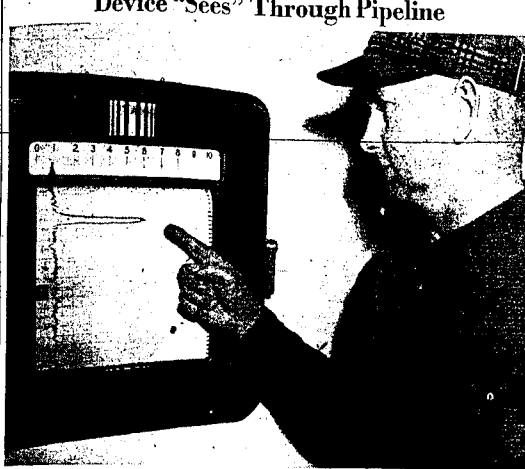

Device "Sees" Through Pipeline

You can't see what's inside a big pipeline. That makes a problem for the operators of any pipeline carrying a variety of products—a problem that usually because of the relatively small volumes of a variety of petroleum products taken off at many points along its 560-mile line from Salt Lake City to Pasco, Wash. To lick this problem research scientists were assigned to find something better than the common methods of identifying the contents of the line. The scientists came up with a chemical marker which can be detected by an electronic device outside the line.

The electronic device "sees" the chemical marker between different products and is connected with a recording device to tell the operator at a take-off point just when the product is changing. There are two take-off points in Magic Valley, Twin Falls and Burley.

Although the dispatcher at the Salt Lake City pumping station knows approximately when any particular product will reach a certain take-off station, he can't tell the station operator just when to start drawing from the line.

The recorder eliminates this difficulty and to give the station operator about two hours advance notice another electronic device is clamped to the pipeline several miles away. The two recorders are placed side by side in the operator's office.

By checking them he can tell just when to set motorized valves in operation to draw off all or part of the products flowing through the line.

Stove oil for Boise might be followed by gasoline for Twin Falls. A minute amount of the chemical marker is placed between the two products and follows their junction along the pipeline.

When the gasoline reaches here, the electronic detector and recorder notify the local operator. The equipment is so sensitive that such mar-

terial as the small amount of luminous point on a watch dial is detected. At the Twin Falls take-off point there is storage for nearly 2,000,000 gallons of different types of gasoline, stove oil and diesel fuel. Before the line was continued to Pasco, the local station was a terminal and used a small tank to store the small amount of materials mixed when one product follows another.

A leased wire telephone is used for communication along the pipeline but will be replaced by a high frequency radio system. One of the radio relay towers will be located atop Mount Harrison.

Little maintenance work has been required so far along the new high pressure line, company officials report. However, fully equipped maintenance crews are stationed at Salt Lake City, Boise and Pasco.

They handle any repairs needed either by the line or take-off equipment. The line is patrolled regularly from the air, by ground vehicles and by walking. After the radio communication system is installed there will be communication maintenance crews at Boise and Salt Lake City.

A scraper is sent through the pipeline regularly to clean it. Cold weather has had little effect on the line during its first winter of operation. Temperatures of products being delivered through the line ranged from 30 to 35 degrees during the cold weather but are up to about 40 degrees now, station employees report.

KETCHUM, March 24—Clearing the Galena summit highway into the Stanley basin is a rough job, Ask Norman Wilson, state highway superintendent here, if you have any doubt.

He said a rotary crew worked 11 hours to cut through a 100-foot wide 11-foot deep drift. The job finally was completed last night. Snow had packed so tight the rotary would go under rather than through the drift. Wilson explained that the workers had to use shovels to break the drift into the rotary.

The job opened the road to the summit, Wilson said. A look down the other end of another terrific job ahead, he explained.
