"What did she say?" I asked, shrinking inwardly.

"She said you sure are losing a lot of hair," he answered.

Later several other people made the same remark. Am I guess that summed up the general critical reaction—except for one letter that observed:

"Lord, you're gonna be an ugly old man."

Well, hoping to widespread public demand, I have decided to leave television to Tallulah Bankhead and Grock Marx. It didn't rain violence to me—it just rained.

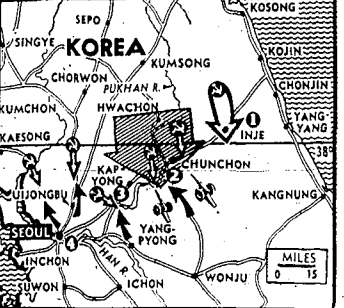

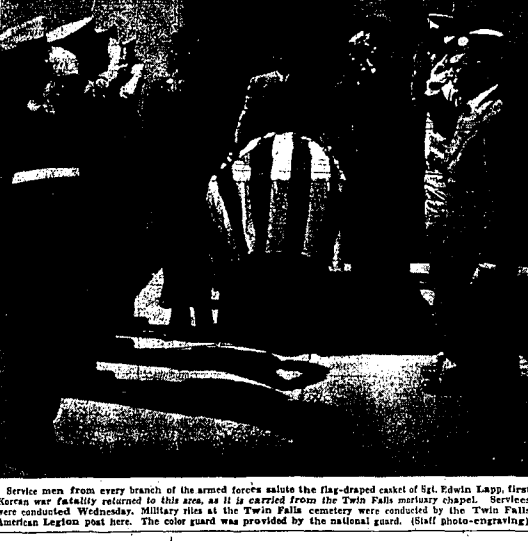

Time Reports Startling New Atom Missiles

NEW YORK, May 17 (AP)—Time magazine said today atom-missile war being developed "may well spell the doom of conventional bombing tactics."

The magazine's science editor, Jonathan Norton Leonard, described four types of experimental weapons, intended for launching from ground or air against targets in flight or on the surface.

Leonard painted a breathtaking word picture of such great missiles, soaring at incredible speed and height and picking out targets with an eerie accuracy that surpasses the human mind.

Castles Not Sounded
However, Leonard cautioned in his article.

"There will never be a golden age of punishment war, with the U. S. getting all the victories and the rest of the world getting all the defeats."

The older weapons, including the small atom of the future, will still be needed and must not be neglected.

The science writer said failures and timely counter-measures may nullify the missiles to some extent.

Leonard quotes mislabeled men who work with the terrifying objects as saying a war of atom-missiles would be followed by a war fought with clubs—shattered mankind reverie to slavery.

He calls the missiles "birds" and says some of them fly to tests from New Mexico, Point Mugu in southern California, Patrick air force base in Florida and the navy's converted airplane tender "Norton Sound."

4 Basic Types
As Leonard draws the picture, these are the basic types of guided missiles.

Surface-to-air—These are finned objects aimed from the ground at airplanes in flight.

Air-to-air—These can be smaller, carry less fuel and can be fired from one plane at another.

Air-to-ground—These could be launched from a bomber at a surface target. Leonard calls them "the bomber's best chance of passive defense" and says they might keep the bomber out of range of air-to-air and surface-to-air missiles.

Surface-to-surface—These Leonard calls the biggest birds of the family, vast intercontinental monsters—still in development—for decades than the German V-2 of World war II.

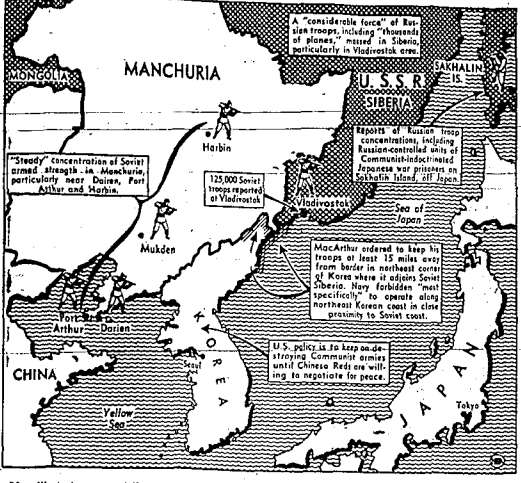

Many battlefields commanders in Korea now are convinced the Chinese communists have abandoned hope of winning an all-out victory and are playing for a draw.



They want to save face and cut their losses. Their objective would be to try to deny North Korea to the United Nations army by building a strong defensive alignment on or near the 38th-parallel. Ferguson patches say the present buildup of communist troops could lead to three courses of action by the enemy.

If we left our army in South Korea, it would be difficult to explain how we were carrying out the original U.N. directive to liberate and pacify Korea—all of Korea.
