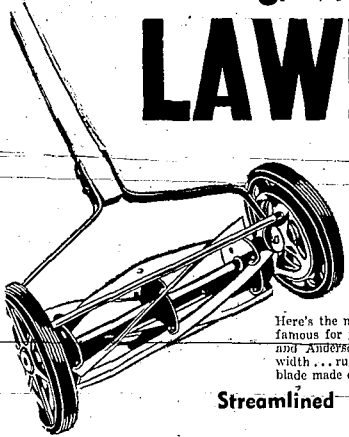

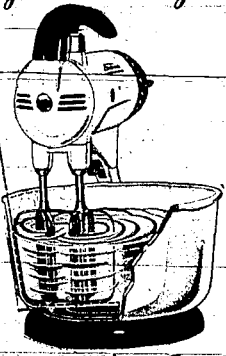

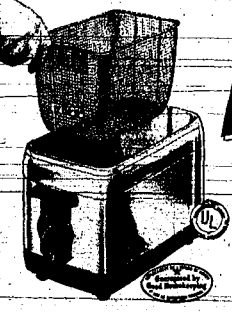

### Costly Hunting Dog Purchased by Boy 18, Brings Top Breed to Magic Valley

Like many another Magic Valley youth, 18-year-old Neil Morrison likes to hunt. Like many another hunter, Neil wanted a hunting dog. But getting a hunting dog was no bill-and-me proposition for him. He studied the best available books and magazines on the subject. He had been breeding fancy pigeons—prize, now taken over by his sister, Pat—and he knew the importance of blood lines.

His choice was a Weimaraner, (pronounced vee-ma-ner) a rare breed whose owners and breeders say it outperforms just about any other breed you can name.

Neil's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Harold Morrison, 601 Addison avenue west, were somewhat set back when Neil came up with his proposition to buy a \$350 Weimaraner—from a breeder in Iowa. It had to be a lot of dog for that price, and it was turned out to be.

But Neil had been reading magazines from selling magazines, circling and running a candy route, Linda von Lechelsdorf, more familiarly known as Edie, was bought. The Morrises believe the bitch was the first of her breed in Magic Valley.

Edie will be 2 years old in July and came here as a pup. Now she has eight pups of her own, whelped over the week-end. She was bred to champion Weimaraner in Boise.

The close control of breeding is one of the more distinctive features of the Weimaraner breed. To keep the breed pure, breeders kill any litters resulting from accidental cross-breeding. They also kill any animals in a Weimaraner breed which show serious faults or bad dispositions.

The breed was developed in Germany about 140 years ago when nobles of the Court of Weimar wanted a highly personalized companion-type hunting dog for all types of game, including deer, wild boar and upland game.

The nobles wanted a dog with courage, a keen nose and sharp eye; a dog which would point and retrieve, reliable on warm and cold scents, obedient to recall under all conditions, and ready to take to water when necessary.

The Weimaraner is known to be a descendant of the Red Schweisshunde, famous in Germany for its strictly enforced program by members of the German Weimaraner club.

No dogs were allowed to leave the country, the number was limited to 1,500 and ownership was limited to members of the club. A similar club was formed in Austria and the breed was introduced in the United States about 1910 when the Weimaraner club of America was formed. There are less than 1,000 Weimarers in this country.

This breed has been publicized widely and writers are apt to say too much, fearing public over-reaction would result in adverse criticism and deserved ridicule. They prefer to say merely that the dog is extremely intelligent but, after all, it's not human.

Among articles about the dog is one entitled "The Greatest Dog in the World" in the September, 1940, issue of True magazine. A similar article appeared in the July, 1940, issue of Argosy magazine.

These articles state the dog can point, retrieve and trail, that it is easy to train with many working in the field while still pups, and that its "soft mouth" doesn't hurt game.

One article also stated an eastern owner had a problem in his Weimaraner insisting on answering the phone. Descriptions were given of cases in which they outperformed bloodhounds in locating missing persons.

Weimarers have a velvet-smooth silver fawn coat, woolly enough under its slick surface so that they can retrieve in icy water. They weigh between 60 and 80 pounds, are hard to tire, strong and speedy. Hunters refer to them as grey ghosts.

While Morrison's Weimaraner is believed to be the first in Magic Valley, there are others. Visitors at the Y-Club at Bliss used to be amazed by the intelligence of one owned by C. M. Decker. It was killed by a car.

Decker's Weimaraner, Photo, used a paw to hold up the slats of a Venetian blind so it could look outside. The dog also had been trained to retrieve silver dollars, then slap them on the bar with its paw.

Decker now has another Weimaraner 14 months old which he is training strictly for the field, feeding the dogs for field work. They learn quickly by instinct, repeating performance the second or third time they see it, and usually better than the original.

Another Weimaraner killed by a car was one owned by John Galt; Wendell, there's still a Weimaraner at Wendell, a pup owned by Jack Dixon. At Hagerman, Mr. and Mrs. J. E. Farmer are keeping a Weimaraner a little more than a year old, owned by their son, Second Lieutenant J. E. Farmer Jr., Ft. Benning, Ga. There are several of the breed in Boise.

But on the Morrison acreage in Twin Falls, the attention is centered on Edie and her eight pups. Young Neil has set a price of \$300 on the females and \$250 on the males. If all goes well and if he can sell them all, he'll receive a handsome return on his original investment and breeding expense.

### Odd Twist Is Seen in Film Reds Inquiry

WASHINGTON, April 22 (AP)—Before the house un-American activities committee ends its new Hollywood investigation, the nation may get a shocking peek behind the scenes of United States World War II propaganda.

The investigators are trying to learn to the public the story of what made the Hollywood Writers Mobilization tick. This outfit has been tagged as subversive by practically every official authority on the subject of conspiracy to overthrow the government by violence for the glory of the Kremlin.

The communist newspaper Daily Worker steps up now to defend the Kremlin's baby. But with some astonishing advice.

The Daily Worker says that for the real story on where the Hollywood Writers Mobilization operated and how, the committee should investigate the World War II operations of the following: Office of war information, treasury, war and navy departments, the American Red Cross, individual cabinet members and the top military brass.

Asked for help, All of these men and agencies, the papers said, called frequently on the mobilization for writing jobs. It claimed that "most of the movie and radio scripts and rally speeches for treasury war bond drives were mobilization products."

It estimated that 142 movie shorts were prepared for the armed services, and 748 radio productions for army camps at home and abroad. The mobilization also turned out hundreds of cartoons, slogans, songs, feature stories and radio plays for general use.

But all writers in the mobilization were communists or fellow travelers or even sympathetic with the Reds. But it was, nevertheless, a communist-front organization dedicated to the foreign policies of the Soviet Union.

### Wallgren to Quit Power Panel Job

WASHINGTON, April 22 (AP)—Mon Wallgren, former governor of Washington, announced yesterday he will resign as chairman of the federal power commission, "sometime this summer."

His reasons for giving up the job, he said in an interview, are personal and private.

Asked if he was considering re-entering politics in his home state, Wallgren said he was "not sure the people want me." Then he added that he might go home "and look the situation over."

Wallgren, who is 60, is a close friend of President Truman. Early in 1940 the President nominated him for chairman of the national resources board but withdrew the nomination when opposition developed in the senate.

In November, 1939, Mr. Truman appointed him to the power commission.

# U. N. Control Of Korea War Policy Sought

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y., April 22 (AP)—The American Association for the United Nations has proposed that the United Nations assembly take over responsibility for major military decisions in the Korean war. This would mean Washington would be relieved as U. N. agent directing the unified command.

The 60-nation assembly, which includes Russia and the communist Soviet bloc, would be called upon for major decisions in the battle against communist aggression.

The association is a non-profit organization with 75 chapters in the United States. It is not connected with the United Nations but it seeks to promote understanding of the aims of the U. N.

In a letter to American Chief Delegate Warren P. Austin, the association's executive committee said General MacArthur in his speech to Congress last night of the necessity that any decision involving extension of the war beyond Korea must be taken under the responsibility and by the joint judgment of the United Nations. It said Americans must recognize that military strategy in Korea is not solely an American strategy.

The committee making this finding is headed by William Emerson, Boston, and includes as members, former undersecretary of state, Austin had no comment.

The committee urged on the U. N. to make a vigorous, immediate and imaginative effort to secure a cease-fire and conference to restore peace. It this appeal called on the U. N. to attempt to take such measures to attain its objectives in Korea. These objectives are a unified, independent Korea.

Observers pointed out that while the Russians can be outwitted by the United Nations in the assembly, the Moscow delegates can prevent debate for weeks, making a decision almost impossible.

The security council last July 7 authorized the U. S. to use force to set up the unified command.

### Hit Play Producer Dies in New York

NEW YORK, April 22 (AP)—Albert Herman Woods, 50, who produced plays by the hundreds—including many sold Broadway hits—died Tuesday at the hospital here where he lived.

He was known in theatrical circles as "king of melodramas" because of the nature of the plays he produced. Among his most famous were "Within the Law," "The Trial of Mary Dugan," "The Green Hat," "The Blue Bird," "The Green Hat," "Poison and Perimeter."

Woods claimed to have produced over 400 plays since 1911 until his retirement in 1943. In the 1920's he had 25 road companies touring the nation at one time.

He reportedly lost \$4,000,000 in stock investments in the 1929 depression.

Woods produced a number of musicals in London, a theater in New York and once owned three theaters in Chicago.

### U. S. Steel Plants Set Sales Record

NEW YORK, April 24 (AP)—United States steel corporations reporting new records for dollar volume of sales and income of products shipped in the first quarter, said yesterday its net income for that period was \$76,685,781, equal to \$16.2 a share.

This was slightly under the \$16.21 of \$16.4 a share reported for the like quarter a year ago, although dollar sales climbed to a record \$219,411,083.

Directors ordered a dividend of 75 cents a common share, the same as in the December three months ago, paid June 9 to stockholders of record May 4. A quarterly dividend of \$1.00 on preferred shares was made payable May 19 to stock of record.

Ohio held a news conference at the directors' meeting, that U. S. Steel plants operated at a record 100.2 per cent of their steel-making capacity.

### Avalanche Buries Switzerland Train

AROLO, Switzerland, April 23 (AP)—A fast passenger train from Milan to Zurich was hit by an avalanche and partially buried in the first quarter, said yesterday. Early reports said one person was killed and four seriously injured.

Other passengers sustained light injuries.

Eighty-nine persons were killed by avalanches in Switzerland.

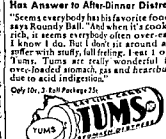

### Stock up Canning Sugar Now, Brannan Advises Homemakers

WASHINGTON, April 23 (AP)—Secretary of Agriculture Charles P. Brannan said today greater stocks of sugar may be insufficient to meet peak season demands unless consumers start stocking parties before the canning season.

Brannan said there is plenty of sugar to meet all domestic needs. But lack of transportation and marketing facilities may make it impossible to move stocks from warehouses to consumer during a rush buying period, he added.

Brannan's warning came in a reply to a letter from Chairman Allen J. Ellender, D. Ia., of the senate agriculture committee protesting the price spread between grocer and retailer prices.

Ellender said producers are getting only \$3.75 per 100 pounds while refiners are getting \$8.25 per 100-pound bag.

He asked Brannan to reduce sugar import quotas to bolster the domestic price.

Brannan said any reduction of imports might result in an actual shortage in sugar supplies.

"Such action would probably cor-

rect the price difficulties," Brannan said. "However, it would involve the risk of reducing supplies to a point below demand."

Brannan said it now appears that consumption of sugar by household and industrial users in 1951 will exceed that of 1950.

Brannan has set the nation's 1951 sugar needs at 8,000,000 tons, the bulk of which must be imported.

Brannan said sugar producers now are getting only about 68 per cent of parity increased purchases, he said, would have a tendency to bring the price up to a more profitable level.

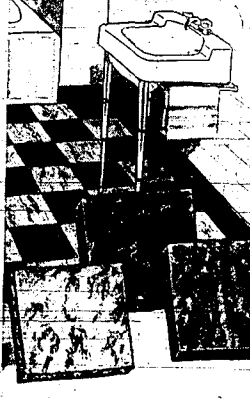

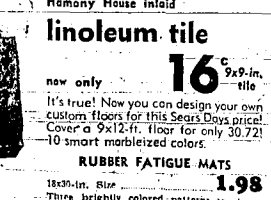

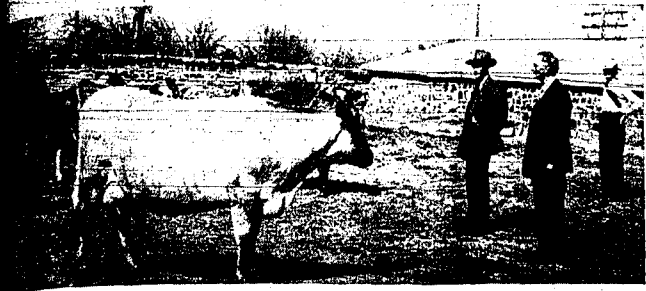

### Six Men at County Farm Able to Work; Ages Vary From 46 to 90 Years

The present staff—and it's short-handed—includes a superintendent, a matron, a day nurse, a night nurse, a farmer and a cook. The county commissioners have been seeking another couple to help care for the best-end where not able fully to care for themselves. And the commissioners are seeking the answer to another problem—that of changing the system of farming to meet the changes in the labor situation. As Chairman L. W. Hawkins points out, there's little profit in a 40-acre farm where all the labor has to be hired. The decrease in the number of residents who can help with the farm, age or slight disability blocked outside their those conditions at the farm's residents.
