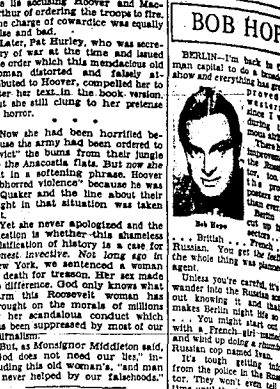

Pilot and Girl Are Rescued After Mishap

SALT LAKE CITY, June 6 (AP)—A young Oregon flier and his 15-year-old sweetheart were carried out of the rugged Wasatch mountains last night after their plane smashed into a canyon side a day earlier.

A rescue party, scrambling over jagged rocks and marlshand on foot, brought out the couple more than 24 hours after they crashed into mountain slopes above City creek canyon.

Both Darrel Walkmeyer, 22, Portland, and his 15-year-old fiancée, Betty Ann, Vancouver, Wash., were reported in a fair condition this morning at LDS hospital.

Walkmeyer sustained a fractured ankle, a serious leg laceration, shock and exposure. The girl incurred a cracked chest, other fractures and severe shock.

State aeronautics officials blamed "pilot error" for the crash about 15 miles east of Salt Lake valley.

The pair, on a flight from Portland to Fairbury, Neb., to visit Walkmeyer's relatives, crashed Monday at 4 p. m. wreckage of the small plane was not spotted until yesterday morning. It was at the 8,000-foot level near Red Butte mountain in the Wasatch range, an estimated 16 miles from Salt Lake City.

In an account of the accident at the scene of the crash, Walkmeyer told a reporter that the plane began to lose altitude over the mountains.

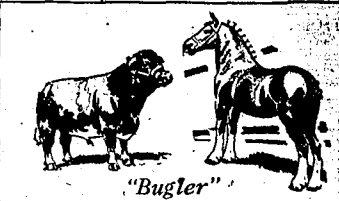
"As we started to lose altitude, a sort of odd feeling hit me," the young man reported. "I pulled back on the wheel until I thought I would pull it apart. The nose of the ship came up, but the altimeter kept going down."

"I don't remember the crash much," he stated. "I passed out."

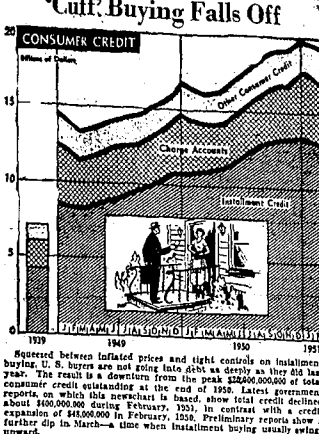

Moths Invade City; Experts See No Hope

CANON CITY, Colo., June 6 (AP)—Millions of moths swarmed over Canon City today and city experts said they might hover around to the end of the summer.

Swallows by the hundreds swooped through the skies, eating themselves on the trees, but couldn't robble up enough of them to halt the invasion.

Canon City citizens batted the bugs from their shirt collars and off their food at tables.

Residents warned Entomologists at Colorado A. and M. college said the moths apparently were those of the army cutworm. They warned residents against using aerosol poisons because of the danger to humans.

Householders installed moth traps, store-bought and home-made, in an effort to cope with the invasion, but every light globe was a halo of insects last night.

Long Stay Seen
 The moths, commonly known as "miller's," swarmed into town in force during a warm spell five days ago. The experts said they probably would be around for the rest of the summer and might come back again next year unless there was a good winter kill.

City Daily Recorder messaged the United Press at Denver that "we are under siege of millions of moths" and that what could be done.

The entomologist said they were practically no way to exterminate them.

System Planned On Combat News

TOKYO, June 6 (AP)—Gen. Matsuzaki's staff is working on a new system planned to take single, straight control over command of Korean war news, effective June 15.

It also restricts the use of telephone facilities by war correspondents, presumably to make the most efficient use of communication facilities.

In announcing the change, the press advisory division of CHQ said certain shortcomings in our censorship organization when he was still U. S. eighth army commander in Korea.

Without elaborating on the shortcomings, the announcement said Riebig recommended that censorship be handled by the high command, rather than at both eighth army and CHQ levels.

Care of Your Children

Parents are usually very proud when the teacher says, "We are going to let Johnny skip a grade with a little help he can do it, we are sure."

A wise parent thinks twice about this, especially if the class skipper is in the lower grades. Such grades are likely to be crowded and skipping relieves the overcrowding.

What is more important, however, when making room in the classroom is the effect the skipping will have on the child's future school career.

The elementary grades are the most important of a child's school life. In these grades he learns the fundamentals of the major subjects. Here he learns his tables, the processes of arithmetic, the art of reading from a printed page so as to get meaning from it, the skill of handwriting that enables him to write legibly, the mastery of his language powers that enable him to talk clearly, in consecutive sentences, and to write clearly, simple declarative sentences. These are not mean accomplishments and not easily acquired.

The child who skips a class loses a part of his fundamental training in these important phases of his education. When he reaches the upper grades where speed is expected in the use of the fundamental skills and the child, having missed the ex-

perience that might have made this response automatic, fumbles, counts on his fingers, spells words as he reads. It is a terrible disadvantage. It is a terrible disadvantage. It is a terrible disadvantage.

When a pupil is skipped, the school people have a duty to him in seeing that he is helped to make up any work he may have lost. When a teacher is asked to skip a grade, he must be helped to organize the work so that none of it is lost and the pupil's future progress handicapped by the omission.

Children need time to grow. School is not merely a place for gathering information. A good teacher can teach an intelligent child at the rate of a grade course in six weeks. The six months given for that work are time granted for physical, mental and spiritual growth. That is what must be considered when skipping a grade is under discussion.

Wetbacks in California Stir Labor Dispute

EL CENTRO, Calif., June 4 (AP)—They're harvesting a new crop in the Imperial valley this year, it's hot potatoes.

California has no monopoly on the crop. California farmers want to see some Texas get their fingers burned, too.

The "hot potatoes" are Mexican border jumpers. Their presence on this side of the line has become a national political issue, almost too hot to handle.

Work for Little Hungry and jobless in Mexico, they swim across rivers and streams at unguarded border points. They arrive here with nothing but wet clothes on their backs. Union leaders say some work for 23 a week and less.

The native worker, organized by the AFL National Farm Labor union, wants that much per hour. Two weeks ago the union called a strike. Its members began arming wetbacks and turning them over to immigration authorities.

The carload shipments of vegetables from the valley this year are only about a third of what they were last year.

Texas Situation Cited "Why pick on us?" the growers cried. "Texas has about 100,000 wetbacks and nobody does anything about it. We have 4,000 or 5,000 wetbacks—just peanuts. The Texas politicians are trying to make California the scapegoat."

Now pending in congress is a bill to allow a bounty to employ illegal aliens such as wetbacks.

The bounty plan has been busy. H. H. Landon, regional immigration director in Los Angeles, says the service has been sending 1,000 wetbacks back to Mexico every day. Of this number, about 300 are turned over to the patrol by union members.

Luck of Motorist Bad, Good, Worse

U. S. Demands Punishment of 2 Slayers of GI

WASHINGTON, June 6 (AP)—The United States has demanded that Russia punish two red army soldiers who shot and killed American Col. Paul J. Green in Vienna on May 4.

A note delivered in Moscow yesterday by Ambassador Alan G. Kirk and made public today by the state department also called on the Russians to pay indemnity to Green's family. Green's home was in Rochester, N. Y.

The U. S. note charged that Green was shot "without provocation" while he was serving as a military policeman in the Vienna international zone and blamed the Soviet high commissioner and other occupation officials for "refusing to join in investigation."

The case was taken up with Moscow after the failure of efforts to work out a satisfactory settlement at Vienna.

Green and another American MP, Sgt. Jack Morgan, Keokuk, Ia., were on patrol early May 4 when they sought to "establish identity and status of two armed Soviet soldiers behaving suspiciously. Morgan was told. The Russians then "opened fired without provocation" and killed Green, the note said.
