Editor, Times-News: The annual death in Idaho from tuberculosis decreased from 247 in 1924 to 107 in 1928, the year in which I was health officer of North Carolina. During these years the annual number of Idaho typhoid fever patients fell from 160 to 10, and the annual number of diphtheria patients fell from 14 to 2. These two other contagious diseases, however, there has been no corresponding decrease. These also are contagious because they can be transmitted to the children of the afflicted. This failure of control is partly because "sanitary" measures have not been applied adequately.

WASHINGTON, June 2 (Special)—As public versus private power fight grows more bitter, the Washington legislature is being forced to come out of the house ways and means committee shortly to a 9 to 3 per cent tax on gross sales of electric energy by publicly owned power groups. Only rural electrification administration cooperatives are exempt—everybody else, including the giant TVA, will pay.

Supporters of the tax in the 25-member ways and means committee were reported to outnumber opponents two to one to the provision in the bill. The bill is expected to be reported to the house in the next few days. It will prevent any change, so it will be up to the senate if the lower chamber passes the whole bill as expected.

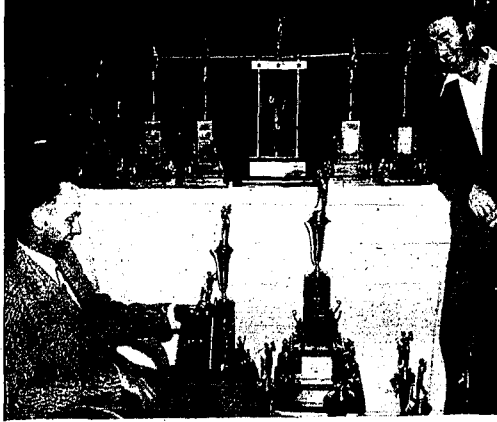

MAGIC VALLEY ARMY OF FISHERMEN AWAITS MONDAY OPENING

Reservoirs to Get Top Play as Most Streams Are Roily

Magic Valley's army of fishermen was poised today awaiting the signal for the opening of the 1951 general fishing season at 4 a. m. Monday. Thousands of anglers will take to streams and reservoirs, but the fish and game department predicted only fair results.

Conservation officers, guiding for the fish, were reminding the worst to yet to come. Opening day fishing pressure is expected to be heavy in certain reaches, but a week-end's rain of anglers probably will top opening day.

Winter survival of fish and substantial plantings will be fair fishing in the reservoirs. Heavy frosts have kept streams muddy and roily and it may be three to four weeks before water conditions will be ideal for good angling.

Magic reservoir in Blaine county is expected to be the hardest hit opening day with second place honors probably going to Gilman reservoir in Twin Falls county. Clear water and good catches to hundreds who will line every available inch of shoreline.

Conservation Officer Grover Davie, Fish, reported favorable river conditions on a Monday in the area and said the department has reports and maintains fish stocks in the area.

Salmon reservoir should be "very roily." Water is in fair condition with a moderate amount of silt and mud. Both the fish and game department and anglers might catch a few trout, but it is expected to be slow.

The conservation officer reminded anglers of four streams in Twin Falls county set for openings. They are Mud creek near Bush, Cedar draw creek near Slaughter house creek near Twin Falls and that portion of Rock creek due south of Kinley.

Anglers are reminded that Big Wood river and all tributaries from and above the old swimming pier bridge across the Big Wood river and Little Wood river and all tributaries above Carey reservoir do not open until June 15.

Streams in Coeur d'Alene are high and muddy. Lake Cleveland is partially covered with ice and the road in the area of the lake is closed to the water. The Bala-Oakley pass road is open as is the Birch tree-Alamo road through the city of Rocka. All other passes in the area are open.

Most Important Golf Step Is Proper, Strong Swing

The most important part of a person's golf game is the swing. The swing is the sequence of movement that gets you set correctly for driving or controlled power into your destination.

The downswing is a well-controlled swing that starts with the whole body—from the feet to finger tips—playing a precise part. You hit the ball at the same time simultaneous movement starts in your hips and shoulders.

Action of the feet and right leg produces a shifting movement of the hip toward the target. In the early part of the downswing, the right shoulder moves down and the left shoulder moves up as the legs and knee come around into the ball.

The left leg is slightly bent at the knee but it is firmly supporting the thrust of the right side. As the left leg moves forward, the right leg has been raised a little, but the toe of the left foot still maintains firm contact with the ground.

At this stage of the swing, the arms do not move independently of the body. Arms and club are moved by the shoulders like the spokes of a wheel with the shoulders as the hub. As the swing continues, the left knee moves forward, lifting the left leg further, but the toe of the left foot still maintains a solid grip on the ground.

The left knee moves forward and to the right to create a pivot between the feet. So far, there is very little independent action of the arms. The right knee moves forward, the left arm and the club is maintained approximately in the same position and the hands are even with the waist from there on.

At the top of the backswing your body is turned until your shoulders are at right angles to the direction line. Both feet have firm contact with the ground with slightly more pressure on the right foot. A stiffen your right leg.

Footwork and the hip and shoulder movement must permit the arm to swing freely. Your left arm remains straight and stiff. The angle between your left arm and the club still is approximately a right angle.

### AEC Claim of Pact on Road Draws Denial

BOISE, June 2 (AP)—Three state officials today flatly denied that Idaho had entered into an agreement with the atomic energy commission concerning a proposed new Blackfoot-Alco reactor test station highway.

Gov. Len Jordan, Highway Commissioner J. R. McKinney and Chief Highway Engineer James Reid all look lanes with a statement by AEC Idaho Operations Manager L. E. Johnson that an agreement was reached with the state in the fall of 1949.

Ureux Cost-Sharing  
Jordan touched off the controversy yesterday when he demanded that the AEC share the cost of the contemplated new road, which generally would follow part of the present U. S. highway 20.

Johnston came back with the statement from Idaho Falls that it was agreed in 1949 "that the AEC's contribution to the Idaho Falls reactor testing station road would assure reconstruction of U. S. highway 20 west of Blackfoot out of state funds then on hand."

Denial Agreement  
When informed Johnson's statement, the governor said that he never had heard of such an agreement. McKinney and Reid joined in disclaiming knowledge of such a contract.

Reid said that discussions during the time mentioned by Johnson dealt with a section of road between Arco and the AEC reactor testing station site, for which the state had programmed \$200,000 as a "betterment project." He suggested that the AEC might have contacted the project with reconstruction of U. S. highway 20.

Governor Jordan's first statement came after his return from Blackfoot, where the highway 20 route was discussed between state officials and a representative of the AEC. The governor said the AEC told him they had no funds available for the road from Blackfoot.

### Idaho's Farm Price Index Is Still Slipping

BOISE, June 2 (AP)—Prices received by Idaho farmers continued to decline during May.

As of May 15, the index was 90.3, seven points below a month ago, but 44 points above May 1950.

The department of agriculture said prices of grain and wool indices showed the greatest decline. Cattle held the same as last month, but hogs were down 40 cents and lambs declined \$1.60 per hundredweight.

A five cent drop in the price of wool to 90 cents per pound dropped the other livestock prices index 20 points from April 15.

The department reported steady crop prices except for oats which gained four cents per bushel.

Alfalfa hay was 70 cents per ton lower. Potatoes were down 10 cents per bushel, red clover seed down \$1.70 per bushel and alfalfa seed lower by \$2 a bushel.

Prices paid by farmers for feed showed a slight increase.

### Summer Stars Coming Back In Area Skies

 The stars of summer are taking their places in the blue heavens above. In a few weeks they will dominate the celestial scene, and the silent "muscle of the spheres" will be in full harmony soon.

Venus, the glowing planet of love and beauty, still dominates the western evening sky. No directions are necessary for its location as it far outshines all other star-like objects.

**Moon, Venus Near**  
 On the evenings of June 7 and 8, Venus and the crescent moon will appear near each other. The closest approach occurs in the morning daylight hours, when the moon will be in this part of the world.

On June 23, Venus will be farthest east of the sun, will be above the horizon three hours after sunset and in optical instruments will be a half moon. Then it will approach the beautiful crescent moon.

Supper is very brilliant as it rises about one and a half hours after sunset. Mars and Mercury are not placed well for observation at any time this month.

A herald of the coming of summer is the appearance low in the southwest of the bright red star Antares, the heart of the celestial dragon. In the fading twilight its energetic twinkling will attract attention in that part of the sky. Antares will be slightly farther west each succeeding evening, and in the fall will be lost in the sunset.

**Another Herald**  
 By the time the sky is getting dark, another summer herald is peeping above the horizon at a point nearly due east. This is the bright star, the principal star in the constellation the Eagle. At the same time well up in the sky some what north of east, Vega is appearing. Farther northeast, Deneb in the northern cross is less luminous.

If we start with Venus an hour after sunset and on the sky draw an imaginary line from the fine planet until we reach a point well up in the south, we shall find four celestial billiards. The blue-white star about due south is Spica, the brightest in the constellation of Virgo.

Now if we trace from Spica in the direction of Venus, we find a bright object in the yellow planet Saturn. A slight inspection will show it does not twinkle, as do real stars of its general luminosity.
