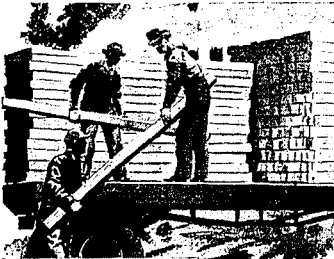

Pirate Hoard Clue Located

By N. J. Boy

HER BOTTOM, N. J., March 22 (AP)—A boy polling for turtles has hauled up a brass plate bearing the name of Captain Kidd from the muds near here, giving treasure hunters a new clue to the pirates' stowaway millions.

Charles Fletcher of nearby Cedar Point, a collector of local legends, claims the plate bears the initials of the famous sea captain. The plate is inscribed: "William Kidd's treasure."

There is a possibility the plate was pulled by the youth from a sunken in the mazel's muddy bottom, Fletcher said.

First Actual Relief

The manacle in the first actual relief of Kidd found here, though almost every foot of Long Beach had been dug up by searchers in the past 20 years.

The plate, with holes in each corner, though not attached to a chest, bears three letters which Kidd's name—"KID" or "JK"—and the letters "N" and "21."

Three Theories

Packer cited two theories about the plate. The first is that the three letters could refer to the initials of the boy who found the plate, which is "N. J. B." and the letters "N" and "21."

Another theory is that the letters are "KID," which might refer to the "Queen Merchant," a cargo ship Kidd captured and used as a floating base in the 1690s.

Only \$75,000 of Kidd's legendary multi-million dollar hoard were found, more than 100 miles off the eastern end of Long Island.

1951 Weather Not Half Bad, Check Shows

By United Press
The weatherman warmed up his hands today and said the weather in Idaho so far this year "wasn't half bad. He said he had figures to prove it.

Records maintained by the weather bureau in Boise show January of this year was milder in all sections of the state. This was especially true in north Idaho, where the average temperature was 35 degrees. Last year, the bureau said, the northern division average was only 14.5 degrees.

Less Precipitation
All sections of the state had less precipitation in January, 1934, than in the same month last year but it still ran above normal. Snowfall during January was above the average for all the months of January during the same 10-year period. This year so far the fall was only 62 per cent of the record-breaking average of last year.

February, the weatherman said, was very cold during the first two-thirds of the month. Last year, the February temperatures averaged very close to normal throughout the state with only very warm spells in the last week of the month. The warm spell this year came in the second week of February. The latter half of the month definitely was cooler with temperatures well below normal in the last week of the month.

Gains in February
In the northern part of the state, the precipitation during February was less than last year but it was definitely heavier this year in southern and south-central Idaho. It was slightly heavier in the southeast. March has been featured by sub-normal temperatures in all sections through most of the first three weeks. But, the weather man said, March, 1934, also had above normal mercury readings. Farmers with a job of plowing to do got a bit of a break this month. Less precipitation fell this month than in March, 1933, and the warm average rain throughout the state.
