoke more cigarettes, drink more cocktails, even eat more candy. It's a needless searching for something they haven't found that makes them feel they need something in their hands all the time."

Can Be Helped

"This bleak picture, enough to bring even more lines at worry to a woman's face, can be brightened," Mrs. Reiner added reassuringly. "If women sit down and take stock of themselves."

"They must learn to relax, to ease up the tempo, to take a little 'big'—them—become ancient grandmothers," she advised. Since it looks as if more and more women will hold down jobs at the same time they're raising children, Mrs. Reiner emphasized that they'll have to learn to set aside a regular time for exercise and beauty care.

Bustling Northwest Has Major Role in Nation's Defense Work

By VINCENT HOYMAN

SEATTLE, March 15 (UP)—Atom bombs... planes and ships to carry them... aluminum to build the planes.

There you have the spectacular side of "rearming" in the Pacific northwest.

The mobilization spotlight centers on the great Hanford plant, where 6,000 construction workers rush expansion of already busy facilities for making plutonium—heart of the atomic bomb.

It swings to the big Boeing airplane plant, where the air force has just ordered a new heavy bomber into production even before it has been test flown.

It outlines seven plants turning out 63 per cent of the nation's aluminum—and a teaming many yard busy reconvecting carriers so they can handle atom bomb carrying planes.

These operations are the attention getters. But they're far from the exclusive contribution of a region that has 40 per cent of the nation's potential electric power, a big pro-

portion of its lumber and wheat (including food, shipping, farming and mining industries).

In the northwest, no elsewhere, the mobilization machine is moving rather smoothly. But there are some needs more than theoretical.

The Hanford plant, its secret atomic workshops scattered over an isolated semi-desert site in southeast Washington, is well along with a power construction program that will at least double its \$350,000,000 wartime cost.

David F. Shaw, Hanford manager for the atomic energy commission, summed it up.

"The demand," he remarked, "exceeds supply."

At the Seattle area plants of the nation's potential electric power, a big pro-

largest single employer, the payroll exceeds \$2,000,000. That's up 7,000 "atomic Korea," but far short of the 45,000 World war II peak.

The air force has just ordered Boeing to put into production its new B-54, a "fat" heavy bomber of which two experimental planes are being built. Details are secret but Air Secretary Strohmer has described it as similar in appearance to the smaller, 600-mile-an-hour, supersonic B-47 being built in Boeing's Wichita, Kansas, plant.

At the Big Puget Sound naval shipyard in Bremerton, Wash., at least nine more ships are being fitted for atomic warfare. The carrier Essex, just not through a \$10,000,000, two-year conversion job that strengthened her decks to carry heavier planes capable of landing the atom bomb. Only little government jobs are involved in the Mississippi charges. Any lawyer can come up with a lot of law to prove there is a big difference between slipping the local boss \$250 for a postmaster and sending thousands to the campaign funds in expectation of a diplomatic post.

Lid Failed
But congress was unable to discuss their wholly different in the late 1930s when it put a corrupt practice lid and a \$5,000 top limit on campaign contributions. The implication of that act was that big contributors had not only been expecting but had been getting favors from the party in power.

Republican and Democratic administrations alike paid off in one way or another for campaign bills.

Many wealthy families can and do get around the spirit of the law by having more than one member give the limit.

Another device is the organization of many campaign committees so set up that an individual often can contribute the top limit to several of them, and all for the same basic objective.

Before the lid went on, money to campaign treasurers ran into millions.

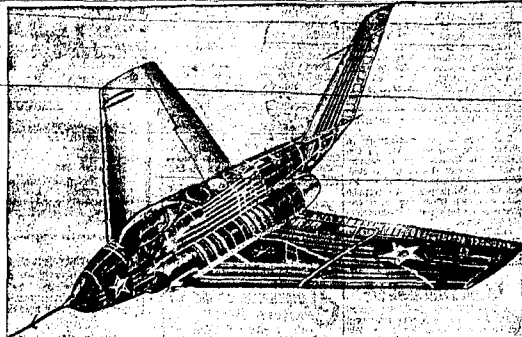
Lewis gave \$50,000

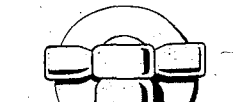

Farm Conservation Practices Reported by PMA Office Here

Agricultural conservation program practices offered in Twin Falls county for 1951 were reported Thursday by Dean Samner, secretary of the county production and marketing administration.

Samner said any agricultural producer in the county is eligible to participate in the program, providing proper approval is obtained from the county committee. He explained that prior approval will be conditioned upon filing a formal request for prior approval with the county committee for each practice before performance is authorized.

Approval by the county committee will consist of a formal notification to the producer of the units approved, the date when the performance is to be completed, and the amount of funds obligated under the practice. Samner said, he added practice approval will be based on the conservation needs of the farm. The funds approved will be based on the funds available. Total payments made in connection with the 1951 program will not exceed \$2,500, he stated.

The first of the new practices described by Samner related to the application of phosphate to perennial legumes. It includes Huban sweet clover, perennial grasses, winter legumes used for clover crops and/or green manure, or vicia applied in connection with the seeding of these types of legume or grasses with or without a companion crop.

Other ACP practices include gypsum or agricultural sulphur applied to soil and/or to the soil in connection with perennial legumes or on permanent pastures which contain legumes.

Others are sweet clover turned under for green manure, subsoiling crop land, rotary subsoiling, spreading or diversion ditches or dikes and stream channel control, rock or brush riprap, erosion control, and contouring, terracing or irrigation systems, leveling land for irrigation, and construction or enlargement of irrigating dams.

Farmer also may apply for practices which include construction and lining of earthen reservoirs, drilling or digging wells for the sole purpose of improving the distribution of livestock on range, development of springs and seeps for the purpose of

supplying water to livestock on range, construction of dams or earthen pits for impounding water of livestock on range, construction of new, large water storage facilities on the range, and installation of pipelines to provide water for livestock on the range.

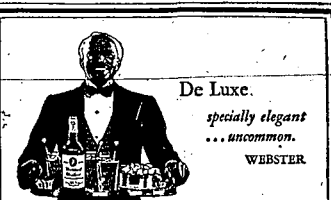
Farmer also may establish permanent cropland pastures by seeding adapted grasses or legumes, artificial seeding and preceding of non-crop pasture land, construction of permanent fences on range, control of perennial weeds, and growing adapted-green manure or clover crops for soil protection and improvement.

Control of Weed Practices Listed

JEROME, March 15—H. C. McMechan, who has assumed his duties as Jerome county weed supervisor, cautions farmers on weed control practices.

Spring is near and farmers are planning farming practices for the coming season. Many things are taken into consideration at this time and one of these things should be weed control.

If there are noxious weeds on a piece of land, he said, the crop to be sprayed should be one that can be spread on the land can be treated before planting.

Spent should be checked closely to see that it is free from weed seeds, he said. It should be cleaned and a sample sent to the state seed laboratory at Boise for an analysis.

Medic Relates Need of Bone Banks in U. S.

LOS ANGELES, March 15 (AP)—Bone banks are the need of the hour, as a national medical facility as rapidly as the public can be convinced they are needed.

Dr. O. Moser Taylor, Los Angeles, expressed this view of orthopedic specialists at a news conference.

Such operations, he said, greatly enhance the availability of bone for surgical grafting and enable medical men to prevent much pain.

Taylor is head of the orthopedic department at the school of medicine, College of Medical Branches, Houston.

He also is director of the short courses at the school's national medical convention, now in session here with 2,500 doctors in attendance.

A bone bank is nothing more than a deep freeze chamber. Bone can be kept indefinitely under refrigeration.

Present sources of bone for banks are restricted, but should increase through efficient utilization of the problem to the public.

Taylor believes, White Memorial hospital here, maintained at the College of Medical Evangelists, has a bone bank, and most of its supply comes from amputees.

Amputees and others who lose bone through surgery, however, cannot be expected to have their anatomies incorporated in the bodies of strangers.

All-Out Synthetic Rubber Production Is Vital to Stockpile, Firestone Says

By HARVEY S. FIRESTONE, JR. AKRON, O. (NEA)—All of the synthetic rubber now being produced in this country should be in operation in March and as soon as they get up to capacity should be turned out.

Under the terms of the agreement there will be an ample supply of rubber to meet all essential civilian needs without rationing products and, at the same time, to fulfill all of our defense requirements.

However, if World War II should break out, if more were to be produced, it would be a great expansion of our defense needs becomes imperative, further rubber conservation may become necessary.

The industry's production outlook for next year depends upon available supplies of raw rubber far more than it does upon factors of customer demand and buying power.

With all synthetic rubber plants operating at capacity and increased orders for military tires and other products, the rubber industry should operate at a high level in 1934.

It is vital to our defense program and to those who are associated with us in preserving freedom throughout the world, that the U. S. go all out to produce maximum quantities of synthetic rubber.

This is not only important to our civilian economy but also to fulfill the objectives of the stockpile program.

In addition to helping us meet our own military and civilian needs, an expanded synthetic rubber output should enable us to supply our foreign friends.

They, in turn, will contribute to our vital national resources through the substitution of synthetic rubber for natural rubber in their own products.

Furthermore, we could make more synthetic rubber available abroad.

Award Presented Astronomy Writer

The permanent rank of Associate in Astronomy, Oregon Academy of Sciences, has been awarded to Dr. J. Hugh Pruett, whose articles on astronomy appear each Sunday in the Times-News.

The academy is an organization of top Oregon scientists. At its annual convention it awards academy citations, on previous recommendations of its council, to three persons whose recognition of outstanding services to Oregon in the field of science.

At its convention last month, one of the academy's three citations went to Pruett. In addition to his newspaper work, he writes occasional articles for several astronomical magazines.

For nearly four years he has had a regular monthly column in Sky and Telescope, the astronomical magazine published at the observatory of Harvard university.

Idea of Space Satellites Still Stirs Interest

WASHINGTON, March 15 (AP)—The idea of creating artificial satellites to circle around the earth out of space is getting continued attention from the military.

An air force spokesman, asked if studies of the project first disclosed two years ago are continuing, replied only "the air force is still interested."

He added he could not discuss what, if any, progress has been made.

A reference to the project went into testimony Monday at the New York trial of three persons charged with conspiring to spy for Russia.

Former army Sgt. David Greenglass, himself a confessed spy and now a witness at the trial, mentioned the satellite project.

He said he had been told "one of the boys" had passed to one of the defendants information on a "spy platform." This was explained as "artificial rubber."

That was two years before a department of defense annual report made a brief and cursory mention of "artificial satellites in connection with guided missile research.

That would be the military use of an artificial satellite, shot into space as a rocket and held there by neutral gravity between the earth and moon or some other body?

Some military scientists speculate that, at least initially, the spy platform would not be a place from which to fire guided missiles at targets on the earth as it is located beneath the surface of the earth.

Instead, they suggest that it might be used for the control of long range, radioelectric rockets.

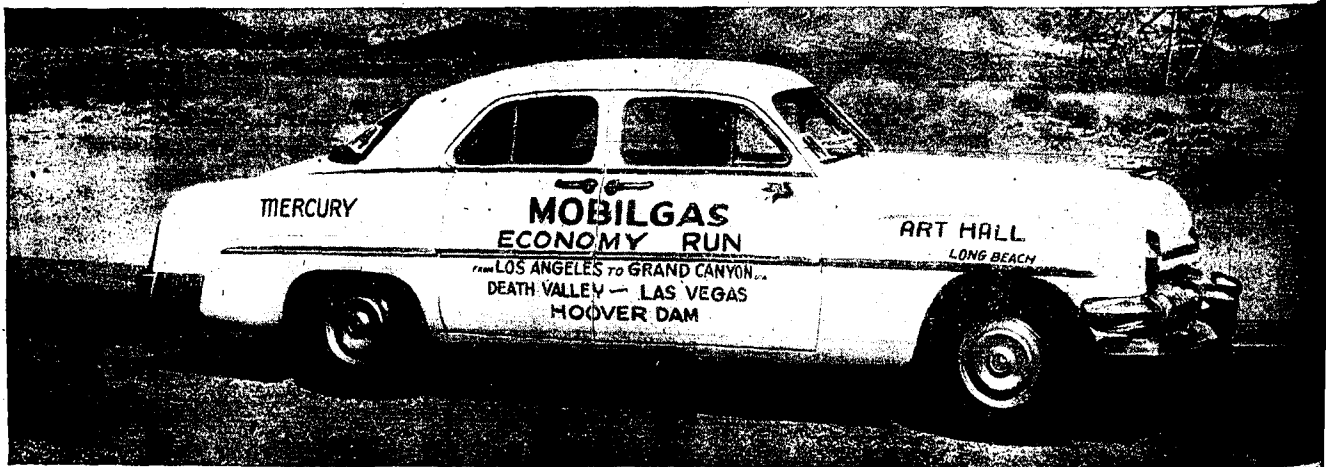

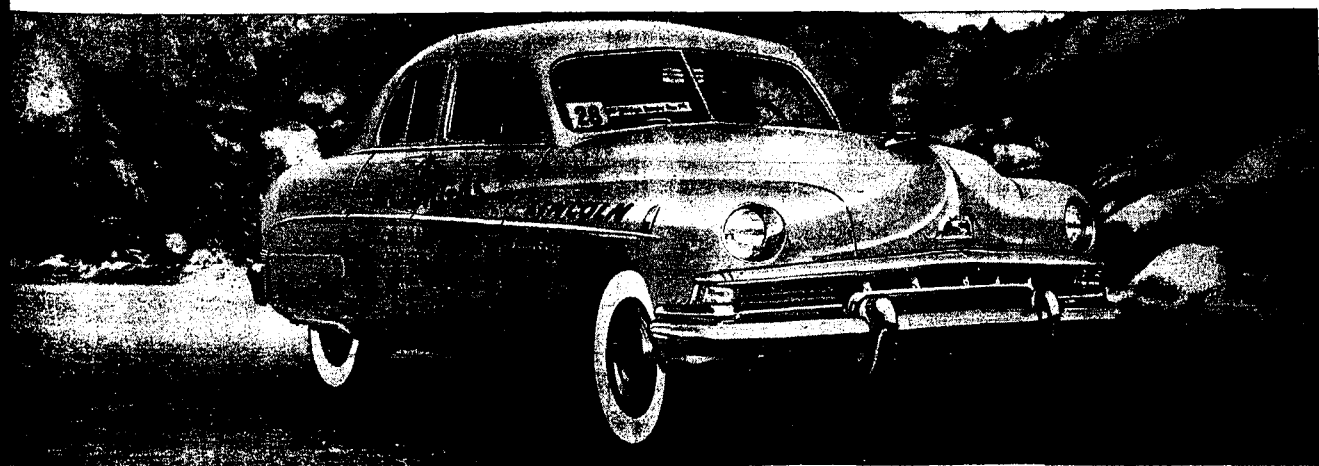
