# TUCKER'S NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG

Very Sunday the veteran Washington correspondent devotes his columns to answering readers' questions of "Tucker's National Whirligig," a weekly column devoted to the news of the world.

**WASHINGTON**— "Defense Secretary Marshall," writes P. M. Binghamton, N. Y., "says one reason the administration opposes General Hoover's nomination as ambassador to China is the opposition of the U. S. United Nations members fighting with us in Korea. He says they are afraid we will lose these allies, and will go alone, even if the Marshall strategy provided an all-out effort with Russia."

"Will you kindly explain what our allies would have done—or would do—if they broke with us? Incidentally, how much have they given us in Korea?"

**WEAKER**— Answer: In my opinion, and I find it to be held rather generally, this is the weaker side of the anti-Marshall argument. I doubt very much whether General Marshall as a military man, really better qualified than anyone else to command our troops in Korea, would be more like a position forced upon him by Secretary of State Dean Acheson.

In the first place, there would our allies—Britain, France, the Low Countries, Turkey, etc.—go. They would cut us out from the front. They would not possess the material or military strength to create what America alone, the resigned leader of the free world, could not create. Without our advances of arms and money, they could stand up against Russia for a minute.

Secondly, the whole world, as well as the citizens of our own associates, want to become members of the Marshall plan. They want to be in London or Paris, along in alliance with any combination of European nations, can exercise the real balance of power that they did from 1900 until 1914. They must side with us, or fall under communist control.

"**TOKKI**"—In answering P. M.'s second question, which has been asked by many other readers, I might note that General Marshall has "killed" the "token" variety of the "token" variety. One definition of "token" in Webster's is "altruistic," or "a sample of the real thing." This is certainly applicable to the way in which U. S. members have implemented their resolution to oppose the communist invasion of South Korea. Although I must give only rough figures for reasons of space, the U. S. has sent over 200,000 and 5,000 respectively, a division and a combat team. The British also have a few warships operating in nearby waters. In opposition to this effort, the only aid that has been given us is a single soldier, and only one South American country has made any contribution.

**EXPENDITURE**—Data for the relatively small payrolls of each nation's forces, which they bear, we are financing the "police action." We are paying for the transportation, food, logistical operations, hospitalization, etc.

It is impossible to estimate our expenditure, accordingly, but it will probably cost us between \$10,000,000 and \$20,000,000 for the first year of fighting, which will run June 25.

That amount, of course, will not appear on the army's books as a Korean debt because the official accounts will deduct the total our units would have cost. If they were undergoing intensive training on home soil, it will be charged off to "experience."

**LAKE**—Numerous readers, including a "New Editor," have been inquiring into Herbert Hoover's statement that the United States had reached such a "properly peak that 'two chickens in every pot' and 'two shes in every garage' had become common possessions in this country. I regret to say that I must take a plea on this lapse.

Somewhere, the belief has become fixed that Mr. Hoover did make such claims in the 1928 campaign. For it was the main speech of his campaign, and was then known as "Coolidge prosperity." But Lawrence Cheney, Mr. Hoover's closest personal friend and general agent at Washington, assures me that "the chief" never indulged in such bombast.

We have gone over all of Mr. Hoover's speeches and statements, and I can't find the "two chickens and two shes" anywhere. At first we thought that Charley Nicholson had planted them on Mr. Hoover when he was in the Democratic propaganda office. But we can't find it in any of his stuff. We don't know when or where it originated.

**TOPS**—"Did General MacArthur ever outrank General Marshall and vice versa?" writes A. J. Los Angeles. "And how does Eisenhower fit into this same picture?"

Answer: At a major general and chief of staff in the 30's, MacArthur outranked Marshall, who was then a lieutenant colonel during World War II, and now as defense secretary, Marshall is tops. Eisenhower was only a major and a MacArthur side against the last of his staff. He never has outranked the other two men.

Up rose Fletcher Boorman of the Wall Street Journal to ask what kind of a price would you like to see for a steer under the new price rollback orders?

All he wanted to know was how the new controls would affect the livestock industry. The livestock fater, the feeder, the packer, the wholesaler, and the retailer—and the price paid by the consumer.

Finally Boorman of the Wall Street Journal took the floor. Mike again to ask, "Thanks to Congress, B. Scribner, Kansas City, he finally had obtained the answer to his own question and he proceeded to tell the gentlemen what it was:

"If a feeder buys a 2000 pound steer at \$18, he pays \$20 for costs, \$10 for interest, \$5 for average death loss, \$5 for freight, \$3 for marketing cost. Total cost of the steer is now \$23. But the steer has now put on 200 pounds and weighs 700 pounds. So it now costs \$33 a cent a pound."

"This steer, having been fed on grass, is commercial grade beef. The selling price is therefore 20 cents a pound. And if the farmer sells at this price, he loses 13 cents a pound. Simple."

All this while the senators and congressmen were keeping awfully quiet. They were sitting, smiling, rather that their good constituents, the eating and the feeding, a better case for themselves: "Mike Dibble made a bad showing for himself on the hill today," said one congressman, "but the cattlemen saved him tonight."

And as the party broke up, one cattlemen was heard to observe, "The damned newspapers here are all communist."

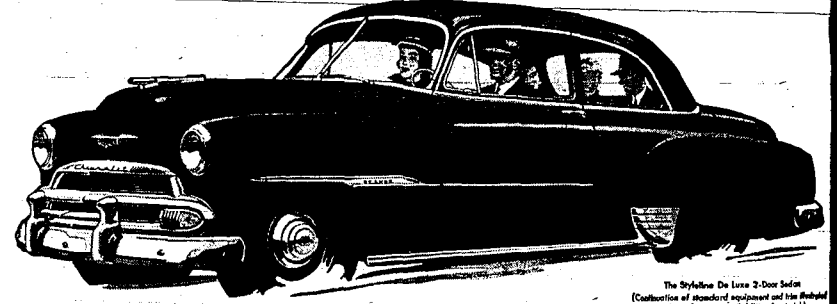

## Warning Call Is Voiced on Beet Hoppers

(From Page One)

Development of the beet leathopper, which is a pest of the beet, is being reported by the weather in April. At the present time, the development is further advanced than in 1936.

Weather Holds Key

Weather conditions during the past three weeks will affect the development rate of beet leathoppers and the suitability of seed-hat plants for their breeding. This will determine the number of leathoppers that will move into the cultivated areas.

The spring generation of beet leathoppers should start moving into the cultivated areas of southern Idaho about May 31 and should reach their peak about June 22.

Curly Top Danger

Laboratory tests indicate the percentage of spring generation leathoppers carrying the curly top virus will be higher than average. Crops susceptible to curly top disease receive the greatest injury if infected in the seedling stage.

It is believed that the majority of leathoppers will be cultivated areas during the period of June 12 to 26. Weather conditions present as soon as weather conditions permit. These crops generally require some resistance to this disease with site and age.

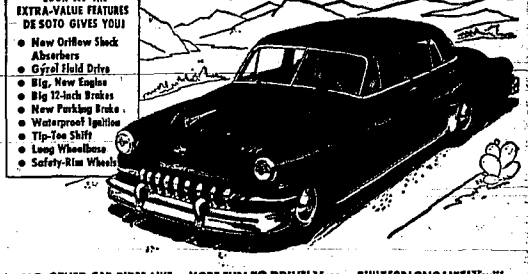

### Further Cuts Set For Metal Usage

WASHINGTON, May 19.—The government has today announced that strategic materials will be cut an average of 20 to 30 per cent below pre-war levels.

But at the same time National Production-Administrator Manly Fetschmann assured representatives of 37 major civilian goods industries their production would not be allowed to become a "casualty" of the mobilization program.

He said Mobilization Chief Charles E. Wilson is firmly determined that the civilian economy will go along at a "reduced but ample and substantial rate."

Fetschmann disclosed that consumers goods manufacturers could expect an average 30 per cent cut in steel supplies, a 40 per cent in copper and a 50 per cent cut in aluminum.

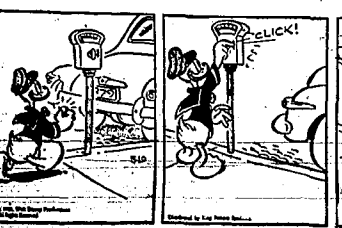

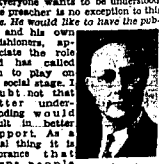

# AS YOUR MINISTER SEES IT

**"The Preacher"**

Some appreciate men like Gamaliel as a member of the Jewish Sanhedrin in Paul's day. Gamaliel commended his disciples who were on trial before them but to patiently wait to see whether the new movement they represented was from God or man. How different the tactics of some theological reactionaries who get friendly satisfaction out of calling a preacher a Methodist! How different the methods of flag-waving patriots who accuse the Communist labels to each of God.

In the yesterday's preacher who stepped out of beaten paths were burned; now they are branded. Once they are branded what a pity that in the modern day we have a feeling that men and women by the thousands look upon the preacher as an odd fellow. They consider him a sort of pious meddler in public affairs. A narrow interferer with people's liberties. A stubborn opponent of social progress. They say that the church is stuck to religion and the church, by which they usually mean mystic contemplation of Bible expositions. Some of his misunderstanders know full well that the preacher is committed by his calling to protect the very folks that they want to exploit; and so they view him as a dangerous competitor. He frustrates them at their pursuit of human prey. Well, I think it needs to be said that a preacher, true to his Anointer, believes that he must obey God rather than men. He believes that because Christ lived and died to redeem men he himself must serve in sacrificial love.

On our back lawn there is a path that dogs have made. Almost every dog that passes that way uses the same path. Little dogs and big dogs, expensive hounds and cheap curs, young pups and old quadrupeds, all use the same beaten path. In large part society is very much like that in its way of thinking and doing. We build up traditions and customs among men which gain social approval and conventional respectability. And the deeper the path is to be taken the more difficult it is for a person to follow a different course. Now the preacher is usually the kind of person who will take that path only when he thinks it squares with the ethics of Jesus. His refusal to conform is not an indication of casuistry as some suppose. It is rather the outcome of courageous conviction, and reverence for the living God. The preacher is in the crowd but above it. He loves his fellow men but hates the sin that hurts them.

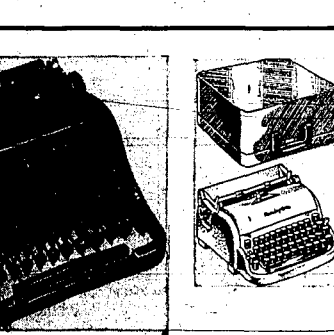

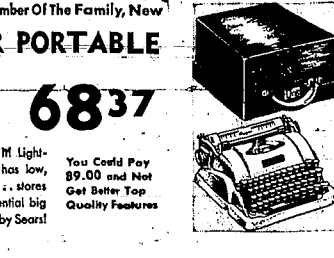

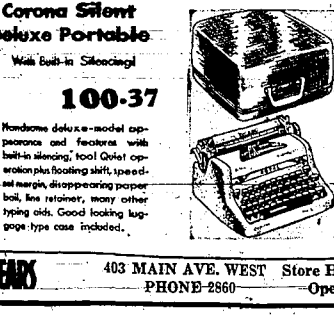
