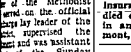


Kota Highway Ship Is Fatal To Kent Tatlock

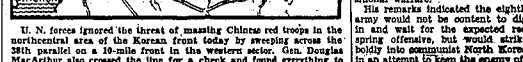

High Court Says Dry Vote Cannot Revoke Permits
BOISE, April 3 (AP) - The Idaho supreme court has ruled that licenses of liquor-by-the-drink establishments are not revoked when a city votes "dry" in a local option election.
The court, in a four to one decision, held that the licenses do not expire until their regular expiration date under the city's license.
A declaratory judgment of District Judge O. A. Sutton that licenses of Nampa clubs should not have been revoked immediately after the liquor-by-the-drink March 14, 1950, was affirmed.
Justice Darrah Johnson, in the majority decision, said "It is the intent of the legislature to void licenses as of the date of such negative election it is reasonable to expect that it would have no effect until the next election and that it would also have made provision for resale to terminate all outstanding licenses."

March Labor Roll Soars to All-Time High
WASHINGTON, April 3 (AP) - Civilian employment reached 60,179,000 in March—an all-time high for the month.
The census bureau, reporting this yesterday, said the number of persons in jobs soared 1,274,000 in March while unemployment fell 260,000 to a 24,700,000 total, the highest March level in four years.
"Expanding defense and seasonal developments" were credited for the gains. The bureau said a combination of factors has boosted civilian employment by 10,000,000 since the start of the war.
Farm employment scored a seasonal low of 68,000 to reach a level of 6,800,000 but remained below the level of a year ago.
The labor department reported employment in the aircraft and parts industries was boosted by 100,000 in the first six months after the Korean war began.
A total of 352,000 persons held jobs in the industry in January, 1951, a further increase of at least 20 percent was anticipated by employers by next July.

Governor Stands Firm on '51 Auto License Decree
BOISE, April 3 (AP) - Gov. Len Jordan is standing firm on his proclamation that Idaho motorists must have their 1951 license plates or receipts showing they have applied for new tags.
"The governor said county assessors had protested that the ruling will increase their work and asked that the 1950 plates be honored until 1951 plates are available.
"I have no authority and no desire to say that last year's licenses can be used beyond the statutory deadline," the governor said. Deadline for obtaining the new plates was March 31.
Many counties have run out of 1951 licenses because a shortage of steel has prevented the proprietary factory from turning out an ample supply.
The governor said most of the pressure was coming from assessors of larger counties.

WALLA WALLA, Wash., April 3 (AP) - The Northwest Agriculture Labor association is laying plans for bringing 1,000 or more Mexican or Puerto Rican workers for the 1951 season in Washington.
The association held a meeting here today at a meeting here where the total overall cost will be near \$100,000. That includes transportation, administration and other charges.
It is estimated to average out to a cost of from \$1 to \$1.75 for each man-day of labor which will result. The officials said the cost is likely to cut the program below the actual estimate of needs.
A similar imported labor pool is reported to be planned by Oregon grape and by sugar firms in Idaho.
R. T. Magley, secretary-manager of the labor association, said there may be some increases in the total to be recruited for Washington. The board of directors is scheduled to meet here April 9.

REVOLUT—The newspaper headlines in recent weeks, for instance, reflect widespread resentment and a spirit of revolt against Russian tyranny in Poland, and the strong desire to free the people of Poland from the yoke of Russian domination. It is not only the people of Poland, but also the people of other countries, who are suffering from the effects of the Russian revolution.

CONDITIONS—From China comes reports that there are several millions of guerrillas battling the Mao Tse-tung regime in the field or in the shadows. For years and years the Chinese people have not even established contact with them in a war on the common enemy.

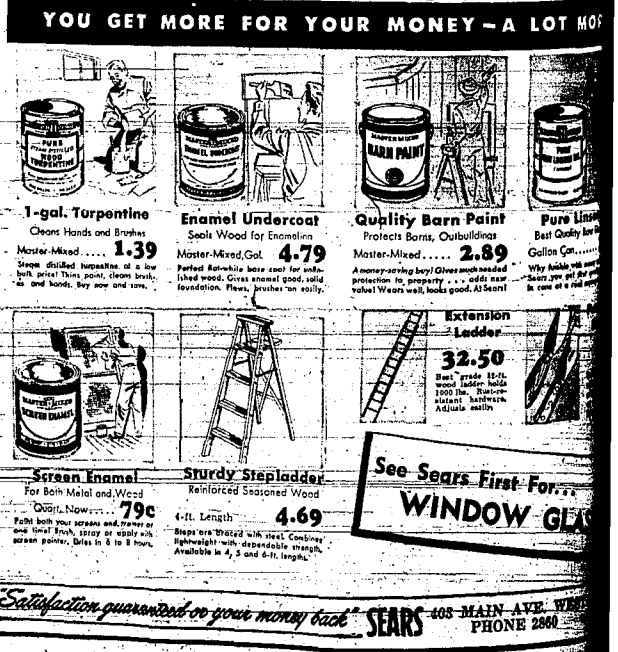

The winter kill in Whitman county is blamed for 10 per cent in some areas to more than 50 per cent, said the county agent's office. Other agents gave similar reports.

40 Per Cent Loss

Lincoln County Agent Ross T. Treadwell, estimated 40 per cent of some farmers' crops in his county were frozen out.

Alternate freezing and thawing throughout the winter played havoc with the wheat, Dacres said. The first cold spell weakened the wheat, he said, because there was no snow cover. Winds added to the damage, and when days were warm and nights were below freezing, he said.

Cost Heavy

The agents agreed that no one thing was responsible entirely for the heavy damage, which Dacres said will amount to thousands of dollars.

Elmer A. Turner, county agent for the area, said that in some years as a result of the winter kill he had seen a shortage of spring wheat seed.

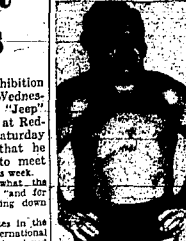
