# Leaders Elated As Contract on Road Approved

Efforts of the Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce and other civic groups and leaders were rewarded Wednesday when the state highway department announced that a contract has been let to construct a new highway from the Perrine Memorial bridge north on U. S. highway 93. The Peter Kiewit Sons' company, Sheridan, Wyo., was awarded the contract for \$564,000, the Associated Press reported. Under normal conditions the entire job should be completed next June, according to James Reid, chief highway engineer.

Announcement that the contract for the new road was let and work will be started in the near future was long awaited news for area residents. Orval Chaney, chairman of the Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce highway committee, and Ray Holmes past chairman and currently a committee member, both expressed gratification to Gov. Len Jones and John McKinley, highway commissioner for making the first action to rebuild and realign U. S. highway 93 north from the bridge.

15-Year Term Is Decreed for Church Chief

BUDAPEST, Hungary, June 23 (AP)—Archbishop Jozsef Grooss was sentenced today to a 15-year term on charges of plotting to overthrow Hungary's communist government with American help. One of his eight co-defendants was sentenced to death.

Archbishop Grooss succeeded Cardinal Mindszenty as leader of the Catholic Church in Hungary after the cardinal was given a life sentence on treason charges in 1956.

In handing down the sentences today the court said the prosecution had proved that the group maintained "close relations with the United States legation" in Budapest. All had pleaded guilty to the charges.

Prosecutor Gyula Akl, asked for the "severest punishment." He objected because the sentences were not heavier. But Judge Vilmos Glat said the sincerity of their confessions and the fact they had not been convicted of any previous crimes were alleviating circumstances.

Akl was the man who prosecuted Cardinal Mindszenty, and American businessman Robert A. Voelger, who was charged with espionage and other charges. Olli was the judge in those cases too.

Familiar Pattern (The U. S. state department has described the trial as persecution in a familiar communist pattern, aimed at suppressing all human rights and liberties and the influence of the church.)

Two of the defendants accepted the sentences and the rest were given 60 days to appeal to the supreme court.

Chase, by comparison, is relatively unknown here except among members of the Washington delegation with whom he has been conferring this week. Friend of Wallgren He also is a friend of Tom C. Wallgren, power commission chairman and a close friend of President Truman. When he was governor Wallgren appointed Chase to the Washington state aeronautics commission.

Wallgren told a newspaper here he had not discussed the matter with Chase but said he "presumed" he would back him if asked.

### Buhl Cannery Hums to Pack 40,000 Cases of ECA Milk

Buhl, June 28—Forty-thousand cases of milk are being shipped to Greece from the Buhl milk plant in Buhl. Shipments of 30,000 cases each are being made by Rego plants at Orland, Calif., and Galt, Calif.

Peak production for the plant has been reached during canning of the shipment for Greece. Two weeks of operation, processing 4,000,000 pounds of milk, was required for the Buhl shipment.

Lowell Roskelley, assistant manager at the plant, stated it was necessary for a U. S. department of agriculture inspector to take samples of the Rego output for testing. Strict federal standards must be met for these shipments.

The milk shipment is part of the ECA program. The collection, processing and transportation of the shipments is handled by the commodity credit corporation. The department of agriculture purchased the plant for the ECA.

A fleet of freight trucks has been used in delivering the shipment to docks at Vancouver, Wash. Using two of the "car lift trucks," as many as eight trucks and trailers have been loaded in a day.

While much of the milk comes from the Buhl area, trucks bring it in from as far as Shoshone. A station is maintained at Burley and a milk tanker brings this supply to the plant daily.

Peak production is always reached during the summer months. Present production has reached an all time high at the Buhl plant. Actual canning operations are being carried on 24 hours daily at present.

In connection with the dairy month program, Vernon Patch, manager of the Rego plant, has given a program at various clubs. His talks to the Elmer Kiwanis club, Northview, Lucerne, Buhl and Cedar Draw Granges, Ketchum-Sun Valley Rotary club and the annual Chamber of Commerce banquet in Burley have been supplemented by a movie on the dairy industry.
