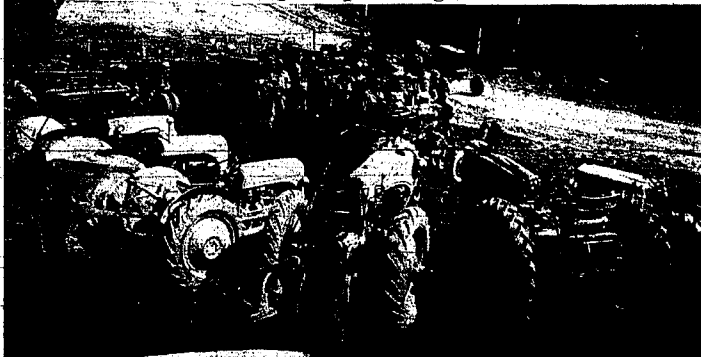
WASHINGTON, May 3 (AP)—The largest labor is supporting an effort to force federal employers nearly and growing almost as fast as armed forces.

Joel L. Priest, Veteran U. P. Official, Dies

SALT LAKE CITY, May 3 (AP)—Joel L. Priest, 80, a veteran of 38 years with the Utah Pacific railroad in Idaho, died last yesterday at a Salt Lake City hospital.

He fell from a train in 1923. Priest died from coronary occlusion. Funeral arrangements are pending. The services will be held in Salt Lake City.

Priest worked as a newspaperman in Kentucky, Chicago and Salt Lake City before joining the Union Pacific in 1923 as industrial agent with headquarters in Boise. He advanced to general agent and then to special representative three years before his retirement in 1940. He came here from Boise early this year.

The Idaho pioneer, known as a raconteur, was kept active as a master of ceremonies and hostmaster throughout the interminable week. It was said he knew more people by their first name than anyone else in Idaho.

He worked on the editorial staff of the Chicago City Press association and Chicago Record and was editor of his home town newspaper in Henderson, Ky. Coming west, he joined the staff of the Salt Lake Tribune in 1937 as a reporter. Moving to the Salt Lake Herald in 1937, Priest worked as a reporter, city and managing editor, dramatic critic and additional writer.

Survivors include a daughter, Mrs. Armetzel O. Grubb, Lincoln University, Mo.; a son, J. G. Priest, New York City and Sumner, N. J.; and Joel L. Priest, Jr., Salt Lake City. The latter is a public relations representative with the Union Pacific.

National Foundation Sends Check for \$11,700 to Twin Falls County Chapter

The Twin Falls county chapter of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, whose local funds were depleted April 1, was presented on \$11,700 check Wednesday night from the epidemic fund of the National Foundation. Emphasizing the high cost of treatment and the needs for county patients, Mrs. Frank Alworth, chapter chairman, explained the check would provide better needs for the next 60 days. National advances from the national funds will be needed then, she said. During 1950 the chapter sent \$27,228 taking care of 25 patients from Twin Falls county. As a result, at the end of 1950 the chapter owed \$11,800. The 1951 March of Dimes campaign netted about \$22,000. After being shared with the national foundation, it is expected to be \$11,000. Half the funds raised through the March of Dimes campaigns are sent to the National Foundation for research and aid to provide an epidemic fund. This permits counties which have a high incidence of polio to meet their need where local funds would be insufficient. From Jan. 1 until April 1, 1951, seven patients from Twin Falls county were being treated with expenditures running about \$3,000 per month, Mrs. Alworth said. She pointed out total hospital costs for a respiratory case alone is \$21.50 per day. At present only two cases from Twin Falls county are being treated. David Weeks, Boise, national representative who presented the check, said \$2 is spent in Idaho for polio treatment for every \$1 contributed in the state. The difference is made up from the epidemic fund. In 1947 and 1949 had the highest per capita polio rate in the nation. In 1950 it was eighth.

U.S. Warning Is Sounded on 'Webback' Use

SAN FRANCISCO, May 3 (AP)—Dean Brockway, regional director of the U. S. employment service, has warned farmers' associations in six western states they must stop using Mexican "webback" labor immediately.

Brockway specifically directed his warning to the Imperial Valley Farmers' association in southern California. However, he said he has also notified all western growers they must conform to international agreement on the use of Mexican labor.

The term "webbacks" is applied to Mexicans who have entered the United States illegally.

Will Lose Workers

Brockway warned that anyone found using "webback" labor will be denied the use of Mexican farm workers legally contracted.

This will mean, in turn, that the farmer will have to pay his Mexican workers three or four times as much for the full time specified in their individual contracts, Brockway said.

Hearings Held

The warning came after hearings held in El Centro, Calif., in February on complaints from the Mexican consul at Galveston, Calif., and from area growers and unions that the Imperial Valley Farmers' association was using both legally-contracted Mexicans and "webbacks."

Brockway said his office will be inspecting within a few days to determine whether the Imperial Valley association is complying with the agreement.

Probe Report Opposes Okay For Gambling

WASHINGTON, May 3 (AP)—Should gambling be legalized? asked the senate crime investigating committee. It answered itself with a big "No."

It said gambling is bad but its by-products of crime are worse. The committee's report admitted it "is undoubtedly impossible to eradicate gambling completely." So, it said, many persons asked why not legalize it.

The committee said that suggestion was based on two false theories:

1. That crooks would get out of legal gambling and leave it to honest and upstanding businessmen.
2. That public officials who have ignored or protected illegal gambling will automatically prove incorruptible when called on to license gambling places.

The committee pointed out that here is what it said:

Big Money

Gambling is attractive to gangsters because it is big money—\$20,000,000 a year—not because it is illegal.

Making gambling legal means more betting by small wage-earners, the people least able to bear the inevitable losses.

Violence and crime increase in proportion to gambling operations. The returns are big enough to encourage the operators to intimidation and corruption to keep their monopoly. Victims of gambling are driven to crime by their losses.
