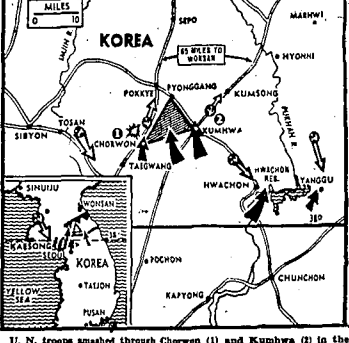

The Rigz brothers, both in their 20s, successfully negotiated the 300 rapids aboard the "Norm," named after the late Norman Neville, known as king of the river runners.  
Their voyage started at Lee's Ferry at the head of the treacherous Grand canyon and wound up at Pierce Ferry on Lake Mead.

### Truman Raps House Cut in Interior Cash

WASHINGTON, June 12 (AP)—President Truman has condemned House liberals in making such restrictions on government transmission lines as "actually limit the supply of electricity needed power."

The President appealed to the Senate to remove cuts and remove restrictions voted by the house in the past year's appropriations bill, which expires July 1.

He writes to Senator William Jenner, R., Ind., and Dr. A. R. Hays, D., Wis., expressing "deep concern over certain drastic limitations on the use of the nation's power resources voted by the house."

Hays is chairman of the senate appropriations subcommittee considering interior department appropriations.

The President criticized what he called two kinds of amendments. The first, he said, "is in a number of cases" he said, "the house cut out funds to build needed transmission lines which would carry the power produced by the government into the areas where it is to be used."

"Second, a legislative rider—the so-called 'no new power' amendment—tacked on to the bill. This rider would go much beyond these appropriations and restrict the entire federal new policy for disposing of the power produced by federal plants together, these amendments would seriously restrict the operation of federal hydro-electric power projects for the national defense and in the public interest."

SUN VALLEY, June 12 (Special)—Tighter controls on vital defense materials are coming, a representative of the national production authority said in the opening remarks of the National Physical Distributors and National Building Distributors annual convention here yesterday.

Dean O. Bowman, assistant administrator, policy coordination bureau, NPA, asserted there would be an increasing impact on the economy as the defense program moves from blueprint to production.

"Must Assume Supply"

"We must provide and operate control techniques that will assure delivery and appropriate distribution of materials between the military and military economies," Bowman said.

The official outlined current distribution policy, which is top priority to the department of defense and the atomic energy commission. Following these are materials for industrial expansion and essential civilian expansion.

Free From Controls

After these requirements are met, it is expected that the balance of our production for nondefense purposes will be as free from controls as possible, he said.

Bowman went on to say that, in spite of the drain of defense and industrial expansion needs, there was expected to be an adequate supply of materials to enable the economy to function at a very high level.

"In the clutch, who do you think brought about that winning play?"

"The boy who snatched it back from center was a Catholic.

"The man who caught it was Shakespeare, a Protestant.

"And the man Shakespeare passed to, and who caught it in the end zone, was Miller, a Jewish boy."

# 11 Drown as Fishing Craft Sunk by Gale

CROTON, Conn., June 12 (AP)—Eleven persons, including two women and a boy, perished when their fishing craft sank suddenly Tuesday night in a gale off Block Island sound. Three men were saved. Last night the bodies of five of the drowned had been recovered.

Those who died, passengers aboard "The Jack" dived beneath the waves. Survivors were swept down within sight of passengers of a second boat, which had taken two survivors aboard, then became disabled itself and drifted helplessly away, unable to be of further aid.

The sunken craft was out of Niantic on a day's fishing expedition. The second boat was the Clody, out of Milford, and the Jack, out of a fishing club.

Vincent Lombardo told reporters he had just stepped into the cabin when "The Jack" sank and he saw the "bow" go under the water.

Most of the passengers and crew hurriedly donned life preservers and climbed to the top of the wrecked house from which ultimately all but one went down.

Lombardo hung on from 2 p. m. Sunday when the accident occurred. He was the last man to be rescued at 9 a. m. yesterday. Dismal, he told rescuing coast guardsmen he spent eight agonizing hours, nearly closed in and heavy seas swept them into the ocean.

# 30,000 Bugs Are Released To Eat Weed

PULLMAN, Wash., June 12 (AP)—Thirty thousand beetles have been released on Washington state rangelands to eat their favorite food—goat weed. The weed, also known as Klamath weed or St. John's wort, is a rangeland pest that crowds out grass. The beetles eat nothing else.

Agriculture experts at Washington State college told about it yesterday.

The bugs were imported first from Australia and let loose in California several years ago. They liked the climate, ate the weeds, and generally made themselves useful and comfortable.

Colonies set free in Washington in 1946 and 1949 showed signs of survival, so another lot was collected this spring from California rangelands. In the collecting party were Dr. Lowell Rasmussen and Al Law, both of Washington State college; W. W. Baker, San Juan county; A. J. Norris, state weed supervisor at Yakima, and A. W. Lange, weed supervisor in Spokane.

Rasmussen said releasing the beetles in Washington is still experimental, but if it works, a destructive weed will be controlled.

Wheat fields cover about one fourth of Kansas and that state grows about one fourth of the national wheat harvest of the United States.

# Production of Copper Gains At Rapid Rate

WASHINGTON, June 12 (AP)—The bureau of mines said today that copper production increased during April to 2,749 tons, daily. This put it above 1,000,000 tons a year for the first time since June 1944, it said.

Production for April totaled 82,469 tons. Most important copper producing states reported slight changes in production, but in Montana and Michigan output declined eight, two and 14 per cent respectively.

Old production in April declined 20 per cent to a total of 158,146 fine ounces. Gains in Arizona, Idaho, Nevada, South Dakota and Utah were more than offset by declines in California, Colorado and Washington.

Silver production declined five per cent for an April total of 2,510,524 fine ounces.

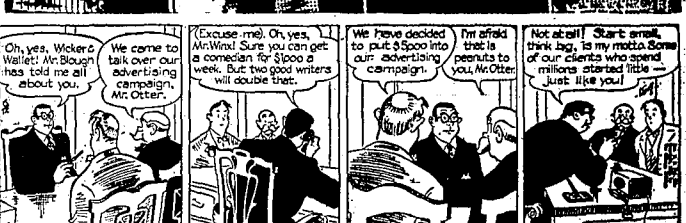

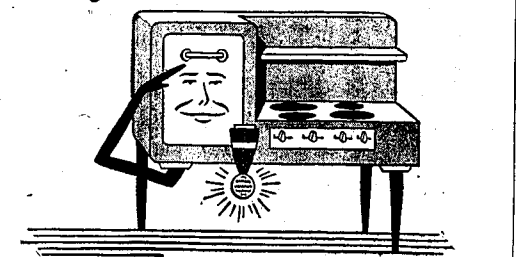

### Colonel Says Guard's Camp Was Excellent

"It was an excellent camp—the best so far in accomplishment and training," said Col. James C. Leighton, commanding officer of the 181st armored cavalry regiment. Last elements of the regiment returned Monday evening from the two-week summer training at Camp Williams, Utah.

The colonel said a sixth army inspection team gave the unit a high rating. "It's shaping up into a real regiment," he added. Colonel Leighton said the camp program was helpful in showing where further training is needed and said additional training will be given in communications and maintenance.

The regiment fired more than 9,000 rounds of 75 and 76 millimeter ammunition and qualified about one-third of its personnel in tank gunnery. That represents the approximate number of personnel in tank crews normally firing those weapons.

In addition the regiment fired about 800 rounds of 105 millimeter ammunition and about 750,000 rounds of small arms ammunition. Colonel Leighton said the one firing accident in which three men were injured was the first in the regiment's five-year history of going to summer camp.

The regimental award for the outstanding company of the year went to the tank company of the third battalion, stationed at Rupert. In addition there were numerous awards to top men in boxing and other sports.

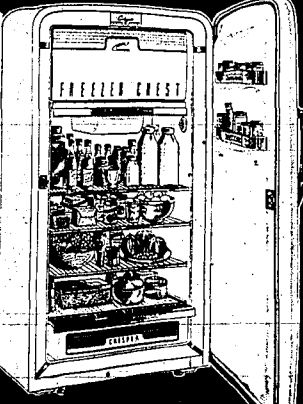
