Amphibian Plane Crew Lauded for Bold Rescue Job

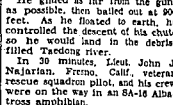
TOKYO, June 13 (AP)—An Ameri- can amphibian plane crew, during heavy antiaircraft fire and com- munist troops, rescued a downed fighter pilot from a river near the North Korean capital, Pyongyang, last night.

The air force called it "one of the most daring and spectacular rescues in air history."

Police Report Freak Contact
With Stations in Washington

Freak air waves Monday night, identified Twin Falls police to contact cities throughout Washington and northern Idaho on P-M radio, which normally are effective from 40 to 200 miles.

Clarence Vance, deck sergeant from midnight until 8 a. m., said strange contacts in the Washington area occurred when a police car at Filer replied to a call from officers in Coeur d'Alene. Reception was so clear the officer thought Vance was talking him from Twin Falls.

The reception in city police cars was remarkable. In order to avoid interference with local calls, radios in the cars are turned down so they are able to receive for only about 40 miles. Occasionally they are able to hear Boise, but Monday night calls from Washington were as clear as calls five miles away.

The main radio at the police station normally has a maximum range of 200 miles, according to Vance. Boise usually comes in quite clearly, but Postelle is often quite noisy. Low points such as hills are especially difficult to reach.

Vance said between 12:30 and 4 a. m. he was able to contact cities as far north as Bellingham, Wash., on the Canadian border. He talked directly with officers at Olympia, Wash., and they told him they were contacting other districts. Olympia officers said they were talking to officers all over Montana.
