Mountain Home project," he pointed out. Baker also discussed the navigation aspects of overall development and noted their importance particularly in the Snake River and Washington. With transportation up the Columbia to Lewiston, farmers in that area will benefit up to 10 cents per bushel on grain, he claimed.

In an answer and question period which followed his talk, Baker and Stanton outlined some of the issues involved.

Stanton charged aluminum companies were using 40 to 50 per cent of the Bonneville power while employing a million more men as compared to most industries.

"Quintessential," Baker admitted this charge but said the fabrication plants which will spring up will greatly increase the overall development.

Stanton also claimed since 1941 the Idaho Power company had a greater percentage increase in production than any system including Bonneville and had the only ample supply of power in the northwest. To this Baker answered that Idaho Power company's rate wasn't attracting heavy industry whereas industries were contracting for two mill federal power, faster than it could be produced.

The Idaho Power company representative said he favored multipurpose dams, but not Hells canyon dam, the cost of which he said would be charged 94 per cent for power.

Following the questions, Aidé Dainton, a spokesman for a delegation from Paul Reubens' long resolution favoring construction of Hells canyon project as proposed by the department of the interior.

# School Chiefs Back Teacher Pay Increase

BOISE, April 20 (AP)—The Idaho School Administrators' association is on record today in favor of increased minimum teachers salaries and a decrease in the size of class room units for school finance purposes.

The action was taken during a lengthy session in reviewing action of the 1961 legislature on education matters.

Involved in Program

Minimum teacher salaries, classroom unit and average daily attendance are factors involved in determining the public school equalization program.

The school administrators also went on record for election of the state board of education and appointment of the state superintendent of public instruction.

Actions passed a bill to provide for election of the state board, but it died in the house.

State Sen. Kenneth Thatcher, R. Madison, one of the leaders of the 20-called education bloc, explained the school transportation program adopted by the state board of education and reviewed the transportation controversy.

The school administrators endorsed the holding of a budget hearing for school districts.

Gerald Wallace, assistant superintendent of Boise schools, outlined the increasing unavailability of teachers in Idaho. The administrator recommended on teachers' unions will be taken before the ILEA delegate assembly.

Teachers' union representatives, including the Idaho Education Association, are scheduled to meet in Boise on Saturday.

Their recommendations also will be taken before the ILEA delegate assembly.

### \$7,300 Gross in 1949 Is Average Of State Farms

BOISE, April 20 (AP)—The average Idaho farm sold \$7,300 worth of products in 1949, Virgin Kennedy, farm management specialist for the University of Idaho extension service, said today.

The average income was \$4,000 from all crops and \$3,000 from livestock.

The figures are gross income before deduction of cost of production. The study showed that about half of the state's commercial farms had products valued at more than \$5,000.

Twin Falls county had 166 farms earning more than \$5,000, followed by Canyon, 150; Blaine, 101; Bonneville, 84, and Cassia, 74.

Of the 5,000 farms grossing between \$5,000 and \$10,000, Canyon county had 800, Twin Falls, 734, and Blaine, 680.

### Battle Looms Over Plan on New Controls

WASHINGTON, April 20 (AP)—A congressional battle loomed today over President Truman's expected recommendations for a more strict control program including tighter rent regulations and perhaps a freeze on food prices.

Mr. Truman told his news conference Wednesday he will send only a special message within 10 days recommending changes in the defense production act—parts of which expire June 30.

The President did not detail the changes he will propose. Some administration officials, however, are known to favor tougher rent controls including a provision allowing the government to put on ceilings wherever considered necessary, and to impose controls on business offices and on new housing in defense areas. New housing is exempted from rent control under present law.

Some White House advisers also want to freeze farm parity prices and use subsidies to hold down food prices. Parity is a formula designed to give farmers a fair return on their products in relation to what they pay for other goods and services.

If parity levels were frozen, future increases of food prices below those levels would not be prohibited. However, the action would put a ceiling on food prices.

### Air Rifle Pellet Hits Girl's Face

Barbara Butler, 7, narrowly escaped a serious eye injury Thursday evening when she was struck with a pellet from an air rifle, the little girl was injured by two youths who were shooting in Rock Creek canyon below Canyon View street.

The pellet struck the girl on the edge of her eye, breaking the skin. Her mother reported a preliminary examination indicated the eye was not injured.

Names of the two youths who were shooting the air rifle were given to police but the parents of the girl asked that no action be taken against them.

### Prices for Spuds Hit Season's High

IDAHO FALLS, April 20 (AP)—Potato prices have climbed to a new high for the season.

Wholesale report—the price to growers ranges from \$1.25 to \$1.50 according to size. Most shippers report there are few large tubers being offered for sale.

The price during the latter part of the season has ranged mostly between \$1.10 and \$1.30 according to size.

### Mistrial Ends Lawsuit Over Prisoner Pay

CHICAGO, April 20 (AP)—A law firm's suit to collect fees to represent 785 war-time prisoners of the Japanese has ended in a mistrial. Federal Judge Walter J. Leary declared a mistrial and adjourned what he termed "misrepresentations" of influence with the court.

Bought Fees

The law firm of Arvey, Hodges and Mantel had sought to collect \$450,000 in fees for representing the 785 former prisoners. The men were employees of contractors. They were taken prisoners by the Japanese while building military installations on Pacific islands.

The former prisoners originally sued for \$5,000,000 damages from various contractors. They settled for a total of \$4,500,000 paid by the government under the war claims act.

### "Calamity Jane" Sued to Recover Show's Costume

A woman sometimes known as "Calamity Jane" was named defendants in a civil complaint filed in justice court Thursday by Max G. Lloyd, attorney for G. P. Bundance.

The complaint alleges "Calamity Jane," whose proper name is Fay Harding, agreed to work in Bundance's frontier style act at the Arvon Theater, Paul, April 10 and 11. It further alleges Bundance loaned Miss Harding a buckskin frontier style vest with green trim and a pair of Justin black cowboy boots for use in the show.

According to the complaint, Miss Harding took part in the act on April 10 and was paid for her performance. It alleges that she did not show up on April 11 and did not return the vest and boots.

Bundance asks the court to order the return of the vest and boots, valued at \$20.

### Teachers Joining On 1951 Contracts

POCATELLO, April 20 (AP)—Members of the Pocatello Teachers Guild have voted against signing individual contracts with the school district.

Paul Rowe, guild president, said the unit's request for a 25 per cent increase in salaries brought an offer of only six per cent from the trustees. "That is not even in the realm of compromise," Rowe declared.

# Schools to Ballot on Proposed Changes in Basketball Tournament

BOISE, April 20 (AP)—Idaho high school principals will vote within the next week on a proposed change in the type of state basketball tournament they prefer.

E. F. Grider, secretary of the Interscholastic Activities Association, said a wild double-header for the state tournament plans will be drafted Friday. The ballot is being prepared for class A and B schools with the possibility that different types of state tournament set-ups will be in effect for each classification.

Grider said among the plans to be voted upon include:

A 16-team tournament with four teams from northern Idaho and 12 from southern Idaho. Northern Idaho schools entering the state tournament would be champions of both northern districts, runners-up from district 1 (Coeur d'Alene area) and the winner of a play-off between the third best team from district 1 and the runner-up from district 2 (Shoshone area).

Separate north-south tournaments with a two-out-of-three game playoff between the winners. Four teams would enter the state tournament from each district. The winners of the two district tournaments would be the state champions. Regional meets would be held for districts one, two, three and four (Coeur d'Alene, Shoshone and Twin Falls areas).

Grider said it is also possible that the first round of the state tournament, including retention of the present eight-team state tournament, would not gain much support in the schools.

A motion to keep the tournament set-up as it now is was defeated on a vote of 10 to 1. The motion argued that the state tournament should be given a "hardcore" airing.

The board of control was delegated as a committee to work on possible realignment of the present six districts.

The matter will be considered by the board at its next meeting. Any re-districting wouldn't go into effect until 1953, he said.

The re-districting proposal was brought up when it was pointed out that the number of class B schools in the present districts varies from 25 in district four (Magic Valley) and 20 in district two to only nine in the Shoshone area and 10 in the Idaho Falls area.

Number of class A schools varies from three in district two to eight and nine in most of the other districts. Grangerville is expected to move into class A competition next fall giving district two four teams.

Grider said it was possible the board would suggest different district boundaries for class A and B schools.

The delegate assembly defeated two proposed amendments designed to permit private and parochial schools to enter the tournament, thus becoming eligible for the state basketball tournament. The vote was 10 to 2. A no vote and 24 to 25 to no on the other.

Passed 62 to 17 was an amendment to require only 15 days of practice before the first football game. The amendment also set labor day as the date for the opening football game on Aug. 22 as the first day for fall practice.
