Blockade Plan Alone Unwise, Admiral Avers

WASHINGTON, May 30 (P)—Admiral Forrest P. Sherman testified today he hopes for "an effective United Nations commercial and naval blockade" on red China, but believes the United States should not undertake one alone.

Sherman, chief of naval operations, said Russia might join with force and might with the United States declared on its own and without U. N. backing. He said he believed the Russians might respect one by the United Nations.

Sherman was testifying at a Senate hearing into the conduct of Gen. Douglas MacArthur for publicly advocating a "naval blockade" and other measures to hit directly at the Chinese communists for interfering in the Korean fighting.

CIO Charges Plot of Big Business Group

WASHINGTON, May 30 (P)—The CIO accused big business today of trying to bribe labor to join in "scuttling price controls" and then "share the loot" with business.

CIO Secretary-Treasurer James B. Carey, in a statement for the senate banking committee, cited specifically the National Association of Manufacturers and the U. S. Chamber of Commerce.

He said the two organizations are guilty of "a complete irresponsibility and a narrow greed that could wholly wreck our defense program." Carey added:

"They threaten the ending of prices and wage control. Now certainly we of organized labor do not care for controls for their own sake, but certainly we have no love for concessions over the wages we might bargain for."

Dispel Disease Fear In Irrigation

May 30 (AP)—Seventeen tons of irrigate truck crops from Idaho were sold today, after a health controversy over the water was dispelled.

Boats Run by Outboard Not Liable in Tax

BOZER, May 20 (AP)—Boats using outboard motors are not subject to licensing provisions of a 1931 law, the attorney general's office has ruled.

Legal assistant attorney general, emphasized, however, that such boats are subject to the ad valorem tax the same as other personal property.

In an opinion requested by Thomas J. Kurdy, executive secretary of the state tax commission, Leggett disclosed the 1931 and 1933 laws setting up license fees for various types of boats. Such fees are in kind of property taxes.

He said the 1934 act definitely provided that "no license shall be levied upon outboard or row-boats."

The 1931 law exempted rowboats, but made no reference to outboards. Leggett said that as originally introduced, the 1931 law did establish a license fee for outboards, but this provision was eliminated by amendment.

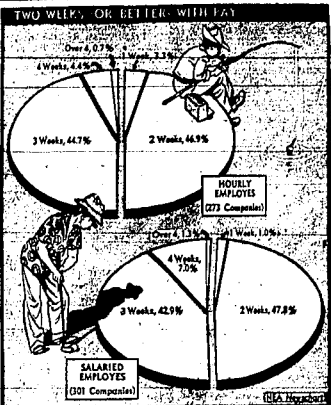
