Battle Victim Is Returned From Korea

The remains of marine corps Pfc. Patrick J. Berkeley are being returned to his family by the steamer to dock at San Francisco Monday, according to word sent local relatives.

The relatives here are uncertain whether burial will be made in Twin Falls or in Los Olivos, Calif., where his parents, Mr. and Mrs. E. H. Berkeley, reside. His last winter from their home in Idaho river canyon.

Private Berkeley was killed in action Aug. 12, 1930, on a hill near Changshu, Korea. He was the youngest of the first marine division. He was buried in the United Nations cemetery at Muan, 25 miles west of Pusan.

He was born in Utah on Feb. 15, 1902, and attended school there. His death, at the age of 28, came only two years after he had married. His father was a veteran of World war 1.
