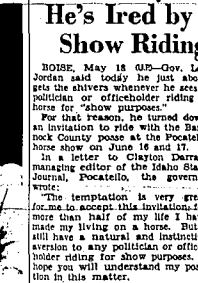

Farm Bureau Unit Opposes Dam Project

FILER, May 18—A resolution opposing the construction of the Hells Canyon dam was passed unanimously this week by the Filer Community Farm Bureau.

Reasons for the opposition, according to the resolution, are that it would be a waste of money and in effect would be a subsidy to the power utility.

"During a time of national emergency when we need money (taxes) for defense and we have no power shortage in Idaho, it would be a waste of our money to give private enterprise that is willing to do the same job with taxpayer money and also pay taxes on the project."

Don Bailey, Idaho Power company representative, was a guest at the meeting. Raymond Reichert was in charge of the session.

After passing the resolution, members of the Filer Farm Bureau expressed objections to the manner in which a resolution favoring the Hells Canyon dam was passed in 1932.

At a public meeting called by persons interested in supporting the dam, the resolution was pushed through a resolution favoring the project.

Queen Mother Death Causing Jap Problems

TOKYO, May 18 (AP)—A quiet little woman who lived in seclusion for 25 years died last Wednesday, May 16, 1892 at San Jacinto, N. M.

She was dowager Empress Satoko, 66, the died of heart ailment. Government officials were uncertain what kind of funeral should be held for the late empress.

Situation Changed. Before Japan became a democracy, the procedure would have been definite. The day would be a national holiday and all Japanese subjects would be in mourning for a year.

Today Japanese officials feel this would not be proper, but are puzzling over just what sort of funeral they can arrange to show respect to so prominent a national personage.

Emperor Hirohito, who died Christmas day, 1925, is revered in Japanese history now as the Emperor Taisho. The empress nursed him during his years of illness.

Her major claim to prominence, one that made her greatly admired was that she was the mother of the late emperor's four sons.

Emperor Hirohito and the empress resided at Onizuka palace 40 minutes after her death. Her second son, Prince Chichibu, was believed to be in the palace at the time. Some Tamakusa and Mikasa and their princesses called later.

Gen. Matshu B. Higway sent his condolences.

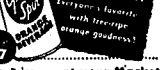

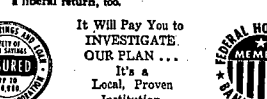

Potato Prices Above '50 Are Expected Through Next Month

WASHINGTON, May 18 (Special)—Prices for potatoes will continue higher than last year through June, the department of agriculture forecast today.

The department's bureau of agricultural economics reported: "New potatoes from commercial early producing areas will be in considerably shorter supply this May and June than a year earlier since indicated acreages intended for late spring and summer harvest are considerably smaller than a year earlier."

"March intentions of farmers to plant indicated the possibility of a 10 per cent reduction in total potato acreage compared with 1950. Yields considered most likely on acreages indicated by the March intentions would result in a surplus again this year but much smaller than for the 1950 crop. Because of the likelihood of a surplus if the intended acreage is planted, farmers may plant less than they intended last March."
