SOUNDS LIKE WE'RE AFRAID

There is one glaring objection to the administration's attempts to discredit General MacArthur, unless this country is ready to admit a weakness that places us in real peril of Russia.

General MacArthur has repeatedly warned the American people that military strength is the only thing Russia respects. In view of the way Russia has been thumbing her nose at us, it is not surprising that we should believe General MacArthur is right.

Yet, the administration, including President Truman and Secretary of Defense Marshall, have gone all out in creating the impression that we are not in any danger.

In an obvious attempt to blast General MacArthur's war plans in Korea, President Truman went so far as to point out that widening the conflict might bring down a rain of atomic bombs on the American cities, an attack which he described as a possible "death blow."

Ever since General MacArthur started talking about our policies in Korea, the President has taken the "safe" line of an all-out war with Russia. "Almost in the same breath, he has continued to refer to some announcement of readiness to discuss a war settlement," which everyone knows Russia would never accept.

Next comes General Marshall with the "grave warning" that Russia may enter the war without notice. He painted a frightful picture—of what would happen if we got involved in what you might call an atomic war.

What greater encouragement could we be giving the Russians to consider an all-out attack on this country than the "safety" of our secretary of defense so greatly alarmed over any such possibility, why shouldn't he lead Russia to believe we are afraid of her?

On this late date, it's quite a paradox for Mr. Truman to be so concerned about Russian communism.

When many loyal Americans were calling it to his attention that communism was making itself felt in our own government, and such characters as Hiss, Fuchs and Conlon were making it possible for Russia to steal the secrets of the atomic bomb, right before our eyes, Mr. Truman, in his usual haughty manner, branded all this warning of a Russian infiltration as a "red herring."

Now, it seems that "red herring" has grown into a "red bear" which he all too apparently fears will eat him up.

The Russian bear must be having himself a big laugh, to say the least.

For us, however, it's anything but a laughing matter.

OUR IGNORANCE OF THE ORIENT

The focus of the nation is now upon the atomic hearings into the MacArthur controversy and our general far eastern policy. For the sake of us all, we should beseech our lawmakers to consider the facts soberly and arrive at wise judgments as to our future course.

Certainly it is, however, that they—and we—would be better fit for this task if the American people understood Asia and the Asiatics more thoroughly than they do. It is no exaggeration to declare that we know less about the faintest notion of what the Orient is really like. And that holds for many of the lawmakers who most vigorously championed aggressive action in the far East.

Asia we think of for the most part as a faraway place teeming with millions who are barely alive—if at all—to keep body and soul together. Its history, its traditions and culture, its moral values are largely mysterious to us.

China and India particularly are vast enigmas. We do not even know their recent history very well. For instance, what is the real, impartial story of the rise and fall of Chiang Kai-shek as the leader of all China? How should his defeat at the hands of Mao Tse-tung's red forces be fairly weighed?

The blank spaces in our knowledge of the Orient are enormous. We are now trying to lay the basis for decisions about the far east which rightly demand of us the power to fathom the oriental mind in its full setting.

Some of us eagerly assume that it would be sensible to back Chiang Kai-shek in an effort to re-enter mainland China from his Formosa base. All side from the question of the military effectiveness of the forces he has received by the Chinese? As a liberator or not?

Evidence suggests that many guerrilla forces are now operating in mainland China and decline to accept his leadership though they are equally as opposed to communism. Is this indicative of the attitude of most Chinese?

We don't really know, and yet that knowledge is of the utmost importance politically. We can hardly assume that our espousal of Chiang would be regarded by the Chinese as a sign of any real respect for their people. We can't be blind to the political meaning of our acts either in Asia or Europe.

For that same reason, we cannot devise economic plans for the Asiatics without realizing the possibility of a rapidly changing picture for a better way of life. We can't really draft programs which take it for granted they think and act as we. They don't, and we want them for friends we must see about finding out how they do think and act.

TUCKER'S NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG

The mother smothered the eight-inch rodent from the baby's face and killed it. But not before little Patricia Lee had been horribly bitten.

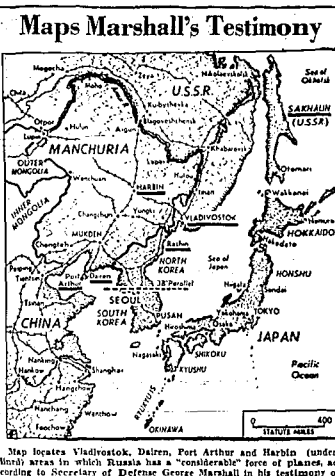
In Serious Condition

"I contacted an engineer and he worked out an answer to the problem," the ex-mayor said.

Mrs. Thum, who helps her husband, Clarence, run a combination bowling-alley-restaurant, said she was not unprintable.

"And I won't miss the 30-year radio officer," she said.

Recall Order Sighted Soon For O'Dwyer

WASHINGTON, May 10 (AP)—Recall of Ambassador William O'Dwyer from New York City is expected within a few days, it is learned here today. O'Dwyer used to be mayor of New York. His fitness for the No. 1 American diplomatic post in this hemisphere has been questioned since he was named before the crime committee's television camera last month. The ambassador's reputation was signed by exposure of the New York City political tangle with the underworld. Now the fire is closer to O'Dwyer's feet.

Aide Found Guilty
A federal court jury in New York found James J. Moran guilty of perjury. Moran was O'Dwyer's henchman almost his for years. The jury found Moran lied when he denied to the former president's commission to investigate the fire commissioner with Louis Weber, Brookings of the police department.

Moran was no longer a deputy commissioner when he appeared before the crime investigators. O'Dwyer gave Moran a lifetime \$100,000-a-year job as water commissioner last year just before resigning as mayor to become ambassador to Mexico.

Truman Reluctant
President Truman was reluctant to name O'Dwyer to that post. He was persuaded by Edward J. Flynn, Democratic boss of the Bronx. Flynn's anxiety to send O'Dwyer to Mexico has been explained variously. It appears either to have been in the hope that a special majority in the Senate would insure the State Department's nomination in the November, 1950, state elections or to get the mayor to the White House before he got hurt in a scandalous graft explosion in the New York City police department.

Strategy Fails
The New York City Democrats lost the majority election, the governorship and the state legislature control to O'Dwyer's Republican hard by police department scandal. The former mayor also swore before the crime investigators that he did not take an envelope containing \$100,000 which another witness said he had handed to him. O'Dwyer has not appeared before a grand jury.

Panama Chief Gives up His Revision Aim

PANAMA, Panama, May 10 (AP)—President Arango-Abas bowed to police and public pressure today and ordered restoration of the 1946 constitution to the Panamanian people. By this action, which won over police support, he hoped to stay in office.

Arango's decision came after a day and night of rioting in which at least three persons were killed and 110 wounded or injured as angry crowds surged through the capital, smashing windows of the president's residence.

Arango held on the presidency was displaced by Vice President Abelardo Aronson, who was sworn in as president before the assembly met as assembly just before midnight.

Aras Impeached
The assembly today Aras had dissolved Monday, met in a newspaper office, set itself up as a high court and impeached the president. Then it summoned the vice president.

Aras got powerful backing today from Col. Jose Antonio Remon, Panama's strong man, and other members of the national police—the country's only army.

Declaring "what the people wanted has been achieved" by Aras' return of the 1946 charter, Remon announced his support of the president. Such support could be decisive.

Long Neglected
Aras' decree nullifying his earlier action in replacing the 1946 constitution by the 1941 charter was issued after he and Remon had negotiated through embassies for hours last night.

Police headquarters hailed the decree today as a "lucky and patriotic decision" and appealed to the public to lay aside their bitterness and support Aras as president.

U. S. Embassy in Mexico Will Move

MEXICO CITY, May 10 (AP)—The U. S. embassy in Mexico City is to be moved to a new building, it was announced today. The new building is a skyscraper and is being built on the site of the old building which is being completely reconstructed.

Nearly 200 New Laws Going On Statute Books Tomorrow

BOISE, May 10 (AP)—Idaho will have nearly 200 new laws tomorrow. Bills passed by the 1951 session of the legislature and which did not carry effective dates or emergency clauses become law 60 days after the end of the session.

Many bills become effective when signed by Gov. Len Jordan and nearly all of the appropriation measures won't be effective until the start of the fiscal year July 1.

The new laws going into effect at 12:30 p. m. tomorrow include: Elimination of the straight ballot in general elections.

Repealing the mandatory provisions of the school reorganization act.

Increasing deductions under the state income tax law to allow for dental expenses and establishing a short-term for reporting—increases under \$5,000.

Authorizing condemnation proceedings by cities for work of construction.

Enabling legislation to permit cities to issue revenue bonds for sewage, water and off-street parking facilities.

Providing for a perforated ballot in primary elections.

Law to Tighten Up Old-Age Pay Effective Friday

BOISE, May 10 (AP)—New laws designed to tighten the old-age assistance administration in Idaho become effective tomorrow.

Bill Child, public assistance director, said both state and county workers have been engaged in preliminary operations for several weeks on the new program.

The laws require old-age assistance recipients owning property to give the state a lien on such property.

Child says this does not require recipients to sell property, but if it is sold, the state could protect its claim. The state also can file claims against estates of persons who have received public assistance.

Forms outlining the new requirements will go with the next checks to benefit recipients owning property, Child said.

Checks will be mailed about May 10.

Music Lovers Hear Concert By President

WASHINGTON, May 10 (AP)—Harry S. Truman, the only president playing President in U. S. history, played for a distinguished group of music lovers the first piece he ever learned.

After Mr. Truman had thumped through "The Little Early Waker" which he learned almost 60 years ago, he ripped through some Mozart and Beethoven yesterday.

The occasion: The celebration of national music week, one of the country's leading manufacturers from materials gathered from U. N. countries.

In addition to the short but entertaining concert, Mr. Truman gave a 10-minute impromptu speech on his views on music. To no one's surprise, it turned out he's fond of it.

"I had a smattering of piano education from the time I was seven until I was 13 or 14, or 15," he said. "I decided to work."

An air force spokesman said the 1,000-watt transmitter, part of the armed forces radio service network, will be completed within 60 days. Under ideal conditions it will have a range of 1,000 miles, he said.

For the past several months a transmitter in Siberia has been beaming broadcasts toward Alaska. An English-speaking woman and several men proclaim the "good life" in the Soviet Union, and urge non-communist countries as imperialist and warmongering.

Reports on Terrors

Other Russian programs include the latest American popular music and a question and answer program where the announcer gives names and addresses of Americans, who he says will letters asking about Russia.

The new AFPS station will give isolated Eskimos, trappers, miners, school teachers and townpeople an opportunity to tune in something besides radio Moscow.

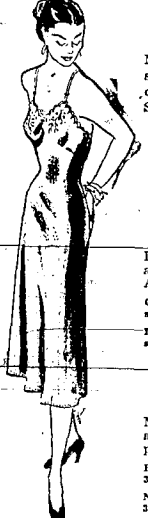

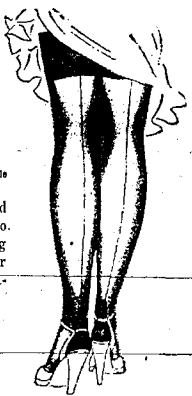

Atomic Tests May Provide New Weapon

WASHINGTON, May 19.—U. S. weapons experts may know by now when they have a practical atomic military shell.

Congressional sources speculate that a series of atomic tests being conducted this week at Eniwetok included the firing of weapons designed for use against enemy armies and fortifications.

In the absence of official announcements, these sources believed the first series of spring and summer tests scheduled at the Pacific proving ground have been completed or will be shortly.

Weapons Tested

There are indications that at least three different weapons were tested. A "radioactive" A-bomb of the "new and improved" kind believed to have about twice the destructive range of the Nagasaki type; a smaller bomb fashioned for delivery by attack-bombers; and an atomic warhead.

Although official information is lacking, military sources have speculated that the warhead is a sort of king-size mortar shell.

"The basic strategy is the fact that during World War II this country developed a giant mortar, of 30-inch caliber, capable of hurling a 3,600-pound missile nearly five miles with great accuracy.

Not impossible

It would not be an impossible feat of ordnance engineering to develop an atomic shell for such a weapon, experts say.

The mortar, firing ordinary high explosive shells, was intended for use against Germany's Siegfried line. It was not needed, however, and never went into production, although it was thoroughly field-tested and even got a name—"Little David."

Little David appears to fit the specifications military men expect for a weapon to deliver atomic explosives accurately on battlefired targets.

Changing Times Also Revising Status of Once-Famed Hobos

By PAUL PATT

NEW YORK, (AP)—Because of increasing patriotism in government and the high cost of living, the "American hobo" is becoming extinct.

"If this keeps up, there won't be one left in 20 years," says Ben Benson, four time king of the hoboes. "Don't," he warns, "go pulling quotes around my title because it's official, damn it."

Ben is five feet tall, weighs 110 pounds, uses a heating aid and talks faster than a used car salesman. In the last 20 years of bumming, he has covered more than 50,000 miles, he estimates.

"Ben on the road since I was 17," he says, "never spent anything like it. Not one-tenth the boys traveling nowadays there was 10, 15 years ago."

"Right here in New York, out of 10,000 men on the Bowery, maybe 6,000 used to be traveling bums, now they're on relief or old-age pensions. Can't travel, got to show permanent residence to get those checks."

"Migratory workers, Ben reports, don't get the work they used to around harvest time because of the increasing mechanization of farms. Besides, freight-trucks operate more efficiently, with fewer stops for block signals. Diesel engines pick up speed faster than the old locomotives, and it's harder for a hobo to jump a freight."

Such conditions are converting many bums into "rubber tramps"—hitchhikers.

"When doing a lot of that myself lately," Ben says, "More comfortable. Meet a better class of people, who slip you a buck or a meal now and then. Also, much cleaner than

the hot spots (fast freights)."

"The high cost of living is changing everything. I used to specialize as a hobo cat. Sure. I ate in jungles now-and-then-but-most-of-the-time I bummed at the back doors of houses. In the old days, when food was cheap, they wouldn't turn you away."

"Now, they don't have enough food for themselves. Why even the Salvation Army and other missions don't put up the feed the way they used to."

"The character of American hoboes is changing, too. They used to be more interested in the working man, if not interested in working themselves."

"Now everybody is afraid of being called a communist!" he says. "Last summer, out in Colorado, a farmer asked me if I wanted a short job. How much?" he says. "Dollar a day. He says, 'Nothing doing, I say. I want \$3 a day, good food and a good place to sleep, not in the barn next to the cows. He called me a red.'"

Ben was elected to his fourth term as king of the hoboes at a convention last year in Brit, Ia. He is 67.

"I positively won't run for a fifth term," he insists. "I want to get out of the hobo movement. Want to get into the youth movement."
