

# N. Assembly to Study Truce Bid; U. S. Sets Terms

WASHINGTON, June 26 (U.P.)—The U. S. House of Representatives today announced it would study a truce bid from the North Korean government and set terms for a possible agreement.

The House voted 387-10 to refer the North Korean proposal to a subcommittee on the Korean situation. The subcommittee will report to the House by July 1.

The North Korean proposal, which was received by the U. S. State Department on June 24, offers a 10-year truce, a withdrawal of U. S. troops from the Korean peninsula, and a return to the status quo ante bellum.

The U. S. State Department has set several conditions for a truce, including a withdrawal of North Korean troops from the 38th parallel, a return of prisoners of war, and a cessation of hostilities.

The House also passed a resolution authorizing the President to negotiate a truce with the North Koreans, provided it meets the terms set by the House.

Barbara said she was in the little bedroom downstairs when Jackie Smith and the other child, who said the house was on fire. The lights went out about that time. In the confusion she carried out the baby's crib and her 4-year-old sister.

Barbara had been waiting for Betty Bodenhofer, 14, to return from her home near door before starting to put the other children to bed. The Bodenhofer girl had been helping her parents for the other children and had gone home on an errand about 10 minutes earlier.

**Fireman Called**  
 The Bodenhofer girl had just started back to the Martin household when the high flames started the explosion and called her mother who turned in the alarm.

Barbara said she had seen Darlene and Sally, the house was seething with flames.

The whole interior of the house was on fire when the fire department arrived. The fire was under control by 10:30 a. m. today.

**All Possessions Lost**

**BOISE, June 24 (UP)—**The first statewide symposium on alcoholism was held today with one major point emphasized and reemphasized: Alcoholism is a menace.

Dr. Leon A. Greenberg, of the Yale university clinic on alcoholism, told an interested group of about 100 men and women that the drinking driver clearly was one of the major causes contributing to the high automobile accident rate.

Thirteen bids were received for a wide variety of petroleum products. Some of the companies did not bid on all items and the board selected a few-days to analyze the numerous quotations.

Companies submitting bids are Fletcher Oil, Continental Oil, Utah Oil Refining, Walcott Oil, Orem State Oil, Central Petroleum Products, Phillips Petroleum, Shell Oil, Sinclair Refining and Standard Oil.

Among supplies for which quotations were sought are 60,000 gallons of regular kerosene, 23,000 gallons of diesel fuel, 2,000 gallons of motor oil, 1,000 gallons of diesel motor oil, 600 gallons of motor oil, 200 gallons of motor oil, wheel bearing grease, tractor roller lubricant and chassis grease.

The bid of the McCarty Cravel company to furnish seal road chips at \$2.85 per cubic yard was accepted officially by the board. The bids were opened last Monday night and the McCarty bid was accepted at an informal session last week.

The city reserved the lease with Sheriff Jesse Carlson, allowing him the use of pasture land between the municipal golf course and Addison avenue west and near Rock creek canyon.

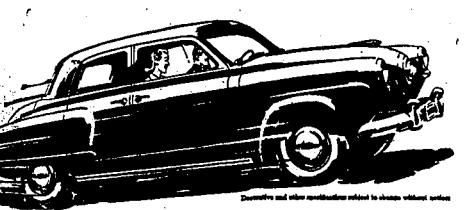

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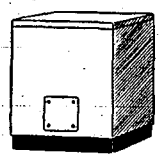
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
