Three Die as Auto Shoved on Rupert Railroad Crossing

RUPERT, June 18—Coroner Alan Goodman has called an inquest at 4 p.m. today into the deaths of three persons killed instantly in a train-two car crash yesterday afternoon. Two small children were injured seriously.

Meanwhile witnesses reported the death car was pushed into the train's path from behind by a car driven by Gary Johnson, 14, route 2, Rupert, injured. The crash occurred about 5 p.m. Sunday near the intersection of state highway 28 and U. S. highway 50 one-eighth of a mile west of here.

MacArthur Probers To Call Just 4 More

WASHINGTON, June 18 (AP)—The senate's MacArthur inquiry committee voted unanimously today to hear only four more witnesses and to close the investigation "at the earliest possible date."

Chairman Russell, D. Ga., told a news conference the inquiry may end this week or by the middle of next week at the latest.

The committee decided to call Patrick J. Hurley, former ambassador to China; Maj. Gen. Douglas MacArthur, the former commander of the U. S. strategic bombing force in the east; Maj. Gen. David C. Barr, former commander of the U. S. seventh division in Korea and one-time chief of a U. S. military mission to China; and Vice Adm. Oscar Badger, former U. S. naval commander in the far east.

Truman Wins First Test on Controls Law

WASHINGTON, June 18 (AP)—The Truman administration won the first test in a key congressional committee today in the drive to get a stronger economic controls law.

Only an 11 to 10 vote, however, turned back a Republican-sponsored move in the house banking committee to strip publicly authority from the proposed new legislation.

Truman would permit the government to buy material or goods from high-cost producers or processors when the price is put at higher than ceiling prices for similar material was used.

Similar authority was used during World War II to pay extra for scarce materials.

Truman received assurances the leaders will try to get a new law with the stronger controls the senate.

Neither House Speaker Rayburn nor Senate Democratic Leader McClellan favors a temporary extension of the existing authority.

Wenzka's 1947 Ford pickup truck collided with a 1934 Chevrolet truck driven by R. W. Henderson, Jr., who was driving east on the state highway. Bennie Lafon, Indian, a passenger in the truck, was hospitalized overnight in Rupert for treatment of a head cut.

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Major Ports Still Tied Up By Walkouts

Ship movements at the nation's major ports were tied up today by labor disputes.

In other labor trouble, one strike against an airlines company ended from shipment of beef supplies for food stores threatened.

No immediate settlement appeared for the maritime disputes which involved 650 pilots in 23 major ports. But federal mediators renewed efforts to reach a solution.

In New York, the CIO transport workers settled their dispute with Pan American World Airways. With the agreement subject to union ratification, the work stoppage has ended.

The settlement came shortly after the union had called a general strike of about 1,000 workers at New York's Idlewild and La Guardia fields airports.

A limited work stoppage started Friday when 250 ground service employees quit work in protest against dismissal of 80 mechanics by Pan American.

Picketing by non-striking airlines pilots continued today against United Air lines in some cities. The UAL pilots were joined by pilots from American Air lines and Trans World Air lines at New York's La Guardia.

Airline service has not been interrupted by the picketing.

Demo; GOP Seek Unity on Foreign Plans

WASHINGTON, June 18 (AP)—A house Democrat and a Republican senator urged congress today to rise above "personalities" in order to reach a settlement on the foreign policy requests made by Rep. Bruce M. Wilson, D. Ark., and Sen. James H. Duff, R. Pa.

Their views were set out independently in a statement and Duff in a speech to the graduating class at Lehigh university, Bethlehem, Pa.

However, the theme of their pleas was the same and each without naming names—unmistakably referring their remarks to some members of their own party.

"Let's suspend the political vendettas until 1952," Duff said. "It is inevitable that foreign policy should become a political issue in 1952. This country has a right to seek an advantage with only presidential politics in mind."

Duff also told the Lehigh graduates a bipartisan foreign policy is the only way to meet the free world's battle against communism.

"If we are going to meet the greatest crisis in our history," Duff said, "we have to lay above personalities. This isn't a time to be tearing people apart. It is a time to understand the best of everything that has happened to us."

The center parties won 258 seats, a majority of 129, in the 500-member National Assembly.

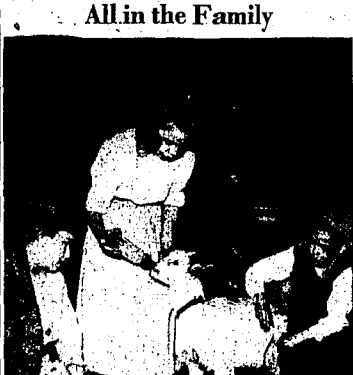

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Warehouses Are Named Utilities In Smylie Ruling

BOISE, June 18 (AP)—Gen. Robert E. Smylie has ruled that warehouses in Idaho are public utilities whose rates and charges are subject to regulatory jurisdiction of the state department of agriculture.

Smylie, in an opinion requested by the state department of agriculture commissioner, said determination of the question "is of importance in applying the provisions of certain orders of the U. S. office of price stabilization."

Prior to enactment of the 1931 public warehouse law, regulatory jurisdiction of warehouses was under the public utilities commission.

Smylie said that the character of the warehouse has not been changed by the 1931 law and that public warehouses are still classified as public utilities.

The commissioner of agriculture has clear authority to require that rates and charges for the handling and storage of any agricultural product in a public warehouse be reasonable and just, Smylie declared.

TUCKER'S NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG POT SHOTS

WASHINGTON—Secretary Dean Acheson has seriously damaged the administration's defense in the United States by his abortive attempt to force the cabinet to meet generally among the high diplomatic and military officials who advocated an alliance between China and the Soviet Union.

Secretary Acheson's friends are amazed at the admission of self-abandonment of the facts.

Like Albert C. Wedemeyer, who is almost the only American officer to match MacArthur's excellent performance, Secretary Acheson contrived the Acheson cartoon in testimony before the Russell committee.

Although General Wedemeyer's lack of sympathy for the Acheson cartoon is well known, it is surprising a man whose retirement plan has not been granted would dare to defy his superiors so bluntly.

QUESTIONABLE—But the inside story behind the various approaches to peace between the warring factions of China pleases the anti-communists in a questionable light.

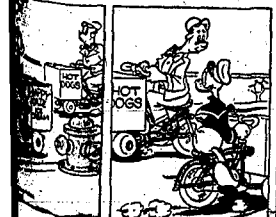

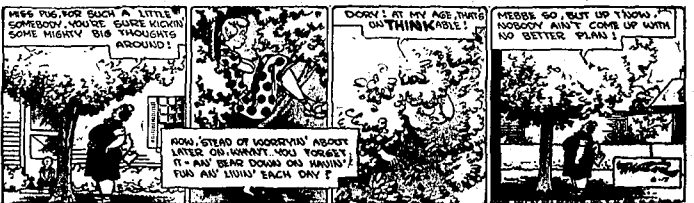
