Truman Warned M'Arthur Need to Retain Support of Allies, Raiders Advised

WASHINGTON, May 11 (AP)—President Truman told Gen. Douglas MacArthur last Jan. 13 that Korean war policy must be designed to keep the support of allies whom "we would desperately need" in case of war with Russia. This was contained in a message sent by the President as a follow-up to a set of 10 possible courses of action the joint chiefs of staff had designed for MacArthur to advise the President on.

Testing for Driver's License Set by State

BOISE, May 11 (UP)—State Law Enforcement Commissioner J. H. McGroarty announced today that after Aug. 1 it is planned to give automobile driver tests to all those seeking to renew their licenses as well as to new applicants. It was estimated that approximately 200,000 drivers would have to undergo the examination—both written and practical—a two-year period. Driver's licenses are good for two years and expire on the birthday of the individual. McGroarty said the tests will be given by the sheriff of each county at all times as long as drivers on the state traffic law. He added that it also was planned to give written examinations to all licensees as well as drivers on the state traffic law. A booklet covering the state traffic laws is being prepared now, he said, and will be made available in each county.

I mean an absolute and total embargo against shipment of any goods or any trading whatsoever that goes from the United States to this country."

LEAKS OF WAR SECRETS

Basically, it does not matter whether the basic hearing into the MacArthur controversy and our far eastern policy were open to the public or not. Past experience with closed sessions assures that most of what is said behind locked doors will find its way into print anyway.

The very vital question of military security thus cannot be solved simply by closing the committee room doors. Senators enjoy being privy to important news and they enjoy being privy to important news.

The temptation to leak out the big things buzzing in their heads or resting in their desk drawers is just too great for most of them. It is not to be expected that any information coming out as one way of establishing or enhancing their own prestige.

In this particular instance, the urge was probably greater than ever. The MacArthur issue has stirred violent emotions on both sides. Antagonists are eager to throw into the balance of debate every scrap of evidence they can unearth.

The danger in this is plain. It is that military leaders will be afraid that American soldiers fighting in Korea will pay with their lives.

Developments in the MacArthur matter thus far do not encourage the hope that this will be a hearing which will give us information and consciousness of the problem. Up to this point, the administration has been the principal offender.

In an effort to prove General MacArthur's insubordination, it released details of numerous interchanges between Washington and the general during the final months of his command. Is there anyone who imagines the time is ripe to release information of this kind to the public? Will it not find its way into the hands of the enemy in no time? The lesson for the enemy is not in any particular detail, or even all the details. It is in disclosing how we think about certain things, and what we are doing about them.

The first step in the release of this kind of information, therefore, is to evaluate the information. These are valuable guides to the reds in weighing our probable future action in any situation.

By the same token, it was hardly wise to let a New York reporter gain access to the documentary material about the Truman-MacArthur meeting at Wake Island last fall. To be sure, at least one columnist had published a similar version months before, but it is not to be expected that the administration would have sanctioned such a disclosure.

Both the administration and the members of the senate must face the fact that, if we can't control inquiry into our defense policy is desirable, it cannot be conducted at risk of American lives. If that means that certain vital documents must be kept secret to avoid giving the enemy the information, then that is the way to handle it.

A lot of the combatants in this new "great debate" went either to "get" Mr. Truman or to "get" MacArthur. It would be a profound tragedy if their efforts were to result in a policy they allowed the communists to "get" several thousand American G.I.'s on the battlefield.

LABOR SHOULD GO TO WORK

When organized labor weeks ago bolted all national defense agencies, many observers carefully avoided condescending union leaders who were looking into the move partly to get a more effective reparations program.

Insofar as the action reflected labor's irritation at the slowness of government in warring against inflation, there was sympathy for the move.

Considerable feeling existed, too, that in his brusque insistence on getting the production job done, Defense Mobilizer Wilson had, too unnecessarily, on labor's toes.

It is not to be expected that the top-level jobs in his office, the gesture was viewed as somewhat belated.

This reasonably generous attitude seems to have been justified, now that labor has reversed itself and returned to the defense agencies. Continuance of the boycott surely could have produced only diminishing returns from labor's viewpoint, and it would likely have harmed the production performance.

In a speech to the House of Representatives, publishers, Wilson spoke out fairly in beckoning labor back into the fold. He has proposed only one qualification limiting labor's participation in top policy-making.

No sincere labor leader can quarrel with this. Some union men, perhaps too many, have a tendency to identify labor's interests with the interests of the labor union. Some do who will have trouble in accepting only a segment of American society. It cannot take its rightful place in a cooperative defense effort if it refuses to share with all Americans.

Neither labor nor business nor the farmer should regard the defense program as a power struggle from which one or the other must inevitably emerge victor. It is a joint effort for the common welfare of all Americans. The object is not to try to insure the biggest voice for any particular element in society, or even to safeguard the specific interests of competing groups. It is to make the nation stronger against a grave external peril.
