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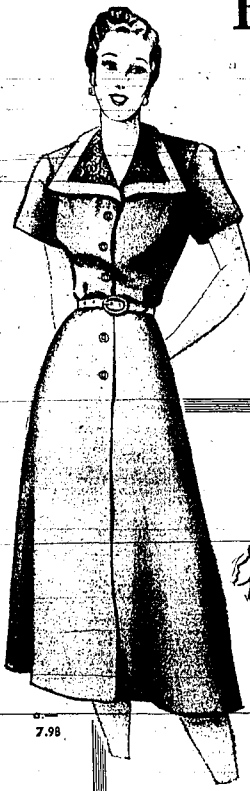

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**GOVERNOR JORDAN'S VISIT**

From all indications, Gov. Len Jordan made a good impression with the people of this vicinity on his first official visit to Twin Falls since being elected the state's chief executive.

Spending the day here Thursday, the governor delivered three addresses, one to the high school students, one before a joint session of the service clubs and another at the banquet highlighting the League of Women Voters.

It was interesting to note the reaction to his presence and what he had to say, particularly in view of all the criticism which has been subjected. It must be granted, however, that in this vicinity he was in friendly territory.

Everyone knows that Governor Jordan is not too popular with those authorities in Idaho who are slow to take the initiative on the legislature on his recommendation. In the vicinity of Lewiston, particularly, the opposition is almost vicious because the legislature is expected to appropriate funds for Northern Idaho College.

Any governor as business-like and economy-minded as Mr. Jordan is bound to run into such opposition. He is in no sense a spender, but he would have advocated continued appropriations for the ever-increasing demands of the education forces.

It takes courage and determination to call a halt to any phase of all this snap-happy mood, particularly when the people of this country under some strange spell of irresponsibility, induced by New Deal hypnotism.

And it will take more leaders like Governor Jordan to bring about a government in this country to be brought back to any real degree of fundamental stability.

The moment Governor Jordan addressed himself to the joint session of service clubs in Twin Falls, it became apparent that he is a substantial, highly-qualified, level-headed individual, far above the average of Idaho's chief executives in recent years.

Instead of merely reacting with the usual political platitudes for effect, he launched into a forthright discussion of the state's financial affairs, making his listeners to assist him in an appraisal of the more controversial issues.

After passing out copies of a complete breakdown of the state's finances, together with a questionnaire to get the sentiment of the audience, the governor discussed each item in a convincing manner.

Most of those who heard the governor could not help but agree that he is a man to be respected as our chief executive, despite the opposition of those with selfish purposes. His entire personality stands out as a reassuring contrast to the all too prevalent type of administration in present day government.

One of the Times-News' most respected reporters, admittedly critical of all politicians, found himself becoming enthusiastically impressed with Governor Jordan as soon as he started addressing the service clubs.

"One senses immediately that he's no politician," the Times-News reporter observed. "He's far above that, showing every indication of making Idaho an outstanding government."

The Times-News is conscientious in its endorsement for Governor Jordan. There is a crying need for capable public officials these days, and here's hoping the people of Idaho will appreciate the wise leadership Governor Jordan is giving them.

SALT LAKE CITY, May 5 (AP)—The western seminar on atomic energy at the University of Utah May 19-21 will feature some of the nation's leaders on atomic problems.

The seminar, sponsored by the university, is being held for newspaper and radio men, physicians, members of college and high school faculties in the Intermountain area and regional industrial representatives.

Dr. John Z. Bowers, dean of the university's medical college, and discussions will deal with atomic weapons, reactor programs, mining of fissionable materials, medicine and other peacetime uses of atomic energy, public education on atomic energy and operations of AEC communities.
