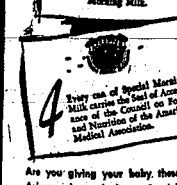

WASHINGTON, May 1 (AP)—Rep. Walter E. Brehm, R., O., was convicted last night of receiving illegal campaign contributions.

A federal court jury of 10 men and two women returned its verdict after deliberating about four hours and 20 minutes.

The jury found Brehm guilty of five counts based on five alleged contributions of \$200 each from Mrs. Emma S. Craven in 1940.

Mrs. Craven formerly worked in Brehm's office. A federal law forbids members of congress accepting campaign contributions from federal employes.

The jury acquitted Brehm on one count. This charged receipt of a \$140 contribution from Mrs. Clara Solway, another former employe, early in 1940.

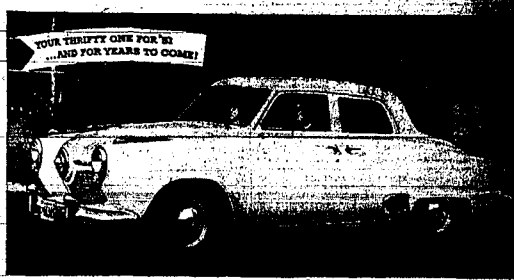
Colorado Sheep Queen Shells Out

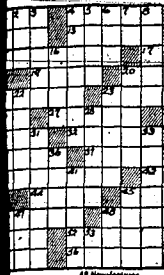

Autopsy Will Seek to Find Death Cause

BLACKFOOT, May 19—An autopsy was scheduled today to discover what caused the death of a Bull Lake City woman whose body was found yesterday beneath two pulp oil tanks here.

The misnamed, cut and bruised body of 46-year-old Mrs. Laura Macklemier was found by an employee of the oil firm.

DEPUTY Sheriff Alvin theorized that Mrs. Macklemier died of asphyxiation, but he said she could not have crawled under the tanks by herself. He said it appeared her body was dragged to the spot.

Several Witnesses
The Blingham county sheriff's office rounded up several witnesses for investigation, among them Raymond Hartfield, Salt Lake City, Police Officer Bing as a companion of Mrs. Macklemier.

Sheriff Everett Goodwin said that Mrs. Macklemier was a maternal witness, stated he came to Blackfoot with the woman about a week ago.

Hartfield was quoted by police as saying:

Went to Bar
He and Mrs. Macklemier went to Blackfoot bar Saturday night. They were joined by another couple and a third man. The two men seemed heartily out of the tavern. The next morning he reported to police he was unable to locate Mrs. Macklemier.

Coroner Alvin Trolin said Mrs. Macklemier had been dead from 8 to 10 hours when her body was located at 9:30 a. m. yesterday.

He said there were cuts and bruises on her legs and hips and a severe burn on her back.

Senate Confirms New Boss of RFC

WASHINGTON, May 19—The senate has approved without dissent the appointment of W. Stuart Symington to become the new permanent boss of the Reconstruction Finance corporation.

There was no record vote, but no dissenting vote was raised and Senator Wherry, R. Neb., the Republican floor leader said the country could achieve unity "if a man like Mr. Symington" were made secretary of state.

The confirmation of Symington fits into the shakedown of the RFC which makes him administrator and controller in a move that simultaneously abolishes the job of its five main board of directors.

The change becomes operative when Symington takes office, which presumably will be tomorrow.

BOISE, May 19—Vincent Malley, assistant agricultural economist with the University of Idaho extension service, resigned effective today. He will enter the livestock business at Oia.

Farmer Held As Tear Gas Used in Fight

LAYTON, Utah, May 19—A 41-year-old farmer, choking with tear gas, surrendered to police early today after a two-hour gun battle from his farm house barricade.

Sheriff Leroy Day said the farmer, Milton Nelson, had shot, and wounded his wife, Maurine, 38, and son, Glyd, 13, in a drunken argument that preceded the gun fight with police.

Day was summoned by a frantic call—from Nelson's 14-year-old daughter, Joyce. He arrived with eight deputies and state patrolmen at 11:30 p. m.

Blast Replies
Nelson replied to a call to surrender with a blast from a 12-gauge shotgun.

The firing was followed by a woman's scream.

Day said he and his men, fearful of hitting Mrs. Nelson, fired only sporadically to free the woman, ran to a door but retreated when warned that Nelson was at a window, ready to fire.

Arm Shattered
Laird, Deputy Kenneth Hammon sprang to the door, kicked it open and Mrs. Nelson, bleeding from a shattered arm, ran out.

Nelson surrendered after police reinforcements fired tear gas. Glyd, who received only superficial wounds, had escaped through a window.

Mrs. Nelson was taken to a hospital at Ogden, 18 miles to the north. Her wound was described as serious. Nelson was jailed at Ogden. Day said charges would be filed later.
