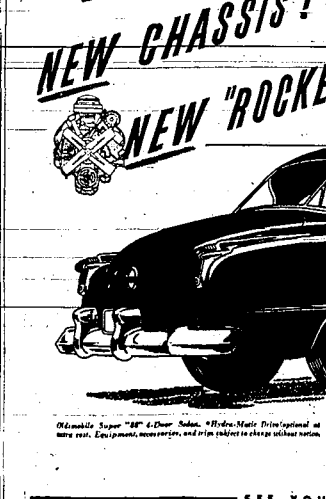

Staff Fired as School Paper Is Not Clever

LOGAN, Utah, May 9 (AP)—The entire editorial staff of Student Life, weekly student newspaper at Utah State Agricultural College, has been suspended as a result of what was termed "a futile attempt to be clever" in a special edition.

Center of the controversy was an issue called "Student Life" put out last week in connection with the college "A-day" celebration under the direction of Editor Bob Hatch.

No Disciplinary Action

Dr. L. L. Madson, USAC president, said the staff "was constituted now" but "was suspended" but no disciplinary action had been taken "yet" against Hatch, whose term as editor expired last week.

Madson met with members of the staff, prospective new publications officers and Student Body President Gary Theurer to discuss the problem and the "future course" of campus newspapers.

Lack of Judgment

The president said he felt there was "considerable lack of judgment in respect to the humor" in "Student Life." He also was disturbed by what he termed "attacks on the faculty" other students, state officials and members of the board" and said the publication did "not truthfully reflect the college activities and opinions" but capitalized "too heavily on sex and booze."

Gov. J. Bracken Lee in particular was ribbed in the newspaper because of his attempts to reduce higher education budgets in Utah. One item said the chief executive had "given the college back to the Indians." Madson said apologies had been made to Lee and others.

Pulitzer Prizes Are Reported For U. S. Writers and Artists

NEW YORK, May 9 (AP)—Conrad Richter's novel, "The Town," a story of an American family growing up in the wilderness of the 18th century, won the Pulitzer prize for fiction.

No award was made this year for drama in the theater. No explanation was given.

Awards for meritorious service in the newspaper field went to the Miami, Fla., Herald and the Brooklyn Eagle. Both were cited for crime reporting in 1950.

Columbia university trustees, including the Pulitzer selections, named six foreign correspondents—among the first women ever so honored—as prize winners for international reporting.

The woman 30-year-old Margaret Higgins of the New York Herald-Tribune, was cited for her work as a war correspondent in Korea. She shared honors with five men, including a colleague, Homer Hays of the Herald-Tribune, who became a two-time winner.

Besides Miss Higgins and Hays, those named for Korean war reporting were Reiman Morris and Don Whelan of the Associated Press and Keyes Beebe of the Chicago Daily News.

The sixth winner in that field was Fred Sparks, also of the Chicago Daily News, for a Berlin series on German nationalism.

Cyrus L. Sulzberger of the New York Times won a special citation for a number of exclusive interviews, including one with Archbishop Slepian of Yugoslavia in the pre-war prison cell.

No 1950 award was given for national reporting, but Arthur Koestler's exclusive interview with President Truman was called "the outstanding instance of national reporting" for the year.

Edward S. Montgomery of the San Francisco Examiner won the Pulitzer prize for local reporting on the basis of a series of stories which led to an expose in the bureau of internal revenue.

William Harry Fitzpatrick of the New Orleans, La., States won the editorial writing award, with a series of articles on the American treatment of the Associated Press showed a picture of refugees fleeing across a wrecked-bridge in Korea and this was selected as the best news photograph of 1950.

Top cartoonist was Reg (Reinhold) W. Manning, whose cartoon "Hats" showed a bullet-pierced helmet in Korea in contrast to the silk top hats of United Nations' diplomatic officials—with the Arizona Republic, Phoenix.

Carl Sandburg won a poetry award for his complete poems. He won a Pulitzer prize in history in 1940 for his "Abraham Lincoln: The War Years."

The history award this year went to R. Garby Buley for his "The Old Northwest, Pioneer Period, 1918-1940."

For biography, Margaret Louisa Coit was cited for her "John C. Calhoun: American Portrait."

The law requires a veteran to be in training by the deadline if he wants to continue afterwards. The VA will consider a veteran in training even though he has interrupted his course for summer vacation or for other reasons beyond his control, such as entry into the service, Helwege said.

The deadline applies to World War II veterans discharged before July 30, 1947. Veterans discharged after that date have four years from date of their discharge to begin training.

MURTAUGH, May 8—Word has been received here of the death of E. D. Hunt, early settler in this area, at his home in Riverside, Calif., Monday.

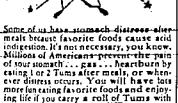

BOISE, May 9 (AP)—Idaho state tax collections for the 10 months ending April 30 totaled \$7,969,858. F. C. Neill, state tax collector, said the total collection over the last 10 months marked an increase of more than \$2,000,000. Only one item failed to show an increase over last year's period. All other items showed an increase, tipped by individual and corporate income tax receipts which were up \$1,111,071 for the comparative period.

Buses licenses were down \$10,277. E. B. Carpenter, chief clerk in the department, said while an increasing trend was reflected by the figures, a more accurate overall view will be presented in the figures for the entire fiscal year ending June 30.

U.S. Reduces Duties for 17 West Nations

WASHINGTON, May 9 (AP)—The United States has granted sweeping new tariff concessions to 17 western countries in another major move to expand world commerce.

Reductions covering \$41,271,000 in foreign shipments to the United States will "start" going into effect June 9 under the new international agreements.

At the same time, existing low rates will be maintained on \$38,306,000 in foreign imports.

Others Cut Rates
In return, foreign governments have agreed to cut tariffs or keep from hiking rates on \$1,157,000,000 of American products in 1947.

This country reduced its levies on many articles ranging from fruit in short supply here to certain foods. It won concessions for an "abroad" of many American farm products, chemicals and machinery among other things.

The new agreements, announced by the state department, were negotiated during a seven-month, six-liaison conference at Torquay, England, which ended April 22.

Twenty-four nations, accounting for 80 per cent of world exports, attended the meeting. It marked the third time that western countries have banded together to reduce tariff barriers since World War II ended.

Western Germany and Canada won the biggest concessions from the United States and in turn granted the most substantial reductions to American products.

U.S. Court Asked To Dismiss White Suit for Damages

SPOKANE, May 9 (AP)—Compton I. White "prejudicial and provoked his own trouble" when he was arrested and jailed here two years ago as the grower of a parking ticket, a city attorney said yesterday.

Paul J. Schöffel made the statement in federal court as the city started argument to dismiss the \$200,000 damage suit filed by White, 73-year-old former Democratic congressman from Idaho.

White claimed he was on congressional business April 1, 1945, and immune from arrest, when Police Officer Homer Hall tagged his car in a hotel loading zone. An argument followed and White spent the night in jail.

White asks \$75,000 for alleged false arrest and confinement, \$25,000 for civil costs and back wages. He was defeated in 1948 when he ran for U. S. senate.

Reason Given For Junior Show

WASHINGTON, May 9 (AP)—Secretary of Defense Marshall said he held up publication of the Wednesday report because it proposed putting Manchuria under a trusteeship.

Another reason, Marshall told the senate armed services and foreign relations committees, was that the report "engaged in proposals in connection with putting the China problem before the United Nations."

The report was written by Lieut. Gen. Albert Wedemeyer, who, Marshall said, went to China in 1947 to look over the ground for Marshall then was secretary of state.

The China sections of the report were made public several months ago. The part dealing with Korea was released only last week by the senate committee. It was the ground for the removal of Gen. Douglas MacArthur from his Tokyo command.

Wedemeyer reported on the possibility of a red-drafted attack on South Korea.

House OK of Crop Worker Plan Forecast

WASHINGTON, May 9 (AP)—Representative Page, D. Tex., has introduced a bill which would approve bill authorizing the federal government to recruit Mexican workers to help harvest American crops.

Sponsors of the bill said it was needed because many farm operations this year to avert a threatened shortage of "steep labor" for picking cotton, sugarcane and other crops.

Threat Gains In Southwest Grain Losses

ALBUQUERQUE, N. M., May 9—The regional director for the soil conservation service warns the danger of a return of dust bowl conditions to the southern great plains is "more serious now than at any time since the black blizzard days of the '30s."

The director—Cyril Luker—said "that storms of recent weeks, some of which have been the most severe in several years, are just examples of what can be expected every time the strong winds strike this spring."

Eggs Cover Planting
Pleading for the planting of grain sorghum, Luker said "the situation can be much worse next spring and winter unless every effort is made to establish protective vegetation cover on the many thousands of acres that now are barren as a result of a wheat crop failure in many areas."

Crop production reports indicate the 1951 wheat crop in the southern great plains generally is a failure, Luker pointed out. This has resulted from drought, winter kill, greenbugs, cutworms and other factors.

Severe Damage
The conservationist reported a recent survey made by soil conservation personnel in eastern New Mexico and Colorado shows the wheat crop has incurred severe damage.

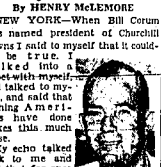

NEW YORK—When Bill Corum was named president of Chevrolet downs I said to myself that it couldn't be true. I walked into a room close with myself and talked to myself and said that nothing Americans have done makes this much sense.

My echo talked back to me and said that for once the right man had been given the right job. I say this with the full knowledge that every man who ever looked at a thoroughbred horse mixes Matt Winn, Col. Matt Winn a gracious gentleman and a sweet man. To prove how sure I am that Corum got the right job is the fact that nobody ever loved Matt Winn more than Major Bill.

The first time I ever met Colonel Winn was with Bill. I was a cracker boy then and Bill said, "Wouldn't you like to meet the colonel?" I said, "Yes, sir." Bill turned around to me and said, "We're in the same business, Henry, and you don't have to call me 'sir'."

That may not mean anything to you when you read this, but if you have ever been a horseboy, working his first derby where every person you meet has a name you've been dreaming about, you know a little about the way I felt.

It is so seldom that the nice man gets the nice job. Newspapermen are, day in and day out, jealous men. They fight the deadline against another so often that the deadline becomes part of their lives. The whole creed of our business is "beat 'em."

The greatest tribute I can pay Corum is that everybody is glad they got the job. You who are reading this may be a toy manufacturer, for all I know, and are throat to throat with another toy manufacturer, but

the newspapermen don't feel that way about the major. To tell the truth newspapermen are sorry for Corum. He's a horse player at heart. Up until last year there was nothing Corum liked to do as much as read "The Racing Form," just "see" by his best winner, and run around the press box to give all of us a winner. Now he's got a leather swivel chair, and I heard two newspapermen here at the derby call him "mister," and that is hard on Bill. It practically killed him.

As President of Churchill downs he never so much as giving out tips. American people, being what they are, would suspect him. On derby day I went back to his office, and he said it was nice to see me, and I said, "Here is a nice-born boy, '19 nice to see you, too, major."

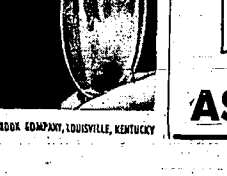
He said, "How are you doing since you've been here?" and I said, "No good," and then he said, "That's a shame. If I weren't president of this track, I could give you some hot things going here today." I replied, "Well, don't jeopardize your job, major," and he didn't.

I looked at Bill, and these things went through my mind: The boy from Bonneville running a Kentucky derby. The youngest major in World War I in charge of all the people who come to see America's number one event. Nobody will ever tell me they don't pay off on this. Rate for VA Term Policy Share Listed

WASHINGTON, May 9 (AP)—Veterans and servicemen under 40 who hold national service life insurance policies are receiving dividends at the rate of 50 cents per \$100.

At that rate, a person owning a term policy could get a maximum \$180 check or \$150 as the smallest payment. Dividend checks for other types of NSLI policies are expected to vary slightly.

The veterans administration now is doling out the second GI service dividend of \$5,000,000. The VA has not revealed the formula for calculating the size of dividend checks because rate structures are too complicated for all except term insurance.

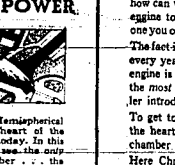
There are six other types of permanent policies offered by the VA to which NSLI holders can convert. The dividend is being paid on at least three months between 1948 and the anniversary date of the policy this year. Thus, a person holding a maximum \$10,000 term policy in effect for the full 30 months would receive a \$180 dividend. Those holding \$1,000 policies in force only three months would get \$1.50.

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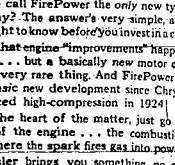

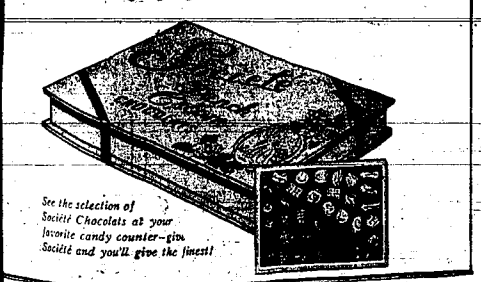

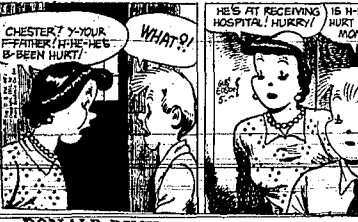

**WARREN SAYS
NATION NEEDS
DEFENSE PLAN**

WASHINGTON, May 9 (AP)—Gov. Earl Warren, California, believes the United States is approaching "some kind of a deadline" and must start paying serious attention to civil defense.

In an address at a national conference on civil defense, Warren said the deadline can only be one of two kinds.

"It could be the day when Russia determines that she is strong enough and we are weak enough to warrant an attack on us," Warren said.

"Or it could be the day when we and our allies are strong enough to convince Russia that such an attack would be disastrous for her," Warren said there is a "world conspiracy" and the United States is the main object of it.

California, he said, is preparing against atomic strikes which could result in 400,000 deaths, 200,000 injuries and 1,000,000 displaced persons.

"We are not hysterical about it, but neither are we apathetic," he said.

He added that never before has great danger been either as imminent or as constant for every American.

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Jobless Help Payments Go Up for Idaho

BOISE, May 9—Increased unemployment insurance benefits as enacted by the last legislature will become effective next week, according to H. P. Garrett, executive director of the employment security agency.

The new formula provides benefit payments at a rate of approximately 50 per cent of wage lost up to a maximum duration of 26 weeks in any one benefit year. Under the old law, the maximum benefit amount was \$20, the maximum dura-

tion was 20 weeks, Garrett explained. The new benefit formula is more liberal in some other respects also, Garrett pointed out. For instance, in the past when a claimant obtained part-time work, any amount earned over \$5 was deducted from his weekly benefit check. Under the new law, he may earn up to one-half of his weekly benefit without deduction. The change in amount of benefits for present claimants whose unemployment continues through next week, would be computed by the central office, employment security agency, Boise, and it would not be necessary for the claimant to furnish any new information. Under the new law as under the old one, the claimant must be registered for work and willing to accept suitable employment in order to be eligible for benefits.

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
