**Border State Farmers Win Fight on Pay**

Magnuson pointed out that the chief source of foreign labor for the northwest is Mexico, Hawaii and Puerto Rico and said transportation costs for Washington, Idaho and Oregon total more than \$500,000 annually. He declared:  
 "Not only is this additional cost a burden on the individual grower, it also represents a 'bait and chain' his products must carry into the market where the northern crops compete with those grown in border states."

## POWERLESS TO REVOLT

When Hitler invaded Russia in 1941, he made many mistakes both military and political. None was more senseless than the brutalities of the German occupation, and would have given the people of the broad Ukraine in western Russia.

Evidence continues to grow that the troops of the German army are being brought over to the German side whole-souled if they had been accepted as friends.

But the brutalities of the nazis swiftly quashed the uprising of spirit and drove the Ukrainians back to the support of the Russian Communist regime as the lesser of two evils.

The lesson in this event for us is that we must not make the same error. We must not assume that all Russians are bad because the Kremlin is bad.

The war permitted many Russians to escape permanently to the west. Almost without exception every ordinary Russian is thoroughly disgusted with the Russian government, and goes so far as to declare that the Kremlin knows its propaganda takes no real hold on the people. The question then arises, "Why do they pump it out?" He says the propaganda files that otherwise would be a vast vacuum, that it keeps the people somewhat confused and disoriented and prevents the crystallizing of opposition ideas which, if allowed to develop, might form the nucleus of real revolt.

A veteran U. S. reporter who covered Moscow for many years declares that at 35 virtually every ordinary Russian is thoroughly disillusioned at the red regime. He says these citizens are either cynical, resigned or gripped by intense inner rebellion.

It is wrong for us to assume, furthermore, that the average Russian does not appreciate as well as we do that the communist dream of a "workers' paradise" has not come true. Everything indicates that the Russians realize their own position, the gap between reality and communist promises.

His real wages are probably lower than the Russian worker enjoyed in 1928, when the communist regime began. His housing is much worse than in the 1920's. It is no exaggeration to describe Russia's towns and cities as one great slum. He's driven by his government, his employer and his family to work to the absolute limit of his energies.

He's tied to his job like a slave (15,000-900 are slaves in the most exact sense). Yet he can't get out of the Soviet Union, regardless of his wishes, and his family, as he falters under the crushing weight of this relentless pressure, it is eased to give him relief? Certainly not. **Plans Drafted To Aid Salmon Runs in Basin**

WASHINGTON, March 28 (AP)—The fish and wildlife service reports today it has developed plans for a huge new research program for maintaining the spawning runs of the Columbia river. A report from the service's branch of fishery biology said the program was drafted "in response to a request for research plans to match a heavy construction schedule of new high dams proposed for the Columbia." National defense needs require that this power increase be made now," the report said. Knowledge Lacking "Fishery interests, however, do not have the knowledge necessary to provide safe passage for anadromous (spawning) fishes past high dams because heretofore the concern has been with low dams—less than 100 feet high—and irrigation diversions." Paul Thompson, assistant chief of the branch, told a reporter the proposed program has been approved by a committee appointed by Secretary of the Interior Chapman, but has not been presented to the bureau of the budget. ### Sales of New Cars Running At Fast Pace

DETROIT, March 28 (AP)—New car sales are running heavier than factory output.

Most recent surveys disclose that new stocks are not building up for the spring selling period immediately ahead. They suggest, too, the virtual certainty of at least a temporary shortage in this year's second quarter.

The spring rush for new cars also has started in some quarters. It will gain momentum during the next few months unless new restrictions on credit intervene. Most industry sources say the present credit curbs have had little or no effect on sales volume.

Alm of Regulation

A slowing down of credit buying was noted when the federal reserve board sought when it reimposed the much discussed regulation in last November. It requires a down payment of one-third and allows only 15 months to complete payments on new car purchases.

The buying surge could speed itself by mid-July, if not earlier. The feeling is growing in many automotive circles that the supply of new cars will not exceed the demand after July.

Most of the present new car sales involve a trade-in that finds its way quickly to a used car lot or garage court. That means large used car stocks when sales level off generally about the beginning of the second half of the year.

So everything points to plenty of cars—new or used—for everybody, later in the year.

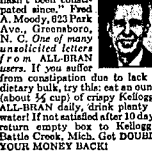

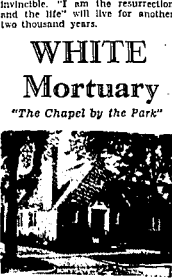

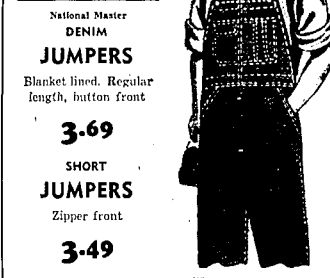
