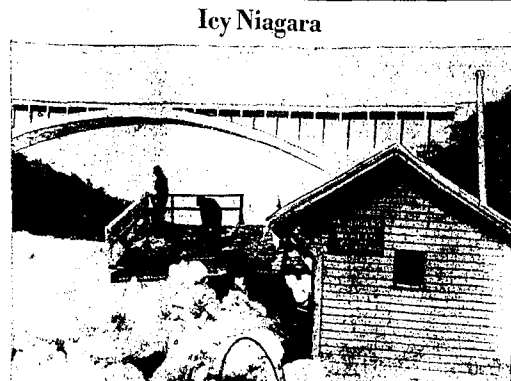

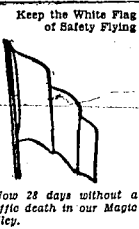

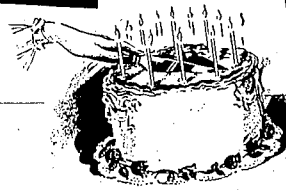

**Early Ruling Is Urged on School Plan**  
BOISE, March 29 (AP)—The state board of education had been urged to reach a decision on the school transportation formula as soon as possible so contracts can be offered to carriers.

Superintendents E. A. Thomas, Meridian, and M. A. Ryan said they could not figure out salaries for carriers until they know whether transportation contracts will be borne entirely by their districts or partially by the state.

John J. Hillman of the Idaho Education association said trustees of common school districts are particularly "sought in a bind" on issuance of contracts to teachers and determining the school levy.

Hillman said that the annual school levy election in those districts to hold the third Friday of April is about to begin and the state will share in the transportation costs by March 31, Hillman said.

Those districts have until June 30 to hold school levy elections. However, March is the usual month for sending out teacher contracts for the following year.

Court Ruling Blocks Utility Sale to PUDs

COLLIERIE, Wash., March 29 (AP)—Plans of three public utility districts to buy the Washington Water Power company, have been knocked in the head today by a court ruling that the purchase would be illegal.

Judge B. H. Morrison granted the permanent injunction asked by seven Spokane citizens to halt the deal.

However he left the way open for the PUDs to purchase Washington property if the company, after PUDs are formed, can be sold to them.

The PUDs had announced intentions to buy WWP for \$50,000,000 from the American Power and Light company which owns all WWP common stock.

**Attorney General Sees North Idaho Victory in Ruling**  
BOISE, March 29 (AP)—Idaho attorney general Robert E. Smylie said today he is confident of a permanent injunction issued today against sale of Washington Water Power company property in north Idaho may insure construction of north Idaho's Cabinet Gorge dam.

Smylie, who with Gov. Len Jordan had watched the proposed sale of WWP's north Idaho properties to Washington public utility districts slowly, commented:

"The decision is a significant victory for north Idaho. Judge Morrison's ruling probably insures the completion of construction of the \$40,000,000 Cabinet Gorge project on Clark Fork river in Blaine county. It was apparently a part of the WWP plan to go through in the event of the sale."

**Lead Output Dips**  
WASHINGTON, March 29 (AP)—The bureau of mines says lead production during January totaled 25,172 short tons, compared with 26,745 tons in December.

The average daily rate of production declined two per cent to 1,192 tons, the lowest rate since last July.

The formula would include 75 per cent of the school transportation cost in the minimum education program. It was a controversial feature in the 1931 legislative session just past.

At Rupert, John Remsburg, chairman of the state board of education, said he had heard Fowler was resigning, but had not yet received official notice.

BOISE, March 29 (AP)—Establishments serving food or drink will come under price ceiling regulations April 1, Harry I. Frost, district office of price stabilization director, said today.

He said some 40 meetings will be held in 23 southern Idaho and eastern Oregon communities to assist operators of eating and drinking establishments in complying with regulations.

First of the meetings will be in Caldwell tomorrow and Nampa, Friday.

Show Cause Order Given On Eviction

District Judge Hugh A. Baker Wednesday afternoon ordered Arvid Cross to show cause at 10 a. m. April 1 why he should not be ejected from his home.

Arvid Cross, the former employer of W. C. Robinson, from the latter's place in business, 320 Main street, Twin Falls, during a recent fight over the course of an action brought by Robinson.

In a complaint filed with district court Wednesday, Robinson stated that Cross on March 21 ordered Robinson to leave the premises by May 1. Cross claimed that he had been in possession of the place since Feb. 1, 1947, while admitting that Cross requested the use and benefit of Robinson.

Robinson alleges that the only consideration given for the lease was the rent, paid by Robinson through his manager, Cross.

The complaint states that in September, 1947, Cross signed a contract to manage Robinson's loan business in Twin Falls. The contract was terminated earlier this month and Cross was replaced.

Prior to the lease with Henson, Robinson had rented the premises on a monthly basis. The rent was paid by Cross as Robinson's agent, according to the complaint.

In the judgment, Robinson asks the court to find the lease the property of Robinson, to forbid Cross from disposing of the lease until the final judgment is determined and to make Cross pay the costs of the suit.

Hoffart and O'Leary, Boise attorneys for Robinson, have filed what they claim to be copies of the contract between Cross and Robinson, the lease in question between Henson and Cross and the eviction notice.

### Atomic Subs Due in Year, Solon Avers

**SAN FRANCISCO**, March 29 (AP)—Atomic-powered submarines, potentially capable of "revolutionizing" sea warfare, will join U. S. fleets within a year, Sen. Warren Magnuson, D., Wash., predicted at a press conference.

Magnuson stopped in San Francisco en route to Japan, to address local shipping leaders.

"A small model of the atom sub is in operation," he said. Navy men have told him the full-sized vessel can go just about as fast as it wants to, and speeds of 30 to 60 knots on the surface will not be out of the ordinary.

Present top speeds of submarines are a secret, the senator said, but atomic-powered submarines will be able to "more than double the speed of submarines we now employ."

Magnuson said ships no longer will be able to rely on speed to escape submarine attack.

Instead, "they must become self-contained units which can protect themselves from submarines" rather than hoping to outrun them.

The cold physics lab would be built on the same site it was said. The AEC long has been sponsoring research with materials at temperatures close to absolute zero.
