Almond announced his 10th corps was killed or wounded 48,941 reds on the east-central front. Sunday's toll alone was 24,700, he said, the biggest one-day total of the war. Allied officers estimated 10,200 other casualties were inflicted on the west-central front. AP Correspondent George A. McArthur reported.

Future of Controls Dim As Pressure Mounting

WASHINGTON, May 21 (AP)—Mounting pressure from many sides today made it more uncertain the post-June 30 shape of the government's economic controls program. Finance generally wants prices and rent rolled back and wages geared to living costs. Civilian industry thinks more materials should be pushed one way; defense industry, another. John L. Lewis favors scrapping all wage and price controls. Farmers and stockholders of the city dwellers. Some congressmen think present controls are too broad; others too narrow. Leaders of the senate banking committee predict Mr. Truman will get some—but not all of the new powers he seeks under an extension of the defense production act to 1952.

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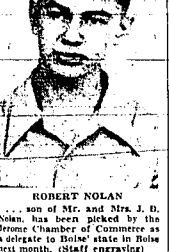

WASHINGTON—The overseas overhauling of the economic cooperation administration units has drawn attention to the activities of the House appropriations committee and the subcommittee which handles these funds. In the opinion of many key members of the committee, the present administration provides a faraway haven for politicians, friends of influential financiers and pre-Truman labor union appointees.

The latest discovery of this hideout hidden situation lies behind prodding demands from both sides of the aisle for a new administration. In the case of ECA appropriation for the 1952 fiscal year.

It is not too far that, when and if Marshall aid is terminated, most of these so-called "specialists" will be transferred to the civilian agencies supposed to cooperate in the foreign rearmament program.

LOADS—ECA's European headquarters, for instance, has a force of 100 specialists ranging from \$5,000 to \$15,000. The office is loaded down with employees listed as consultants, advisers for every problem from feeding babies to building bridges.

There are also office staffs as small and the 250 at GPO, they also are swollen with men and women. Many of these specialists are beneficiaries of the most elementary facts of life. The vast range of their interests and specialties is almost boundless. In the case of the United States reveal what they term "interference" with their own way of life.

CLOSURE—When headed by Paul G. Hoffman, a Indiana Republican and an outstanding industrialist, ECA was almost a successful institution. Hoffman got what he wanted in many instances. He was the president Truman named ECA activities eventually shifted to the State department, which is looking at the organization with a cold and fussy eye.

The study actually is the first close-up examination of ECA personnel and machinery. Preliminary findings show that the organization should be transformed into a separate and independent agency rather than placed under Dean Acheson or any other executive department.

ERABRAT—Ironically, the two countries where the work of overhauling ECA is being done in the world-wide was against communist aggression, their small size and the fact that they have no members to ask searching questions on the need for such elaborate units there.

Although there is a fighting ground since last June, ECA has 108 various kinds of representatives in the United States. Even if Korea is still the "land of no returning," the men on capitol hill cannot understand why so many officials, with salaries ranging from \$10,000 to \$20,000, were needed there. In view of the 250 assigned to European headquarters, the Korean total seems out of balance.

SPECIALISTS—The official definition of the 106 experts and assignments also aroused congressional curiosity. For instance, are the kind of specialists the United States still has in its war-torn and primitive land?

At a bank examiner, a telephone engineer, a fishing boat construction specialist, three kind of doctors, an industrial health and safety consultant, a tax adviser, a statistical and auditor, a special operations specialist. There are other American specialists in the field. Koreans have a few specialists in the field.

It is not too far that the price ECA brings for political and economic specialists in Greece. This tiny, Balkan country has 125 ECA workers or half the total on duty at general ECA headquarters. It is the only one with 41 in only 4 in England and 40 in Italy, a key and strategic Mediterranean peninsula.

Among the ECA specialists in Greece are three well-drilling specialists, two information specialists and two electrical specialists. The American specialists in this and other ECA countries did not realize they were "specialists" until they read their commissions, signed by President Harry S. Truman.

Although the civil service commission was not permitted to pass upon ECA's 500-odd employees overseas, the Senate and House, which controls largely of foreigners hired abroad, had to be cleared by Democratic National Chairman Boyle.

STANDARDS—The most important political decision reached by Republican strategists at recent conference—July 14 at national headquarters here and in capitol hill—is to veer away from the Truman-McCarthy squabble. Another coalition agreement was made to deposit all their 1944 political eggs in a foreign straws basket.

The possible outbreak of war with Russia, which the Pentagon experts such as Defense Secretary Marshall forecast, would force a moratorium on the foreign soldier for the United States. The reason for the underlying reasons for the conflict, the GOP would like to rally around the flag.

Views—Opponents believe the strongest issue is "compulsion," or a variation of it. By that term they mean the general low ethical standards of many White House aides and the Truman's tolerance for the fact, his condoning of them. The shift of strategy will soon be apparent in official speeches and statements by opposition leaders.

HOW THINGS APPEAR FROM PEGLER'S ANGLE

TUCSON, May 19.—During William P. O'Dwyer's testimony at the television circuit produced by Senator McCarran's subcommittee on May 17, New Hampshirite O'Dwyer accused Tucson of soliciting and receiving contributions from mysterious forces in the city.

O'Dwyer denied the solicitation but never the fact that he had been approached by one of Asheville Goldsmith's West Coast representatives in the Waldorf tower, 8016 Balfour.

Goldsmith is supposed to be a Republican, but his groups pour thousands into Democratic campaigns for 1950. He is a member of the National Citizens Committee for Good Government, American Bank Building, Manhattan, N. Y. Senator O'Dwyer's campaign secretary, Frank W. Hornig, Tucson City Commissioner, Tucson City Treasurer, New Hampshire Citizens committee, Tucson, N. Y. He makes \$700, much less than Goldsmith and his other states, including Nevada, where they tried to beat McCarran. They sent more than \$5,000 to Nevada.

REFAURER appeared on a list filed Sept. 1, 1948, with a contribution for \$200 above his name. He is now in Tucson for another award. He was arrested Oct. 25, and for \$200 in a statement of June 9.

That makes \$250 for Refaurer. So two members of this committee got \$150 from this secretive, political society for purposes which Goldsmith refuses to disclose.

In the face of this refusal, O'Dwyer's committee is not a clue in the political character of his candidate, except in McCarran's case where the object plainly was to dump out of an important committee a man who has been vigorously anti-communist.

McCarran, a mock Republican congressman from the city of New York, is a regular on the lists of Goldsmith's groups. He has \$1,400 in six clubs for his campaign. He is a member of the National Citizens Committee for Good Government, American Bank Building, Manhattan, N. Y.

In their colloquy before the television circuit, O'Dwyer said: "You are paying for money to give you in your primaries and your election. There was an organization here that went out to beat Bob McCarran, in Nevada, and the story circulated is that you called up on the long distance phone to get the help and that you got the money."

"I never called anybody in New York for contributions," said O'Dwyer. "I only had one deal. If I had I would not personally telephone for money. This answer left challenged O'Dwyer's statements with the clerk of the house of representatives by Goldsmith's Committee on National Affairs, and his committee on Public Affairs, both interested setups, and gnomes, stating under oath that they had cost money into New Hampshire to elect a Democrat to Republican cause.

O'Dwyer's ears and hammed it up for the television but he didn't deny that he got the money, and finally Senator O'Connor, Maryland, took him off the hook by ruling that in this was a digression.

In a report dated June 8, 1950, O'Dwyer's committee, headed by headquarters in Goldsmith's personal apartment, listed a committee of \$200 for the campaign of O'Dwyer, Tucson, N. Y. The date of this gift was April 8, 1950.

The Tucson list has the senator's case, Charles W. Tobey, Jr., and Zellers is Allen Zellers, young O'Dwyer's campaign public relations officer of Merrimack county, Young Tucson is a member of the New Hampshire house of representatives.

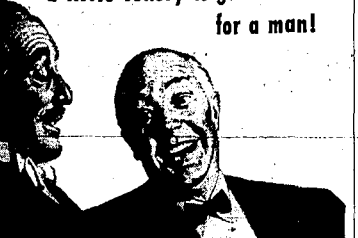
