### Prisoner Observes His 85th Birthday In Idaho's Prison

BOISE, March 18 (AP)—Harry Orchard, serving a life sentence for the murder of former Gov. Frank Steuneger in 1903, observed his 85th birthday at the Idaho penitentiary Sunday.

Orchard has spent 43 years in the penitentiary and is the institution's oldest inmate—both in length of years served and in age.

Prison officials said Orchard is in "fine shape." He now works at the pump house at the hot water wells about 125 yards from Warden L. E. Clapp's house. He used to care for the prison's poultry flock and been but in recent years has been required to odd chores.

Orchard has admitted placing a bomb at the gate of former Governor Steuneger's home in Caldwell Dec. 30, 1903.

Orchard's autobiography shows he was born Albert E. Hunsley in Ontario, Canada, March 18, 1866.

### Shot Wounds Another Iran Cabinet Chief

TEHRAN, Iran, March 18 (AP)—Dr. Abdul Hamid Zanganeh, education minister in the government of assassinated Premier Gen. Ali Hassempour, was wounded today by a single shot fired by a law student.

Zanganeh has been criticized severely by leftist students at Tehran University, where he is deputy chancellor and dean of the law faculty.

Hospitalized

Zanganeh has hospitalized, still conscious.

Police arrested the would-be assassin at the university, scene of the shooting. He was identified as Mostafaei Ghomi, a student in the Muslim clerical seminary at the university.

Since Razmara's assassination 12 days ago, the fanatical religious sect responsible for the slaying had threatened the lives of other cabinet ministers.

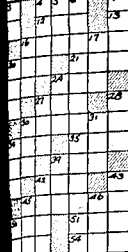

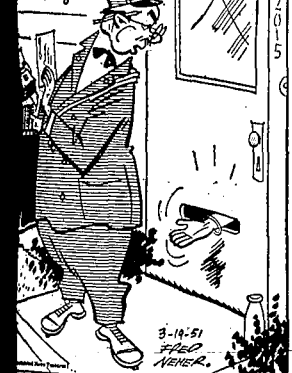

### Easter Sales Move at Fast Pace in U.S.

NEW YORK, March 19 (AP)—The each register of the nation's retailers are ringing up Easter sales at a merry clip.

The consensus is that sales in dollars and cents are running about 30 per cent ahead of last year but 50 per cent behind in the number of items than he did a year ago.

Prices Higher  
The difference could be accounted for by an estimated eight to 14 per cent increase in prices between last Easter and this.

Tim and Houdstreet, the business reporting service, puts it this way: The overall pre-Easter level of consumer purchasing is slightly above the level for the similar week-before-Easter period last year, and is noticeably above that for the comparable 1949 period.

They say lack of sharper seasonal ties in Easter retail trade was due to a combination of less extensive spring apparel buying and a decline in durable goods purchasing from the high mid-winter level.

Trend Differs  
Storekeepers report a differing trend in the pre-Easter buying compared with last year.

They say that in 1950 the shopper withdrew from the traditional apparel purchases to such items as television. This year, they added, the shopper has returned to the purchase of apparel.

It is not surprising that millinery is high on the list of items sought by shoppers. A heavy demand for women's accessories is reported and the requests for men's shirts and other haberdashery articles are substantial.

Accessories Selling  
Footwear for both men and women has been bought and heavy sales are reported in the clips, belt buckles and similar men's accessories.

The buying of such apparel as coats, suits and dresses is reported above last year but several storekeepers say it is not up to expectations. Inclement weather in many sections has held down this type of sales, they say.

The weather is a big factor in pre-Easter sales. At least one retailer holds the belief that Easter or no the shopper doesn't buy any, spring-robining when the weather's raw and damp.

Easter is earlier this year, than last—March 23 instead of April 3—and March weather is hot, usually conducive to sending the shopper running for Easter finery.

### Mountain States Phone Firm Asks Utah Rate Boost
