Hells-Canyon OK Doubtful; Welker Avers

PAYETTE, April 29 (AP)—Draught for any Hells Canyon Authorization bill was dropped today by Sen. Herman Welker, R., Idaho.

Welker said "I did not speak weeks ago for the bill because of the interior and other members of the Idaho delegation on the bill to authorize the \$44,000,000 dam on Snake river north of Oyster." "If it is not my opinion," he said, "if the Idaho delegation collectively supported the measure, there isn't one chance in 10,000 of the bill ever passing this economy-minded congress," he said.

Accord Cited
The southwestern Idaho Water Conservation project, Inc. said last week it had agreed to a draft of a bill to authorize the huge power project. The bill would guarantee the authorization bill to "safeguard" Idaho interests.

Welker said "I am not undiminished of the merits of each side. I am back here to discuss with my people the different problems involved. But I believe that even if we arrive at a perfect bill that will satisfy both sides, it will not pass this congress."

But as far as it is possible to forecast the industry outlook, cars are going to be available on a normal delivery basis through most of the year ahead.

Despite this prognosis there isn't any likelihood of an overall backing up of inventories to the extent to which some other industries have been affected.

PHILADELPHIA, April 30 (AP)—Philadelphia has bid \$250,000 for each of the major political conventions in 1952.

Chicago, which made no specific cash offer, countered with a promise that hotel rates to delegates would not be increased, and planned a cash bid later.

Delegations from both cities appeared before special committees from the Republican and Democratic national committees in Philadelphia. Philadelphia gave \$250,000 to obtain the 1948 nominating convention.

The bids were the only major ones submitted. Detroit, which had been expected to bid \$1 million, advised officials that it was unable to handle the conventions.

Miami, Fla., San Francisco and Los Angeles have expressed interest.

Truman Boadens Loyalty Program

He issued an executive order amending a 1947 regulation under which the loyalty review board had to show "reasonable grounds" for believing a person disloyal to the United States.

Chairman Robert Ranspock of the civil service commission, who recommended the change in procedure, told a reporter that under the present system the board has to prove a person disloyal.

Also, he added, some members of the board have construed the 1947 order as requiring them to show a person guilty of an overt act at the time of the hearing or immediately prior thereto. This meaning many who may have been disloyal in the past.

Under the new order, he explained, it will not be necessary to prove an overt act.

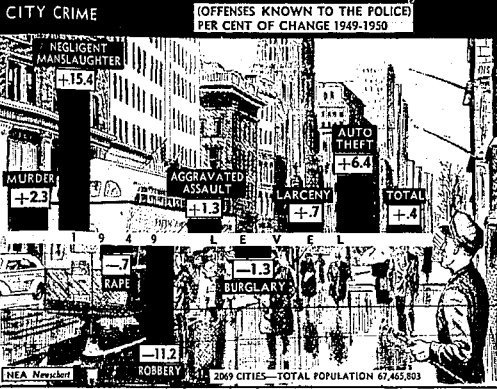
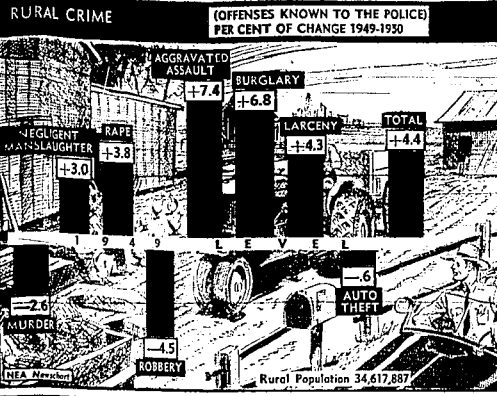

Rural crime rose 4.4 per cent, with urban crime up a mere 1 per cent. Of the seven major crimes listed in the FBI's annual report, on which these percentages are based, only robbery declined in both city and country. The FBI says that every five minutes during 1950, someone in the U. S. was feloniously assaulted or killed, during each day 146 persons were robbed and cars of 468 others stolen.

Doctors Operate to Correct Internal Mix-up of Youngster

WASHINGTON, April 30 (AP)—Eight-year-old James Foley Jr. looked like a normal boy until doctors studied an X-ray of his chest. They found he was pretty mixed up inside.

His diaphragm, supposed to be a tough membrane sheet as thick as shoe leather to hold body organs in place, was thin and weak as paper. His stomach had pushed up from the normal left-side position way over to the right chest wall, where it had grown attached.

The pericardium, or casing for the heart, usually thin and elastic, had grown thick and tough. His left lung had been squeezed almost to the top of his chest.

Jimmy couldn't live long that way. In two and a half hours on the operating table, doctors:

1. Cut his heart free from the right chest.
2. Peeled off the unnaturally thickened casing almost like you would peel an orange.
3. Tubbed his heart with their hands to keep it beating.
4. Sewing the heart around to the normal left-side position, and put other organs in place.
5. Reinforced the weak diaphragm (doctors said you could read a paper through it) with a light, strong three-by-six inch metal plate of tantalum mesh.

Doctors said it was the second time in medical history a metal plate had been used like that.

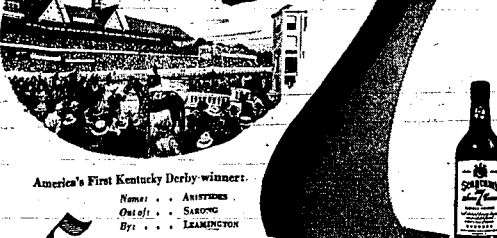

Retail Prices Show Slump, Survey Finds

NEW YORK, April 30 (AP)—Some retail prices have slipped as much as 10 per cent in recent weeks because of a rise in resistance that caused a pile-up of inventories. Economists predict the price markdown will continue for a two or three months.

A nationwide survey turned up such bargains: A 21-inch unbranded RCA's radio selling for \$235, bedroom outfit \$100 reduction—down to \$400—fridge for \$149. One manufacturer said it would give away an \$89.50, three-speed vibration radio-phonograph "absolutely free" with purchase of a \$339.95 TV set.

Women's spring hats at some New York department stores dropped to around \$3 from the \$45 and \$69.95 they had been selling for a few weeks ago. Men's suits could be had for as low as \$30, with better grades, formerly \$40 at \$80 going for \$44.00.

Department stores else for the four weeks ending April 12 slumped two per cent in New York City, often the harbinger of things to come nationwide. In other parts of the country, Special Stores sales in New York dropped 9 per cent. Nationally the price slump already has averaged three per cent and merchandise in St. Louis, Richmond and Boston reported a per cent decline.

Wholesale orders booked in March declined 40 per cent from the previous month. Seldman at Seldman, business analyst for the American industry, said the March slump was the first indication that the business boom which set new records earlier this year was over.
