### TUCKER'S NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG

WASHINGTON—A generally unopposed rider to the executive branch bill now pending in congress will reduce the overstaffed executive department by several hundred thousand employees and mean an annual saving of \$1.5 billion. It is the first major opposition of one of Washington's most powerful and most active groups, the National Bureau of Bureaucrats.

The House and influential Rep. Ben F. Jensen, Iowa, is attacking the rider to the executive bill from its own side. It is estimated that agencies shall not fill more than 20 per cent of vacancies caused by the reduction of the staff.

Although the house has imposed the provision on the bill, the routine enforcement reduction already means the elimination of an estimated 75,000 jobs.

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### MORE BUNGLING REVEALED

Lt. Gen. Albert Wedemeyer called the U. S. forces in Korea to withdraw. He long-suppressed fear earlier report, finally released nearly four years after its submission to President Truman, reads like a comic account of Korean history since 1947.

The report predicted the Russians would speak a North Korean assault on South Korea as soon as the puppet forces were sufficiently strong and the U. S. troops to the south had been "handed off" by the Soviet Union to withdraw.

Wedemeyer recommended that the U. S. "organize, train and equip a South Korean 'scout force' of sufficient strength to fend off a North Korean attack. He proposed that this army be under U. S. military control and be officered initially by Americans, with a program for gradual replacement by Korean officers.

A South Korean army was established after the U. S. forces withdrew. But it was the guidance of a U. S. military mission, it was not equipped with heavy guns and tanks such as might normally be needed to repel an enemy attack.

Wedemeyer's report was not followed as a military expert? The government takes the position that we could not officer the South Korean army because to do so would make it virtually independent of the American army.

It may be argued that we were not dissuaded from using American officers with the Greek army against rebel communists, and we undertook to aid her outside the confines of the U. N.

There appears much less solid ground beneath the government's argument on the question of equipping the South Korean army. The excuse for failing to do so was that it well-equipped South Korean forces might be tempted to commit aggression itself.

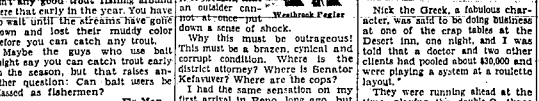

**Auto License Date Limit Is Set as Jan. 1**

BOISE, May 15 (AP)—The deadline for renewing automobile licenses in Idaho, having an emergency extension, will be Jan. 1 instead of March 1.

This was the substance of a ruling by the office of Atty.-Gen. Robertson of two conflicting statutes passed by the 1951 session of the legislature.

Assistant Atty.-Gen. William H. Baker issued this ruling today in response to a question by L. F. Watson of the inter-department motor ferry committee.

One measure, which became law Feb. 15 this year, is the one establishing the Dec. 15-March 1 period for renewing automobile licenses.

Another legislative act became law March 13 and is the later statute, the opinion here.

The law, chapter 119 of the 1951 session laws, provides that the license date for motor vehicles is Jan. 1 each year and may be extended for a limit of 45 days by the state law enforcement commissioner for good cause.

Custody of the son and \$25 per month for his support are sought by Mrs. Kepner. Her attorney is Roy E. Smith.

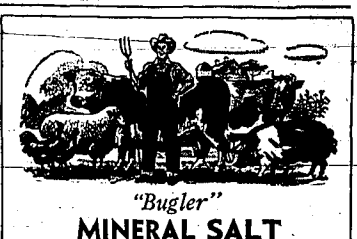

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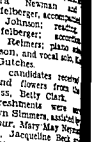

### Radio Signal Opens N. Y. Atomic Show

NEW YORK, May 15 (AP)—Wireless signals flashed around the world in a split second and set off a miniature explosion in the very midtown armory where they originated.

The eerie little blast, sparked by a small atomic energy pile, was a small ribbon at the opening of the seventh regional army exhibit.

The complicated but almost instantaneous explosion opened the first big "atoms for peace" exhibit, a feature of armed forces week.

**Fast Action**

The Morse code impulses strided the world with the speed of light. Once around, they activated a small uranium pile. This in turn set off a small hydrogen charge that broke the ribbon.

Brought here from Oak Ridge, Tenn., the show provides the most complete layout on atomic energy ever put together for mass public showing.

**Time Message**

David Barnoff tapped out the message in code that started the time of day. He is board chairman of the Radio Corporation of America, joint sponsors of the exhibit with the armed forces.

The armed forces exhibit, intended to show the perils and promises of atomic energy, takes up more than 7,000 square feet of floor space.

Its aim is to demonstrate the uses of atomic energy in farming, research and industry and also to denote against its dangers in atomic war.
