POCAHONTO, April 28 (AP)—Robert A. Vogeler, paleontologist, was released today and returned to his home after 17 months in the hands of Hungary's communist government. The release was announced today and the paleontologist's return was hailed as a triumph for the American people.

# Beef Price Curbs, Retail Reductions by New Order

WASHINGTON, April 28 (AP)—The government today announced a new beef price control program calling for almost a dime-a-pound rollback at the butcher shop by Oct. 1.

The program provides for progressively reduced ceilings for live cattle starting next month. Retail prices will remain about the same for the time being, although they will be placed under specific dollar-and-cents ceilings.

The announcement said they will be reduced by from four to five cents a pound on Aug. 1, and again by the same amount on Oct. 1.

The office of price stabilization (OPS) in announcing the new regulations, said that the annual savings to the American public will be about \$700,000,000.

The new ceilings, OPS said, will put beef prices at fall back to about what they were when the Korean war began. Retail prices then were at 10 to 12 cents a pound.

### Explosion of Plane Brings Death for 13

FORT WAYNE, Ind., April 28.—A United Airlines passenger plane exploded in the air near Fort Wayne airport tonight. Officials said eight passengers and the crew were killed.

The control tower at Baer field, the Fort Wayne airport, said the Cleveland-to-Chicago plane reported it was turning east to miss a violent electrical storm in the area.

A few moments later the control tower reported "an orange flash in the sky." Police and sheriff's deputies rushed to the scene and reported finding wreckage on a farm two miles east of the airport. Sheriff Robert Blender said there was no evidence of any survivors. The control tower at the field said the plane carried eight passengers and a crew of either three or four.

The tower said the United plane and a TWA plane both were due at the field shortly after the storm struck Fort Wayne about 7:30 p.m. (CST).

## Idaho War Vets Get Reminder on End of Training

BOISE, April 28 (AP)—Idaho war veterans were reminded today that the coming summer term will be the last during which most veterans will be permitted to enter under GI training.

Leon Fields, regional manager of the veterans administration, said July 25 is the deadline for starting GI courses. A veteran must be

actually in training by that deadline if he wants to continue afterwards.

After beginning the course the veteran must pursue his training to completion unless interrupted for reasons beyond his control, such as entry into military service, Fields said.

Veterans who enlisted or reenlisted under the armed forces voluntary recruitment and retention act of 1945, and Oct. 5, 1946, have four years from the time of their enlistment in which to start training and nine years from that time to complete it.

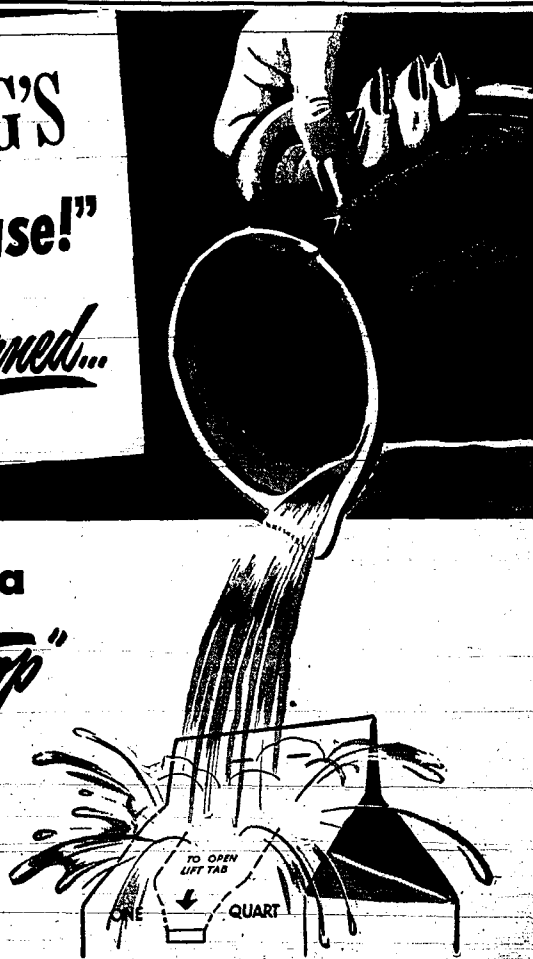

Approximately 60 physicians and surgeons from three states attended the tenth annual clinical session of the South Central Idaho Medical Society yesterday afternoon at the Legion hall.  
Attending from outside Magic Valley were doctors from Salt Lake City, Utah; Elko, Nev.; Boise, Nampa, Aberdeen and Idaho Falls. Speakers were four San Francisco specialists, who were introduced by Dr. Morton Culler, program chairman.

The only plausible explanation offered was that a crowd of children was waiting on the sidewalk and the little girl, not wanting to push her bicycle through the crowd, pushed it in the street beside the curb.

Although it was not believed responsible in any way for the accident, Gillette ordered the green arrow which permits right hand turns removed from the Five Points north traffic signal. He said the removal will tend to slow traffic down at the intersection, will simplify the signals and perhaps prevent confusion which might lead to another tragedy.  
Despite the fact there were scores of witnesses to the accident, police experienced much difficulty in identifying the truck. Through the time element and partial descriptions given by witnesses they said the identification is positive.

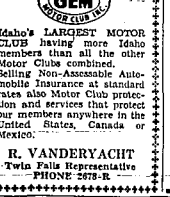

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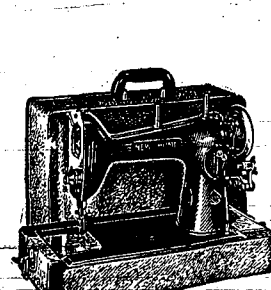



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# Theory of Evolution May Be Shattered by New Discovery

TEHRAN, Iran, April 28 (AP)—A long time ago, perhaps 75,000 years, three phibedaced cavemen watched themselves around a fire and gazed northward across the Caspian sea toward what is now Russia. Then the roof fell in.

This month their shattered bones were dug up by a University of Pennsylvania professor and a young Harvard graduate student. Their discovery in northern Iran, and gravel deposits going back to the ancient ice age is bound to stir the scientific world.

The two anthropologists say the bones they found may have belonged to the oldest human beings ever found. And they may prove that modern man goes considerably farther back in evolution than has been believed.

First word of the archeological find came out of northern Iran more than a week ago, but its significance then had not been appreciated. Today gray-haired Dr. Carleton S. Coon, Devon, Pa., curator of the Mediterranean and far eastern section of the University of Pennsylvania's museum, said the discovery may upset generally accepted theories of evolution.

Coon, who led the digging expedition, said the Caspian men had most of the physical characteristics of modern man except that their brain chambers were smaller. However, geological evidence found at the scene indicates they lived about

the same time or even before such sub-human species as—bulging-browed Neanderthal man.

If this theory is proved, it may upset widespread teaching that modern man descended in more or less direct line from the so-called apemen through sub-human species such as the Neanderthal type. According to Coon, the discovery indicates a true human being (though sapient, as the scientists have dubbed us all today) existed at the same time as the cruder apes.
