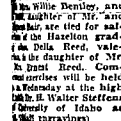

Ignore Claims For Medicine, Sick Advised

WASHINGTON, May 22 (AP)—"Don't believe those 'Run down' spots before your eyes? Fight with your wife more than usual?"

Then hurry to see your doctor and don't pay any attention to the slick ads of door-to-door patent medicine salesmen, the U. S. food and drug administration advised.

This is exactly a new warning, but the agency specified it in the course of repelling a court order to "inquire in food and drug law history," forbidding 15,000 salesmen to make "extraneous" claims for a vitamin and mineral product called Nutrilite.

Recalling Made
To get their evidence, federal inspectors posed as Nutrilite salesmen and as customers. They made recordings of sales talks, as delivered by real salesmen then went into U. S. district court in Los Angeles and made a complaint.

After reading transcripts of the sales talks, the national distributor of the product agreed to the court order putting restrictions on what salesmen may claim, said Dr. Paul C. Dunham, commissioner of food and drugs.

Some Fehdians
"Claims that Nutrilite has any value in treating 57 serious diseases, including cancer, heart trouble, diabetes, arthritis and rheumatism are specifically prohibited," Dunham said.

The court order does, however, allow canvassers to claim that the product helps diet and nutrition in 30 ways—in the cases, for instance, of people who don't eat the right foods or who cook the vitamins out of food.

Special Levy Is Passed in Camas

FAIRFIELD, May 22—A special levy of eight and one-half mills was passed at a special school meeting held in Fairfield Saturday afternoon. The vote was 68 to 20. This is in addition to the 15 1/2 mill levy and reduces the school tax one-half mill from what it was last year. It still includes a rate of \$1,000 in teachers' salaries and funds for a new school bus.

At a meeting prior to the voting the proposed new budget was explained by school officials. The budget for next year amounts to \$87,500.

Some residents of Hill City, west of Fairfield, have requested a bus to bring their children to the county school. The school board, however, increased the amount to be paid residents of the east end of the Prairie who transport their own children to school so another bus will not be necessary.

Idaho Mother Freed on Odd Parole Terms

LEWISTON, May 22 (AP)—Lillian Roach, 38, charged with contributing to the delinquency of her son, 14, has escaped a four-month jail sentence by signing an agreement in which she promised, among other things, not to drink and to serve hot meals at home at reasonable hours.

The written agreement was presented to Mrs. Roach yesterday by Justice of the Peace Ben E. Kelley. She had been in the Parole county jail since May 12. Mrs. Roach was arrested on complaint of Harold Hanson, New Pore county probation officer. Her son also was held in jail on charges of truancy and petty theft.

Another son, 11, was apprehended last week by officers on petty theft charges.

Mrs. Roach also promised to see that her two boys attend school regularly, are taught right from wrong, and to have respect for law and order. She also obligated herself to see that they are not on the streets after dark unless accompanied by herself, her husband, or some other responsible adult.

Kelley warned Mrs. Roach that refusal to comply with her written pledge will mean revocation of the probation.

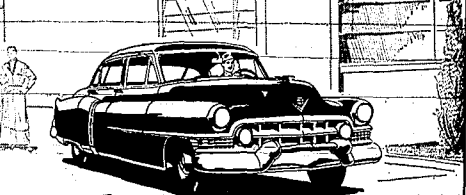

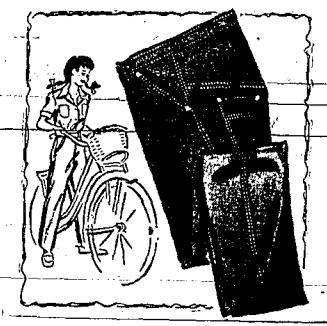

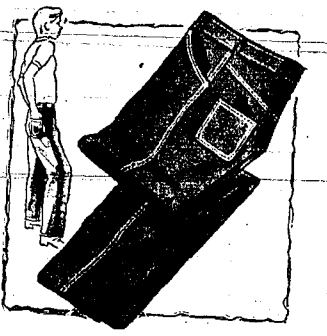
