WASHINGTON, May 2 (AP) — Economic Stabilizer Eric Johnston assured businessmen today the government will be dam against "a new inflation flood" anticipated by some when arm production reaches full tide.

Johnston urged a "new kind of inflation," he said, rather than to "have by next winter without the kind of steps to counteract it."

At a speech prepared for the U. S. Chamber of Commerce 30th annual meeting, Johnston promised to write wage-ceilings off the books in a few days.

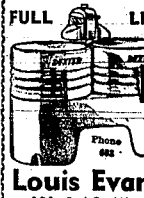

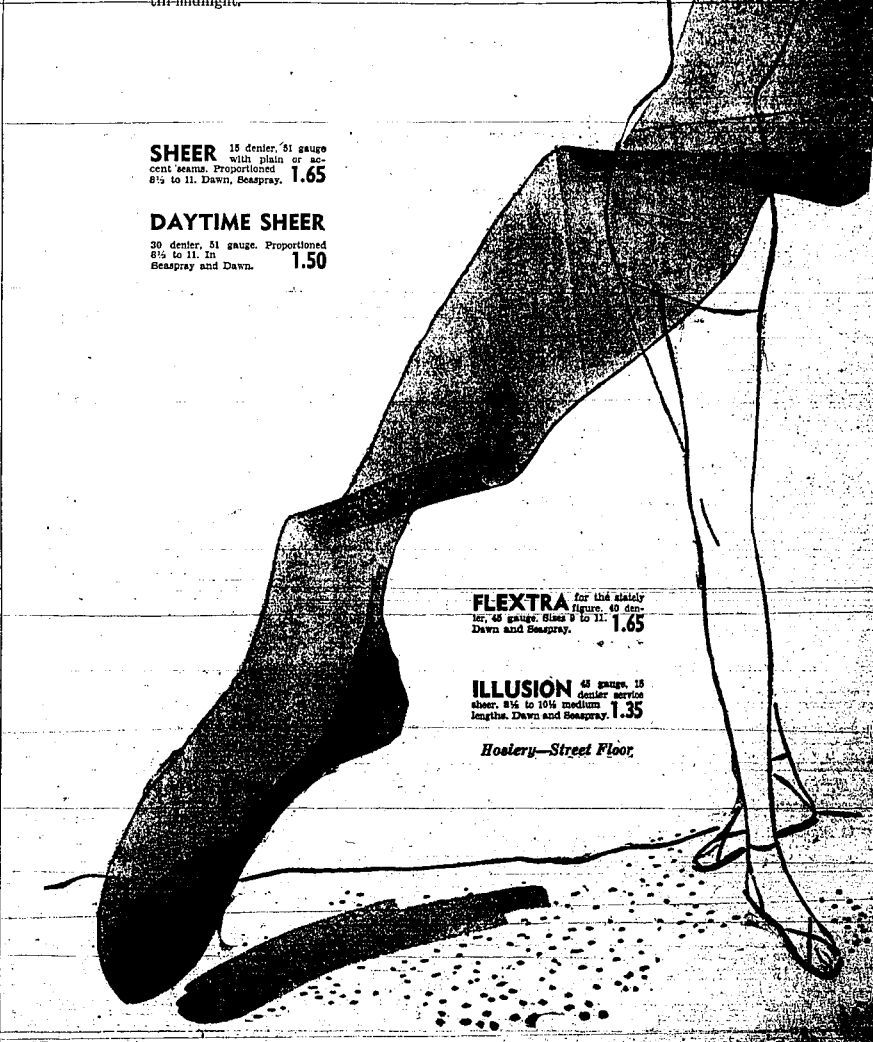

WASHINGTON, May 2 (AP)—The government's new price control order designed to trim beef prices to 10 cents a pound by Oct. 1 is being met by a heavy rush of cattle dealers during the next few days to help relieve butcher shop shortages.

This possibility is foreseen by agriculture department livestock marketing officials, who expect such a rush will reflect premature marketing of meat animals by farmers and ranchers during the week before the order went down.

Shortage Later
The result, they said, would be a shortage later on. The order will require slaughterers to pay 10 per cent less than current prices for beef cattle marketed between May 2 and Aug. 1 and 15 per cent less between Aug. 1 and Oct. 1.

Beef cattle which normally would be held until later summer further fattening could be expected to be sold before lower prices take effect, these officials said.

Might Cause Rationing
Such shortages might well lead to rationing. While not criticizing the price rollback order, issued by the office of price stabilization, government experts who asked not to be named predicted the move might create a big problem of great proportions.

These officials see the situation as hardly enough beef available at current prices to meet summer demands. This situation being reflected, they said, in shortages in many sections of the country.

The rollback in prices will put farmers in a position to buy more if than is available now or likely to be available.

In a situation like this, some consumers would have to go without along with much less than they now get, unless there were rationing.

Morse Urges U. S. Aid for Labor Import

WASHINGTON, May 2 (AP)—Senator Charles McNary, Ore., yesterday urged the government to speed the cost of transporting imported Mexican farm labor to points distant from the southern border. He said he would not be polite "to expect small farmers and processors of farm crops to pay for transporting the laborers long distances. To do so, Morse continued, would be to restrict major benefits to areas near the border."

Opene Debater

Experts Laud Plans to Plug Tax Loophole

WASHINGTON, May 2 (AP)—Experts believe one of the biggest loopholes in present tax laws will be plugged by a proposed 20 per cent withholding plan on interest and dividend payments is approved by Congress.

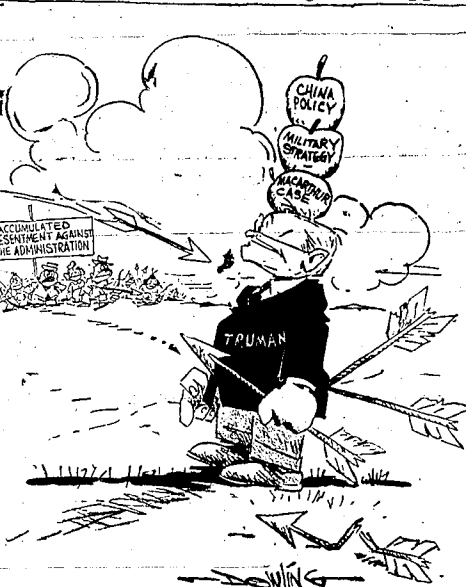
The new dividend and interest withholding scheme has received tentative approval by the tax-writing subcommittee, and then must be approved by both the house and senate before it can become law.

The dividend and interest plan is similar to the withholding system used by the government. The chief difference is that an arbitrary 20 per cent will be withheld by corporations, banks and others on dividends and interest payments, while employers base the amount they withhold from employees on the amount wages paid.

To the man who gets a dividend or interest payment, it is not a question of paying higher taxes. It is a matter of paying taxes he now owes but, for reasons best known to himself, he has not paid.

Treasury experts estimate that if Congress approves the withholding plan on dividends and interest, the government will collect an additional \$300,000,000 a year.

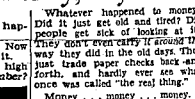
Rupert Residents Plan French Trip
