School Panels at County Level to Stay in Existence

BOISE, June 9 (AP)—The attorney general's office ruled Saturday that county school reorganization committees do not get out of existence on July 1.

Idaho Wedding Bells Chimed Most in September, Not June

September replaced June as the most popular month for weddings in Idaho last year, according to the 1950 annual report of the division of vital statistics of the state department of public health.

In 1949, however, June led in the number of marriages with September a fairly close second. But it was toward the end of June, 1950 that the North Koreans invaded South Korea.

More marriages were recorded in 1950 than in 1949 for each month except January and February. The 1949-50 total shown in statistics for last year, that number, 307 marriages, are listed in Magic Valley.

The number by counties included: Blaine, 42; Jerome, 83; Lincoln, 24; Minidoka, 67; and Twin Falls, 31.

Twin Falls couples were the only ones keeping June as the traditional month for matrimony. As related, the only one in Magic Valley following the June trend is Selkirk, with 18 reported. Minidoka county reported more marriages in June than in any other month.

Most of the bridegrooms, 956 of them, were 21 including two whose ages were less than 18 years old and three were more than 75 years old.

The 50 to 54 age bracket was the most popular among both men and women for remarriage except of the class of divorced women—113 of them were remarried at the age of 25.

Two couples less than 18 years old were married and two couples more than 75 years old were married. Also recorded in Idaho in 1950 was the marriage of a 67-year-old woman and a man one-half her age and the marriages of 16- and 71-year-old women to men more than three times their ages.

REMSO, Wash., June 9 (AP)—Washington state public utility district commissioners Saturday approved a resolution calling for state investigation of rate increases requested by Washington Water Power company request for a power rate increase.

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Largest Pump On Dry Lands

COULTEE DAM, Wash., June 9 (AP)—Inauguration of the biggest pump in the world Thursday will start a stream of Columbia river water rushing uphill bearing life for a million acres.

At a word from Interior Secretary Oscar Chapman, the pump which operates as tall as a six-story building, will sprout fifty tons of water a second, a 220-foot incline. After the climb, a man-made channel will carry the water into a natural reservoir and on south for 60 miles to the Columbia basin irrigation project opening to settlers.

Since all states had a share in the multi-million dollar federal project, a "blessing of the waters" will be a feature of Thursday's ceremony. Jugs of water from each of the states, Alaska and Hawaii will be poured with waters of the Columbia basin through the pump.

Three present times a month's throw of four "world's largest" engineering feat: Grand Coulee, its record-breaking generator, the pump, and the biggest canal—where the pump pumps water to the water table in the irrigation project.

The pump, housed in a building 18 stories high, is the first of twelve which eventually will feed water to an arid but fertile section of central Washington. It will slightly larger than the state of Rhode Island—more than 1,000 feet long.

A second pump is scheduled for completion in about a month.

TEHRAN, Iran, June 9 (AP)—A strange poker game is being played in Iran with billions of dollars worth of oil as stake.

The chips include the Anglo-Iranian oil company's refinery at Abadan, the world's largest, and crude oil production worth \$400,000,000 a year.

Iran again proposed a reply to British Foreign Secretary Herbert Morrison's note of May 19 protesting the unilateral nationalization of oil. The company has a 50-year concession running until 1993.

A spokesman said the reply was postponed pending negotiation with a four-man delegation headed by the Tehran radio said the goal of negotiations was "a better solution," but instead it still would be on a basis of nationalization.

The allies. In the Yangju-Inn area U. N. troops were held to a halt in gain.
Yesterday's field dispatches, however, announced that thousands of reds were being pulled back while rearguards were engaged by the allies with bayonets and hand grenades.
These reports said the main body of reds appeared to be falling back toward Kumhwa, 12 miles northeast of Kumhwa, and toward Poyonri, a triangle's apex, 13 miles northeast of Chonwon.
Allied artillery pounded the vital east-west road between Chonwon and Kumhwa.
Last night B-29s raided the triangle area for the third straight night, dropping it with 50 tons of 500-pound fragmentation bombs. Carrier-based planes dropped napalm into a fiery ball, dropping napalm (jetted gasoline bombs).
One report said troops "ran out blasting like a torch on a windy day."

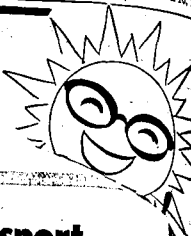

Life in Magic Valley

Wild flowers on Camas prairie and even on vacant lots in FAIRFIELD, are blooming in profusion. The camas, from which the prairie and foothills have just begun to bloom.

After seeing them it isn't difficult to understand why the early settlers called the area "magic valley." The camas, which seem to have certain mysterious, look from a distance like a pool or stream of water, to make the illusion even more perfect, they grow best in the low, sandy lands and in moist mountain meadows. Huge fields of them are found wherever civilization has not progressed them under.

They grow from a small oval-leaved bulb and the tiny six-petaled flowers are on a single stem approximately 18 inches tall. They sometimes are called wild-hyacinth. The camas bulb, sometimes one and one-half inches across, formerly was an important food for the northwestern Indians. It still is used to some extent. The Indians roasted them in pits of hot coals and used them as a sweet gum candy and are supposedly very nutritious. After being cooked the dried they will keep a long time and Indians have been known to carry them distances over the mountains to dig the camas roots to dry and store for winter use.

Ancients Also Had Ideas on Starry Forms

 Those who delight in tracing the so-called outlines of such star groups as the Pleiades, Orion, the big dipper and the various other men, animals and things which "the habit" the blue dome above us, often wonder how long the deductions and forms we employ have been in use.

All who read the literature of the ancient Greeks, Romans and Hebrews are aware that many of the familiar constellations known of today were used over 2,000 years ago.

Creations Vary
 The creatures depicted in each starry group have been almost as varied as the nations among which they originated. It is thought that we have no information on the constellation of the ancient Egyptians. But on scholars, using the same star patterns methods of fact finding, are sure that as early as 4,000 B. C. some of the recognized groups of today had been mapped out by the primitive peoples.

May Outland
 The Chinese were outlining constellations of their own around 2,500 B. C. Many believe that as early as this, the Mesopotamians had made a beginning on many of our groups. In later times the Greeks evidently worked them over somewhat into the forms with which we are now familiar.

Active Imaginations
 Most stargazers feel the ancients surely had active imaginations to see any resemblance between the constellation figures and the creatures they are supposed to depict. It is true there are very few of the groups that seem at all true to nature.

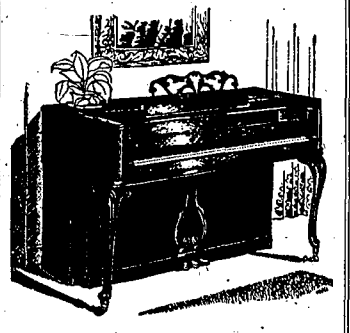
But there are some which appear within the bounds of reason, such as the big bear, Orion and the scorpion. Someone has said "the figures are likely often symbolic rather than an attempt actually to resemble the animals." Nor is it at all evident whether the accompanying myths existed before or after the groupings were outlined into the various creatures.

Not Evenly Distributed
 Those entirely unfamiliar with star study can see upon slight inspection of the sky on a starry night that these celestial spots are not evenly distributed over the entire heavens. And by no means are all of the same brightness or color.

A night sky in which the starry lights were all alike and evenly spaced doubtless would be beautiful, but decidedly unimpressive to those who are familiar with them now. Truly it has been said that "one star differs from another in glory."

Among primitive peoples in almost all parts of the world, stargazing once was a popular medium of exchange.

Army Adjusts Its Red Toll Figures

WASHINGTON, June 9 (SP)—The army estimates total enemy casualties in Korea through June 2 at 115,131.

A spokesman said this was an adjusted figure removing some errors and miscalculations since last week when the estimate was placed at 1,123,010.

In the addition to the adjusted toll, the army said it had reports of 26,000 enemy casualties between June 2 and 6, which have not been thoroughly assessed and adjusted against tables used by the army to arrive at enemy casualty estimates.

The adjusted total through June 2 includes 508,500 battle casualties, 152,000 non-battle losses and 146,231 counted prisoners of war, of whom 10,220 are Chinese held behind U. N. stockades.
