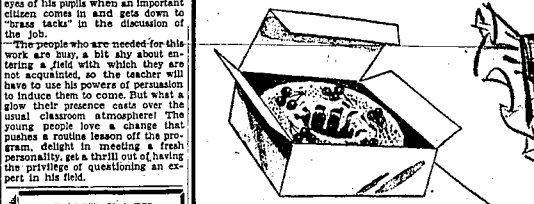

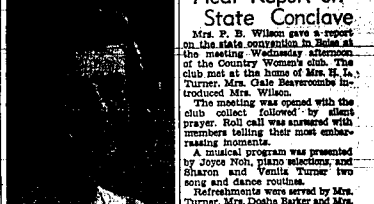

ture showing the comparison between the American government and the United States and that of socialist states. He showed pamphlets pointing out how the socialists are infiltrating into the United States and warned that Americans must work harder than they are working if they wish to halt the progress of the socialists.

Arthur J. Zerbach, president of the Spokane Realty board and an attorney, discussed methods of improved "salesmanship" in a talk which highlighted the morning session. He emphasized the importance of exclusive listings.

A. W. Brent, president of the Idaho Real Estate board, presided over the afternoon session. Charles E. Marshall, professor in the University of Idaho school of business, outlined what the state university proposes to offer. Ira E. High, Boise realtor, discussed the new Idaho real estate code which goes into effect July 1.

High urged brokers to unite and build for their own future. He said the law was enacted for the benefit of the public to promote confidence

in brokers. He said the law will promote higher standards among brokers.

Pointing out that broker organizations are smaller than labor and

of the Idaho Real Estate Brokers board, said the regulations are necessary because a few brokers make it necessary to put controls on licensed brokers. He said the law will protect the public against the minority, although it will harass realtors.

Homer said that the more realtors who come to Idaho, the more business that will develop. He cited figures showing a great increase in business in Bonanza county during the first eight months of 1950, all caused by real estate men.

Paul Larsen, vice president of the Idaho Real Estate Brokers board, said realtors should never say business is bad. They should point out that the time to buy and sell is now. "If people get more money for a house in the future, they will have to pay equally more for something else," he said.

Larsen said the new regulations will give realtors the right to prosecute when necessary. He said the influx of new realtors into Idaho indicates business is good. The new law also will require that trust money be kept in separate accounts, he said.

According to Larsen, 50 per cent of the sales in Twin Falls county are made direct, rather than through brokers. He said the public should be influenced to give willingness of the five per cent commission to brokers and salesmen.

Concluding the meeting was a panel discussion. Twin Falls persons on the panel were A. L. Gridley, moderator, C. E. Adams, Earl Freeman, George Frazier and R. F. Parry, attorney. Zerbach, Homer, Larsen and Charles Laursen, executive secretary of the Idaho Real Estate Brokers board, also were on the panel.

It was pointed out that salesmen have a more difficult job in Idaho because they must have a greater knowledge for farm selling. Sources of listings were discussed. It was pointed out that exclusive listings sell faster.

Panel members and others who contribute to the discussion pointed out the difficulty of getting people

to list prices that will sell, and the advantages of cooperation between individual members of the realty boards. The necessity of having both husband and wife sign real estate listings and papers in community property states such as Idaho was pointed out.

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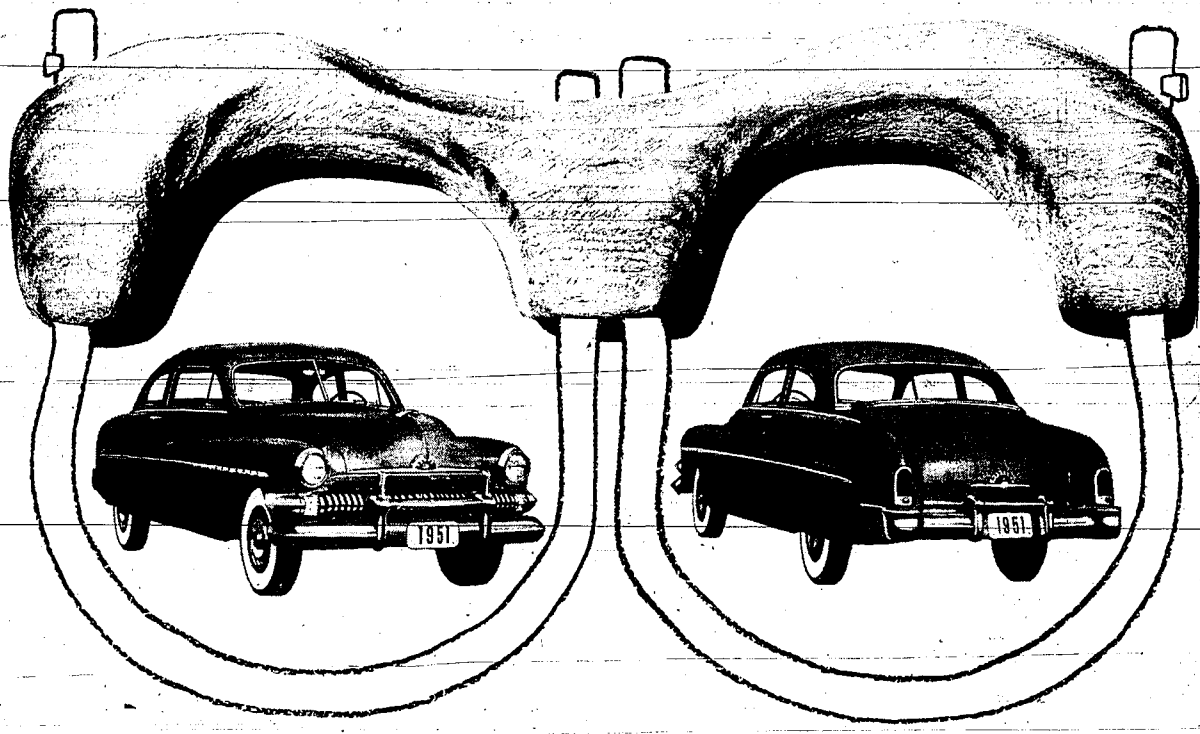

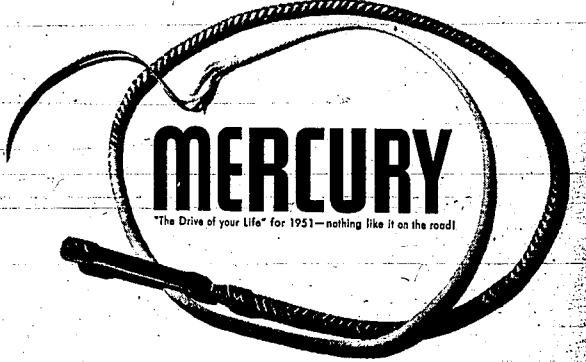
