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Hurley Says FDR Bought Change in Malta Pact Terms

TWIN FALLS, June 21 (AP)—Patrick J. Hurley told President Roosevelt, shortly before his death, that he had a mission of trying to soften the terms of the Malta pact.

Hurley said he went to London and talked with Churchill. He left London to fly to Moscow, "and when I landed in Moscow I received word that Roosevelt had died."

Hurley, former ambassador to China, said he received his "last direct order" from the state department after Roosevelt's death. He was "instructed to go to the Yalta terms."

The Yalta agreement was an understanding reached by Roosevelt, Churchill and Premier Stalin, Russia, in a meeting in the Russian town of Yalta in February.

It was agreed there that Russia should have certain concessions in Manchuria and that she should give the islands north of Japan.

Hurley rejected the agreement as a "cowardly surrender" of principles for which World War II was fought.

Senator Wiley, R., Wis., brought out that one of those attending the Yalta conference was Alger Hiss, state department official since Hiss's conviction.

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Panel Vote Passes Pay-Price Control, Cancels Rollbacks

WASHINGTON, June 21 (AP)—The senate banking committee today approved a wage-price control bill denying President Truman most of the new controls he requested, and forbidding price rollbacks beyond the average for Jan. 25-Feb. 24.

Chairman Maybank, D., S. C., said the action was taken by a 12-1 vote of the committee, Senator Dirksen, R., Ill., casting the lone dissenting vote. Maybank said he will present the bill to the senate tomorrow and debate on the measure will start Monday.

Senator Moody, D., Mich., said he and others will wage a fight on the floor to knock out the restriction on rollbacks.

Agency Stricken
Maybank announced the committee and directed a proposal to create an agency to help small business and industrial enterprises get a better business picture. The agency will be authorized to report out a separate bill to do the same thing.

By a vote of 7 to 0 the committee beat down an effort to knock out the rollback curb, Maybank said, and by a 12-1 vote it rejected a provision by Senator Douglas, D., Ill., to scrap the entire measure and approve, instead, one-year inflation training.

Expans Next Week
The senate's effect on production act, suspending price, wage and other economic control, is due to expire June 30.

The senate restriction would hold a future price rollback to two percent instead of the nine percent of the present law. The bill has been introduced to the senate by Senator Moody, D., Mich., and is expected to pass.

Senator Moody made a public memorandum from D'Salle containing a list of companies that are subject to price rollbacks will be a "serious blow" at the end of the year.

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House OK of 7 Billion Tax Boost Sought

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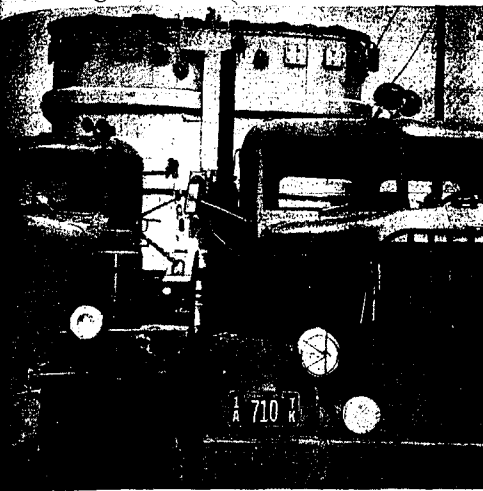

Co-Op Plan of Blaze Fighting Receiving Test

BOISE, June 21 (AP)—Forest fire fighting on a cooperative local level is being tried in southeastern Idaho for the first time this year.

Firefighters from 10 communities and sheriff's men are being trained by the Cottonwood Forest protection committee as having control of fire-fighting operations.

The state is providing a full-time warden and will furnish a tanker and other equipment. The local fire district, county and community will provide the manpower.

Power inspectors, Madison, Jefferson, Bonneville, Bingham, Caribou, Bear Lake, Franklin and Power counties will be designated as deputy state fire wardens and will coordinate the county-wide fire fighting units, Guernsey said.

The sheriff's will organize fire fighting units in a company form to provide a "minute man" brigade in case of a forest or range fire outbreak.

Guernsey said ranges have been burned in southeastern Idaho during the fire season, a chore normally handled by the district fire units. He estimated that the Cottonwood fire district was so large and the state had only one full-time warden stationed at Soda Springs. It often was inconvenient for persons living in open snake hole areas to obtain burn permits.
